

Union School to Continue Under Present System

Agreement Reached Between Town and Township Councils for Another Year

The union school section at Cobalt will continue to operate on its present basis at least until June 30, 1934, but for an hour on Monday evening its future appeared to be arranged on the lines of dissolution threatened by the members of the Coleman township council unless their brethren of the town council were willing to continue the status quo. Coleman wanted to retain the existing proportion of nine to four in maintaining the section, while the town's representatives, first insisting they would pay no more than two to one, finally offered to split the difference and went on record as agreeing to 17 to 8. A deadlock appeared imminent, but eventually a suggestion advanced from public school trustees present, and to the effect that no effort be made to disrupt the section until June of next year, was agreed to by all concerned, and it was agreed the arrangement meantime be as the town suggested.

The discussions took place prior to and during the regular meeting of the Cobalt town council, and the earlier exchanges which were informal and not regarded as official, were participated in by members of the school board, present in strength on invitation. As a result of this meeting, Coleman council retired to their own office and debated the matter among themselves, returning to the town hall when the town council had completed all its other business. It soon developed that both sides appeared firmly determined to adhere to their respective viewpoints, and it seemed, until the suggestion finally adopted was made, that the section would be split at the end of the present year. Following the public debate, Coleman council again conferred among themselves, with Trustee Priestly taking part, and it was announced later that the proposal made would be acceptable for the present.
