New Furnace Installed in Haileybury Assay Office

Improvements made at the Haileybury Assay Office this spring, by J. W. N. Bell, include the installation of a new furnace, construction of which entailed the bringing from Denver, Colorado, several large pieces of a specially prepared tile of a very high heat-resisting quality. The furnace is constructed of concrete, steel and fire-brick with the linings and arches of the special tile, the latter made to Mr. Bell's own specifications of various dimensions up to 26 in. in length. In the shipping of the materials two arches were broken, but a couple of spares had been included in the order so there was no delay in erecting the furnace. Mr. Bell looks for a busy season this summer as a result of the many new mineral discoveries which have been made, both in Northern Ontario and Quebec.

Bring Elk From Alberta to Burwash Industrial Farm

Pursuing its policy of conserving and restoring native wild life the Canadian Government is arranging with the Canadian National Railways to ship to the lands of the Burwash Industrial Farm at Sudbury, Ontario a group of wild elk from the herd at Buffalo Park, Wainwright, Alberta. Ontario was formerly the elk's natural home but it retreated with the advance of civilization.

Make Good Time In Fire Drills at Town Schools

Mining School is Only One Where Test Not Satisfactory, According to Fire Chief

Fire Chief W. Bradley made an inspection of all schools in Haileybury yesterday morning and reports that in tests made under his direction almost all the pupils and staffs made good time in leaving the buildings. The exception was the mining school, where they made what he terms a "bad turnout" and where he has not made public the time required to get out. The chief says that either the alarm did not ring when it should have, or the students failed to hear it.

At the Separate school, 247 pupils left the building in 38 seconds, the best time made in the tests. All pupils and staff at the Convent, 143 in number, took 40 seconds, and the same time was required for the 284 at the High school. The Public, with a total of 309, was emptied in 60 seconds. These are all considered satisfactory by Mr. Bradley, who found all the buildings in good condition and free of fire hazards.

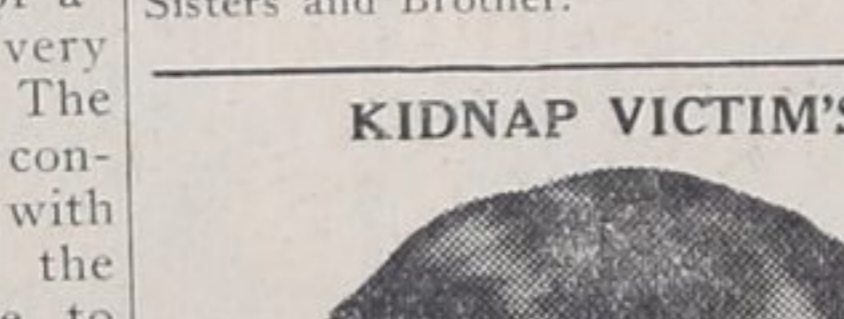
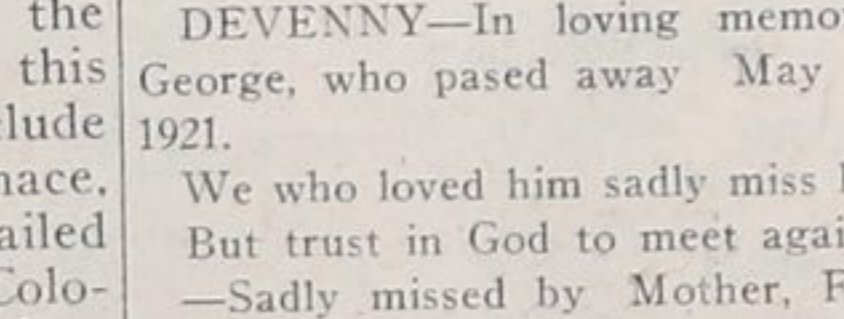
Miss Lucy de Bartholmeo

Presbytery of United Church Holds Meeting

Liskeard Minister Nominated as President of Toronto Conference

The Temiskaming Presbytery met in the United Church, Haileybury, on May 4th with the chairman, Rev. J. C. Hutton presiding. Rev. M. N. Omond of New Liskeard was nominated by the Presbytery as president of the Toronto Conference which meets in Toronto on June 7th. Lay representatives to Conference from the various pastoral charges were elected. Rev. A. Gillies and J. C. Hutton were nominated to the Settlement Committee of Conference.

A motion of appreciation of the work of Miss Annie Bradley, missionary on furlough from Angola, West Africa, was passed by Presbytery. Mrs. Fairley, who is president of the Temiskaming Presbyterial in speaking to the court, urged the need of closer co-operation between the Presbytery and the Presbyterial. The opening devotions were led by Rev. P. S. MacLennan and Rev. M. N. Omond.

The Missionary and Maintenance Fund report was given by Rev. E. Gilmour Smith. The Presbytery approved of the suggested plan of a "Cent-a-Meal" which the head office is sponsoring, and urged its adoption by every congregation. The Home Mission Committee which reported by C. A. Byam approved of the Sustenance Fund of the Conference whereby an appeal is made to the ministers of self-sustaining charges to contribute to a fund to augment the salaries of those ministers where there is a serious deficiency. Rev. Wm. Mair gave the report of the committee of Evangelism and Social Service.

The report of the Summer School was given by Rev. Harvey Howey. There is still a mortgage on the site at Camp Lorraine of \$311. It is hoped that the churches and Young People's Societies will clear off this mortgage so that plans may be made to erect a dining pavilion in time for use this summer. A motor tour is planned of a concert and publicity party who will visit the northern towns of Kirkland Lake, Timmins, Cochrane, Kapuskasing and others.

The Book Review of the Presbytery centred on a notable book by Dean Inge, "Christian Ethics and Modern Problems", under the leadership of Rev. M. N. Omond. Sections of the book were discussed by Revs. Harvey Howey, W. A. Beecroft, Wm. Mair, A. Gillies, E. Gilmour Smith, T. J. Jewitt and Scott Milley. It was decided to hold the September meeting of Temiskaming Presbytery in Charlton United Church.

Miss Frances Cameron, who has been a member of the staff of the public school at Cobalt for some years, has notified the trustees she will be resigning her position at the close of the present term.

Haileybury in 1923

Items from the Files of The Haileyburian of Ten Years Ago
Owing to the fire last fall and the consequent disorganization of Haileybury, all voters will be required to register in order to become eligible to vote in the provincial elections in June.

Plans and specifications for the new St. Paul's Church have been completed and tenders are being asked for the erection of the edifice, which will replace the old St. Paul's on Rorke Avenue and Browning Street.

The sum of \$538 has been donated in Haileybury to assist residents of Cochrane in their fight against the epidemic of typhoid which has swept the Northern town.

A large shipment of plants, roots, bulbs, etc., has been received by the Haileybury Horticultural Society from the people of Smith's Falls, for distribution among the members who had their gardens destroyed.

A start has been made on the erection of the new Masonic Temple, on the site of the former Methodist Church on Main Street.

Work commenced this week on the foundations of the new public and separate schools.

W. H. Alderson, chairman of the Ontario Fire Relief Committee, with Dr. Routley and other members of the committee, are in the district on their final visit of the fire-swept area.

Efforts are being made to have the Children's Shelter in Haileybury rebuilt and, in the meantime the Children's Aid Society is caring for several homeless children to the best of its ability under adverse conditions.

Saw Three Deer While Motoring Up the Highway
