New Furnace Installed in Haileybury Assay Office

Improvements made at the Haileybury Assay Office this George, who pased away May 10th, spring, by J. W. N. Bell, include 1921. the installation of a new furnace, construction of which entailed the bringing from Denver, Colorado, several large pieces of a specially prepared tile of a very high heat-resisting quality. The furnace is constructed of concrete, steel and fire-brick with the linings and arches of the special tile, the latter made to Mr. Bell's own specifications of various dimensions up to 26 in. in length. In the shipping of the materials two arches were broken, but a couple of spares had been includd in the order so there was no delay in erecting the furnace. Mr. Bell looks for a busy season this summer as a result of the many new mineral discoveries which have been made, both in Northern Ontario and Quebec.

Bring Elk From Alberta to Burwash Industrial Farm


