Desmeloizes Map Sheet Issued

The geological features of the Desmeloizes area in Western Quebec are shown on a map sheet just issued by the Department of Mines, Ottawa. The map is on a one-mile-to-the-inch scale, and is one of a series of standard sheets of the Rouyn-Harricana area, some of which have already been published. The map sheet carries marginal notes in respect to the physical features, geology, mineral deposits, and related publications.

As prospecting in the whole Rouyn-Harricana area is being directed more or less to belts of sediments, it is altogether likely that the sedimentaries indicated on the Desmeloizes sheet will receive some attention this coming field season.

Copies of the map may be obtained from the Director, Geological Survey, Department of Mines, Ottawa.

A relief fund for the town of Cochrane, suffering from the ravages of typhoid, has been opened in Haileybury and this morning the total of \$432 had been subscribed.

Plans are being completed for the building of a new Masonic Temple at the corner of Main Street and Rorke Avenue this year.

It has been laid down by the town council that all chimneys erected in Haileybury must have an opening at least 12x12 inches, and must be either two bricks in thickness or lined with cement.

The Haileybury Board of Trade was informed at the regular meeting on Thursday that there was a good prospect of the trunk road from North Bay to Temiskaming being started this year.

The local Chapter of the I.O.D.E. has come to the assistance of the town of Cochrane, with a substantial shipment of disinfectants and other necessities to help with their fight against typhoid.

An official announcement is to the effect that the T. & N.O. Ry. will build a branch line from Swastika to Larder Lake.

Mrs. W. J. Curry

Toronto papers on Saturday chronicled the death of a former resident of Haileybury in the person of Mrs. W. J. Curry, mother of Mr. Thos. W. Curry, Broadway Street. Mrs. Curry passed away on Good Friday, April 14th, after an illness of some months' duration. She was in her 72nd year.

The late Mrs. Curry lived in Haileybury for some years prior to going to the city about ten years ago. She is survived by her husband and her son, Thos. who was summoned to the city a couple of weeks ago when his mother's illness became critical. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, with interment in Weston, Ontario.

OBITUARY

Phillip Gagnon Sr.

The death of Phillip Gagnon Sr., which took place at the home of his son, Phillip, in New Liskeard on Saturday last, April 15th, marked the passing of a pioneer of the North Country and one of the early citizens of Haileybury. He was 89 years of age and, while in failing health for a couple of years, he retained his faculties almost to the last and passed peacefully away after suffering a stroke on the previous day.

Mr. Gagnon, who was born in Medcalf, Russell County, came to Haileybury in the spring of 1906 with his wife and family. He secured several lots on Marcella Street, where the home of his son, Albert, now stands, and continued to reside there until a few years ago, when he went to New Liskeard to reside with Phillip Jr. Mrs. Gagnon died in 1918, the family are well known throughout the district and there are many friends who extend their sincere sympathy.

Mr. Gagnon had many interesting recollections of the early days of Haileybury. He used to tell of the time when there was only a Mass celebrated for the Roman Catholic population once a month when the late Bishop Latulippe, then parish priest at Cobalt, came to the new town for the purpose. He saw the town grow from a small beginning, through the boom days of the Cobalt camp, and right up to the day when the greater part of it was destroyed in October, 1922. Mr. Gagnon took an active interest in the affairs of the community for many years and was a highly respected citizen.

Five sons and three daughters are the surviving members of the family. The sons are Phillip, Jr. of New Liskeard, Dr. L. Gagnon, Cochrane, Prosper of Rouyn, Albert of Haileybury, and Joseph of North Bay. All were present for the funeral. The daughters are Mrs. J. P. Vachon of Angliers, Que., Mrs. Alfred Boissonault, of Timmins, and Mrs. Malcolm Thibault of Gatineau Mills, Que. The latter two were unable to come home.

The funeral of the late Mr. Gagnon was held from the home of his son, Albert, in Haileybury, the remains having been brought to his former home on Saturday night. Requiem High Mass was celebrated in Holy Cross Cathedral at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, April 18th, by Rev. Fathers Pelchat and Fontaine, and interment was made in the family plot in the new R.C. Cemetery on Meridian Avenue South. A mixed choir from North Temiskaming, Cobalt, New Liskeard and Haileybury parishes sang in the cathedral, where a large congregation had gathered to pay their last respects to one who was for so many years a friend and neighbor. The five sons, with Mr. Phil. Lemieux, a son-in-law, were the pallbearers.

Among those from out of town who were present for the funeral was Mr. J. C. Levesque of North Bay, an old friend of the late Mr. Gagnon and the family.

