THREE TOWNS COULD ARRANGE A MEASURE OF DAYLIGHT SAVING

Daylight saving is a live topic in Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard, with the former place committed to the scheme and the last named reported to be considering it. Haileybury has so far done nothing in the matter but it is expected that it will be discussed at the next meeting of the town council on Tuesday, May 9th.

The Haileyburian has always been in favor of daylight saving. We do not believe that the disadvantages incurred are of sufficient importance to outweigh the undoubted advantages.

Arguments for and against are too well known to bear repetition now, but we believe that a petition circulated in town would show a great majority in favor of the plan, particularly in conjunction with the other two towns. Would it not be wise to get an expression of opinion in this way, before the council meets, and present it to that body? This would give the municipal heads something to work on and would give the public an opportunity to state their wishes definitely.

GOES TO CITY FOR FUNERAL OF EX-SOLDIER SON-IN-LAW

Mr. Jas. Dey of Haileybury, went to Toronto on Friday evening, having been summoned to the city on account of the death of his son-in-law, G. A. Pollard who died in a sanatorium on Thursday, April 27th. Mr. Pollard was an ex-soldier, a former member of the 3rd Battalion, C.E.F., who was gassed during active service in France during the great war. He never fully regained his health after his war service and for the past year or two no hope was held for his recovery. He is survived by his widow and three children. The funeral was held in Toronto on Saturday, April 29th.

TIM MARLEAU

Many Haileybury people will read with regret the following account of the death of a former resident, taken from The Porcupine Advance of last week. Mr. Marleau was a well known citizen of this town for some years:

"Tim Marleau, a well-known and highly respected resident of the North Land, passed away at the Timmins Hospital on Monday afternoon. He was seventy-three years of age and had relatives in North Bay and Detroit. He came to Haileybury in 1907 and was in real estate there until 1910. Then he came to Golden City to work for a real estate syndicate composed of S. Alfred Jones, Marty Walsh and Charles McInnis, present chief of Tisdale. He remained here until 1917 when he went to Detroit. About three years ago he came back and set up a real estate and later a transfer business in South Porcupine but a few months ago on account of ill-health he sold out here, but when well enough again was often around in his own jovial friendly way among citizens, seeming to thoroughly enjoy the rest and freedom from business after a long life of honest, upright dealings. The funeral was held under auspices of the I.O.O.F. at the United Church, South Porcupine.

Prominent Mining Man Dies At Kirkland Lake This Week

Word reached Haileybury on Tuesday of the death of L. B. Smith, prominent mining man of the North Country and assistant manager of the Wright-Hargreaves Mine at Kirkland Lake, who passed away on Monday from pneumonia. He was well known among the mining fraternity, having been in charge of operations at the Barry-Hollinger and other properties in the north for several years, and had been with the Wright-Hargreaves for over two years.

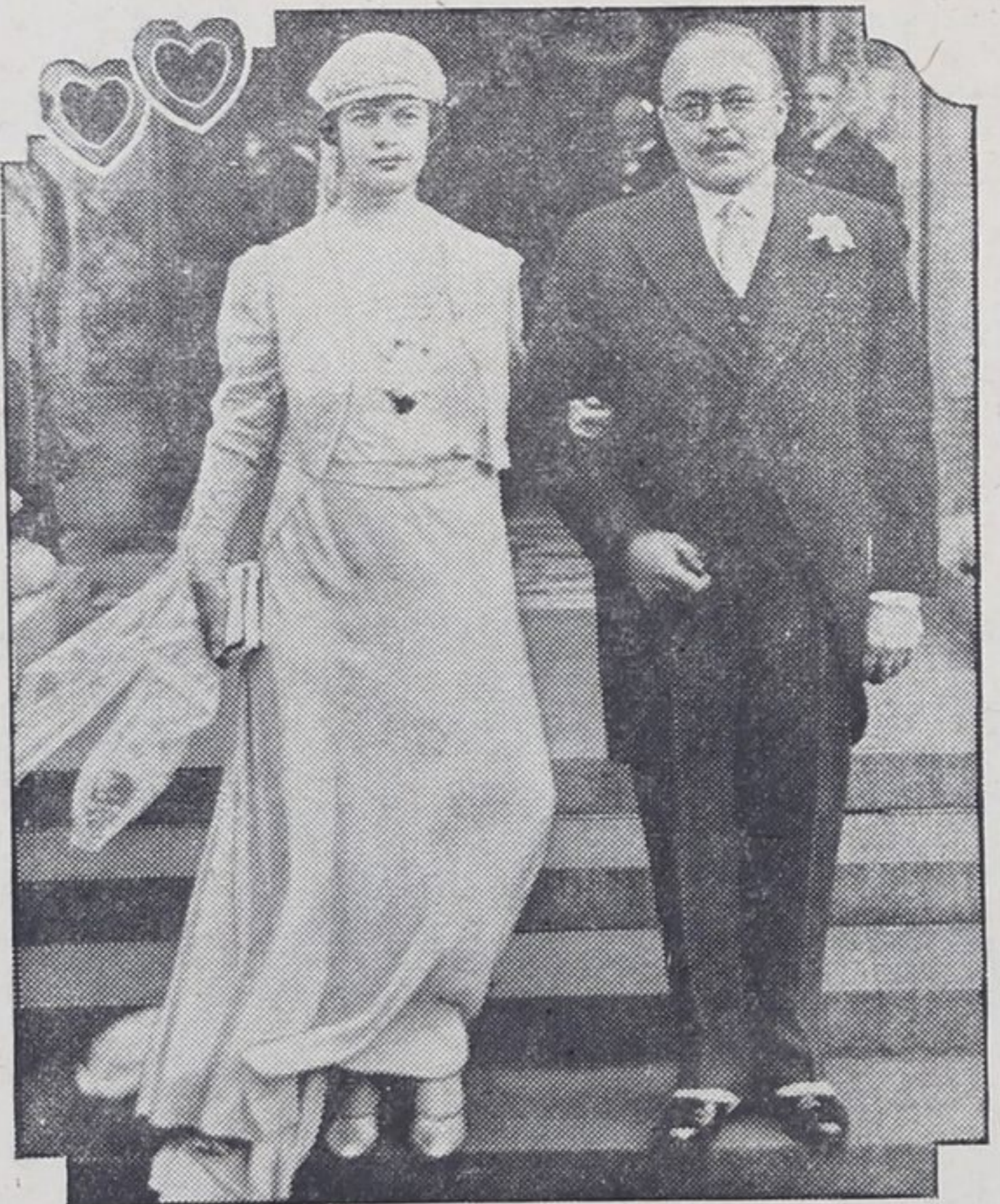
