The trustees held a special meeting last Friday night, when finances generally were discussed. It was decided then to serve notice on the staff that existing contracts would be cancelled, and that new contracts for the next term would be issued preference to be given to members of the present staff. The board will reduce the staff at the Central school by two teachers, if this is found possible in September, and for the present will engage only 14 teachers, as against 16 now in the employment of the board.