George Allard

The death of Mr. George Allard, a former resident of Haileybury and father of Mr. G. S. Allard, View Street passed away at his home in Pembroke on April 8th. He was 81 years of age and had been ill for some months. The funeral was held on April 11th, interment being at Bonfield. He had lived in Haileybury up to the time of the last big fire. Surviving are five daughters, Mrs. A. Sabourin of Pembroke, Mrs. Parent, Cochrane, Mrs. J. Harvey, Kirkland Lake, Mrs. G. Sarsfield in Quebec and Mrs. J. Morissette, of Dearborn, Mich. There are also five sons, G. S. Allard, Arthur, Joseph, Ernest and Thomas.

Mrs. H. Sweeney

Mrs. Valada Sweeney, wife of Hiram Sweeney, a former resident of Cobalt and a daughter of Councillor A. N. Gagnon of Haileybury, died last Friday at her home in Sudbury after a lengthy illness. The late Mrs. Sweeney was born in Hull 36 years ago, and had lived in Ottawa before coming to Northern Ontario. She was married in Cobalt on December 20, 1923, and had resided in Capreol and North Bay before moving to Sudbury. She is survived by her husband, three sons, James, Lawrence and Richard, also her father, one sister, Mrs. George

Narbonne, Kirkland Lake and two brothers, Arthur of Kirkland Lake, and Valmore in Ottawa.

Peter Archibald Clattenburg

With six sons acting as pallbearers, the funeral took place Tuesday afternoon from St. James' Anglican Church, Cobalt, of the late Peter Archibald Clattenburg, who died on Sunday night at his home on Baker Street after a long illness. Rev. Charles Glover, rector of the parish, officiated at the church service and also at the graveside in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Haileybury.

The late Mr. Clattenburg was a native of Margaret's Bay, Lunenburg County, N.S., and would have celebrated his 74th birthday on May 11th next. He was married in 1885 to Elizabeth Myers, of Spry Harbor, and they made their home until 1913 at Tangier, when they moved to Cobalt. For the past 20 years the family had resided in this camp. Mr. Clattenburg worked in the mines at Cobalt for about nine years.

He had been in failing health for the past two and a half years, suffering from cancer, and for two weeks prior to his death had been confined to bed. He is survived by his widow, seven sons, Robert and George, at home, James and Walter, in Kirkland Lake, Isaac, at Silver Centre, Frank, at Mileage 104, and Angus, at Boston Creek; also six daughters, Mrs. O. Weagle, Timmins, Mrs. C. McAskill, Kennetcook Corners, N.S., Mrs. S. Gannon, South Porcupine, Mrs. William Bush, North Cobalt, and Mrs. W. J. Bolger and Mrs. Frank McInnis, Kirkland Lake.

Two daughters predeceased their father. There are 38 grandchildren living, while Mr. Clattenburg has three brothers and seven sisters, all residing in Nova Scotia.

Cyprian N. Leblance

Stricken with a heart attack about eight o'clock on Monday evening at his home on Lang Street, Cobalt, Cyprian N. Leblance, resident of the silver camp since 1915, and a pioneer prospector in the Northern Quebec mining areas, died less than four hours later. Although he had complained of

pains a few days before Mr. Leblance apparently had been in his usual health until he became suddenly ill. He was in his 67th year.

The late Mr. Leblance first went into Northern Quebec in 1907, after returning from British Columbia. At that time he staked claims ten miles from the Noranda, and since that date had been actively interested in that mining field. At the time of his death, Mr. Leblance had been preparing to leave for his holdings to carry out some work there.

Born in St. Isidore de Prescott, 66 years ago, Mr. Leblance was a son of the late Cyprian Leblance, a pioneer citizen of that section of Ontario. After his marriage, he made his home in Ottawa for about 15 years, after which the family went to British Columbia, where they remained for seven years. While in the west, Mr. Leblance

was associated with D. H. Angus, of Haileybury, in mining operations.

The family came to Cobalt 18 years ago, and Mr. and Mrs. Leblance had made their home there since. Mr. Leblance was a Roman Catholic in religion and attended St. Therese's Church, while in politics he was an ardent Liberal. Surviving are his widow, one son, Horace, of the Customs Department, Ottawa, and a daughter, Cyprienne, wife of Dr. J. M. Revary, of Ottawa. There are also three brothers, Ovila, Olivier and Euclide, all of Montreal, and two sisters, Mrs. E. Auger, Port Arthur, and Mrs. T. Lauzon, Fitzroy Harbor.

The body was taken to Ottawa on the evening train on Tuesday, following service held in St. Therese's church. The funeral is to take place in the Capital tomorrow morning, and interment will be made in Ottawa.
