A combination of high water and shifting ice on Lake Temiskathing last week-end seriously damaged the Haileybury wharf. An east wind on Friday drove the icefield against the outer part of the structure, breaking timbers placed perpendicularly against the main part of the wharf and shifting the southern end towards shore. The warehouse was shook up to some extent and the damage appears to be considerable. The ice was apparently forced underneath the planking by the wind.

On Monday another east wind caused some further crushing of the structure, but the pressure was less than on the first occasion and the damage was not greatly increased. A change in the wind on Monday night relieved the situation and with the gradual melting of the icefield, the worst of the trouble appears to be over.



Reductions in the Amount of Relief Now Being Made

All Applicants Must Answer a Questionnaire on Their Financial Standing

With a view to further reductions in the amount spent for relief in Haileybury, the town council held a special meeting on Thursday night last, when a questionnaire was prepared which requires all applicants for assistance to give complete particulars of their financial position. These forms were handed to all parties on the relief list on Monday, when they came to draw their supplies for the week and must be filled in and returned before another issue will be given.

It had been decided in April that all relief issues would cease on May 1st, but it was found that, athough the amounts required had been reduced by more than 25 per cent., there weer still people who had no means of obtaining the necessities of life. For these the questionnaire was designed and their circumstances will be carefully considered in future issues.

Town officials and members of the council express the expectation that the steps will bring the amount necessary down to one-half of what was required during the winter months. Some reductions have been made in the quantities of supplies allowed, but no individual or family is be-

To the Taxpayers of the Town of Haileybury

Within a few days the first instalment of the 1933 Taxes will be due, and the Finance Committee urgently requests all taxpayers to make as great an effort as possible to pay as much, and, if possible, all of their 1933 Taxes at this time.

The Town is offering most liberal discounts for the early payment of Taxes and the taxpayer can save money by taking advantage of the discounts offered, even to the extent of borowing money for the purpose. If the taxpayer feels that he or she can pay the total amount of the 1933 Taxes before May 5th, then 7% will be allowed, if the first and second instalments are paid at this time then 5% will be the amount allowed, and 3% will be allowed for the payment of the first instalment. Of course, no discount is allowed on arrears of taxes

The Town Treasury is faced with very heavy demands upon it at this time. For instance, the bank must be repaid for the loan with which the Town has been carrying on, Debenture payments, principal and interest, are coming due, the School Boards are demanding money to carry on their various institutions, besides which the several departments of the Town (Waterworks ,Fire and Light, Streets, etc.) must be maintained.

Your Town Council is doing all in its power to reduce expenses to the minimum and earnestly requests the hearty co-operation of the taxpayers by the prompt payment of Taxes.
