#### CONTINUED INCREASE IN EARNINGS SHOWN BY POWER CORPORATION

A letter to the shareholders of Canada Northern Power Corporation, Limited, from the general manager, B. V. Harrison, points to a continued increase in both gross and net earnings of the company during the 12 months ending February 28th, 1933. Gross earnings were \$3,483,268.20, compared with \$3,381,616.44 for the previous similar period. Operating and maintenance cost \$1,067,607.08, against \$1,076,-677.10 for the period ending February 28th, 1932, while the net earnings were \$2,415,661,12, compared with a previous net of \$2,304,939.34. The letter further states:

"During the period covered by this letter, your Company set up two alltime records, gross earnings in December exceeding the \$300,000 mark by \$2,298.00, which was again increased in January to \$306,688.00. Similarly, our kilowatt hour output in January reached the figure of 39,196,190 as compared with the previous record month of 38,864,050 kilowatt hours.

During January an addition to -the mill at Granada Mines, Limited, in Rosyn Township was placed in operation, thereby increasing their power load.

On February 15th a contract for the supply of power was entered into with Beattie Gold Mines, Limited, whose property is in Duparquet Township in Quebec. The building of a transmission line to provide service is now well under way, and it is expected that this property will be connected with our system around the beginning of May with an initial load of approximately 1500 h.p.

In the Porcupine camp, Hayden Gold Mines, Limited have completed an addition to their mill, while at the Mc-Intyre work has been commenced on the sinking of their new underground shaft from the 3750 foot level."
