

Dozen Readers Guess Date of Ice Going Out

Lake is Declared Open on May 7; North Wind Sweeps Clear at Early Hour Sunday

An even dozen readers will receive their weekly copy of The Haileyburian and Cobalt Post for the next 12 months free of cost, as a result of the annual guessing contest on the date of the ice going out of Lake Temiskaming. The date is May 7th, 1933, named by Wm. Bulger, who for a good many years past has acted as the official referee of the contest. Eight of the lucky guessers are residents of Haileybury, the majority regular subscribers to the paper. Three of the other four live in Cobalt, and the twelfth is L. W. Herron of Noranda, Quebec, who is a former resident of this district. The list follows:

Mrs. Stephen was among the winners last year and is the only one who has repeated. Only three on the entire list are new subscribers, all the others being among our old friends who have taken the paper for years, or are members of their families, and some of them have been trying the contest annually over a long period. Those who are already on the mailing lists have had their due dates advanced one year, while the new ones have been added as paid up subscribers until May, 1934. This is in accordance with the rules of the contest and, inasmuch as there is no entry fee and very few rules and regulations, there is no appeal from the decision of Mr. Bulger, who is very conscientious in observing closely the action of the ice when it begins to break up. In the present instance, he states that the wind which blew the lake clear commenced to blow strongly after 1.30 on Sunday morning and that early in the day the lake was well free of ice. The date is just three days earlier than last year, when the lake was clear on May 10th, and is just around the average for the time that definite records have been kept. BEAUTIFUL DISPLAY OF FLOWERING PLANTS AT HAILEYBURY HOME

The home of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Pickard, Latchford Street, Haileybury, this spring contains one of the finest displays of flowering plants that it has been our privilege to see. This consists of about a dozen different shades and colors of calceolarias growing in great profusion and with some of the most pleasing combinations of colors that one could imagine.

These plants have all been grown from seed raised right in the Pickard home and for some weeks past have been the delight of all who have viewed the display. Better and bigger blooms have been secured by using the home grown seed. Mr. Pickard says, and the plants are large and healthy. The flowers are of a large cup-shaped variety, with abundant foliage. They remind one to some extent, of a species of orchid, but are not of that family, according to Mr. Pickard, whose success in growing them is the envy of many residents of Haileybury.

Cobalt Separate Schools Will Reduce Staff by Two

The staff at the Cobalt separate Schools will be reduced by two teachers next term, it is indicated there. The intention, according to one member of the school board, is to cut off one teacher at each of St. Patrick's and St. Therese's schools, leaving five members on the staff at each institution. Financial reasons are given for the prospective reduction, it is stated in Cobalt. At present, there are 513 pupils enrolled at the two schools, of whom approximately 275 attend St. Therese. This enrolment represents a slightly higher number than at the public schools in the same school section.

than 20 who named May 5th as the likely date and a couple of dozen who would have been lucky if the ice had hung on until Monday, May 8th. The whole contest involves neither skill nor foresight, as no one can accurately forecast the weather for three weeks in advance. The closing date, April 12th, has been fixed because one year the lake was clear on that date. This was in 1910 and was the only time that the ice went out before April 25th during the period from 1893, of which we have a definite record. Last fall the lake froze over on December 8th, which was 19 days earlier than in 1931.

To the winners of the contest, congratulations; to those who tried and failed, better luck next time. The usual announcement will be made in March of next year.

Watch, Car and Bag Sold To Meet Funeral Expenses

An auction sale to meet funeral expenses was held in Cobalt last Thursday afternoon, when an automobile, a club bag and a watch were sold for \$228.50. The proceedings were handled by H. E. Blackwall in pursuance of a court order issued at the suit of Thorpe and Branchaud in connection with the funeral of Otto Niemi, who died suddenly in Cobalt recently.

Action taken to recover from deceased's wife, who lives in Flin Flon, and George Mitchell, K.C., acting for a Manitoba lawyer, protested against the sale on the ground the articles seized were part of the estate, but the sale proceeded. The timepiece fetched \$5.50, the club bag \$8.00, and the car \$215, all the purchasers being Finnish compatriots of the deceased, who attended the sale in large numbers. The car, an old model which had been driven 14,000 miles, was taken away under its own power after the sale.
