### Plan Christmas Celebrations at Children Shelter

Director's of Children's Aid Society Held Monthly Meeting Monday of this Week

The monthly meeting of the Directors of the Children's Aid Society for the District of Temiskaming was held on Monday, December 18, in the writing room of the Hotel Haileybury.

The Treasurer's report showed that due to a very generous donation from the Haileybury Branch of the Society of \$185.00 during November, the Shelter was able to reduce its deficit. He also stated he had received a very generous contribution from Temiskaming Preceptory, Knights Templar, of \$50.00 during December. This was an annual gift from the Masonic fraternity, evidence of their tangible interest in the welfare of the children at the Society's home.

The maintenance cost per child per day during the month was shown to be 86 cents.

From a consolidation of the Superintendent's accounts for the period November 1, 1932 - June 30, 1933, and of the Treasurer's account from July 1, 1933 - October 31, 1933, it was reported to the meeting that the average expense per child per day was \$1.005 for the year, offset by income of 87c per child per day.

The Superintendent gave a résumé of his activities during the month and the Matron's report showed the children to be all in good health with excellent school attendance.

The House Committee indicated their plans for the customary Christmas celebrations for the children at the Shelter, to which the lady members of Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard would lend their assistance.

The Directors are especially grateful for the kindly interest which the ladies continue to show in the children at the Shelter, and felt their efforts might be supplemented by an appeal to anyone similarly interested to become members of the Society at the nominal fee of \$1.00 per year. Membership tickets may be obtained from the Secretary, Mr. J. A. Rutan, the Superintendent, Mr. J. R. McCracken, or any one of the Board of Directors.

Participation as a member, as the President, Canon Hincks, pointed out at the annual meeting a month ago, brings to every one "those profits we seek for which are to be found in the happiness and well-being of children."

### Lots of Fun for Big Gathering at Turkey Stag

Annual Event Well Patronized and Charitable Work Gets Helping Hand

There was plenty of fun provided for a large gathering of men, and the charitable work of the Knights of Columbus got a helping hand, when the annual turkey stag was held on Thursday night last in the K. of C. Hall, Main Street.

The fun started with the opening at eight o'clock and continued well into the morning hours, with everyone present apparently thoroughly enjoying the entertainment provided and with many securing their Christmas turkey by this means and incidentally having the satisfaction of helping materially towards ensuring that all Haileybury people will have something in the way of luxury for the festive season. The Knights have their own charitable work, which they perform faithfully each year, and in addition they turn over a large contribution from the proceeds of the stag to the Christmas Cheer Fund, which is for the general care of the needy ones in the community.

The entertainment provided at Thursday's stag was along the usual lines, with perhaps a bigger and better minstrel show than has been seen in the past few years. The first part of the evening was spent with card games, in each of which there were turkey prizes. Players had the choice of several games, euchre, bridge, etc., and there were no vacant places at the tables. The minstrel show commenced at 10 o'clock and kept the crowd in roars of laughter for over an hour. The artists were Les. McFarlane, Ernie Fortin, W. Lettner and Harold Woodhouse, with E. Ethier as interlocutor, and their songs and witty sallies, in which several well known citizens figured, were received with great applause.

At the close of the show there were further contests, with turkeys as the prizes, and a large number of birds was thus disposed of. Free lunches were available throughout the evening and the whole event was a highly successful one.

To N. Morissette, who as usual was at the head of the organization for the event, goes considerable credit for his good work both on this and previous occasions, when the needy ones have greatly benefitted from the stag.

### Criminal Cases At Assizes are Ended Saturday

One Conviction Brings Three-Year Sentence; Three Found Not Guilty

Verdicts of Not Guilty in the last three criminal cases to be heard at the Assizes of the Supreme Court here, were returned by the various juries under Mr. Justice Garrow, before the sittings of the court concluded at 12.40 p.m. on Saturday last. The first case to be tried had brought a conviction of wounding against Kosi Douhyj, on Wednesday, and he was later sentenced to serve three years in Kingston Penitentiary. The crime was committed in Kirkland Lake, the home of the accused, who is a Ukrainian by birth.

Adore Bouchard faced a charge of manslaughter following the death of Robert Bowman, in New Liskeard, when the latter was struck by a motor car driven by the accused, late on a dark night. Another charge of manslaughter and criminal negligence had been entered against Marshal White, driver of a truck which killed a small boy in Kirkland Lake, while the third case was also a charge of manslaughter, the accused being W. T. Selmer. He was charged following the death of Carl Jumice, a former bank clerk, injured in an alleged drunken brawl last June. In the trial of the latter case, some stir was caused in the court when a witness, Maurice Mondoux, fainted in the box and had to be carried from the court room and given medical attention. Dr. G. A. Cowie of Kirkland Lake, attended him and would not allow him to return to complete his evidence. The tragedy out of which the charge arose occurred following a dance at Cuiver Park, Swastika, in June last and the victim died after a fall on a sidewalk. The jury was only out 15 minutes before returning their verdict of not guilty.

Back home again after an absence of eight months, the Royal Scot, British flyer that has carried a story of England from one side of this continent to the other, reached London recently aboard the Canadian Pacific freighter Beaverdale. The crack British train has travelled 6,000 miles by sea and about 14,000 miles by land, since last April.

### FOUND PONTOON FROM PLANE WHICH CARRIED ASHLEY AND NICHOLLS

A radio announcement by the Toronto Globe on Tuesday night stated that a pontoon from Bert Ashley's aeroplane, in which he and Jack Nicholls disappeared on Sunday, December 10th, had been found on the shore of Lake Ontario near Port Dalhousie. It had been seen by Ashley's partner and co-pilot, Millar, who was conducting a personal search by plane of the shores of the lake for traces of the missing men, and when he examined it he was convinced that it had come from the missing machine. This apparently removes all hope that might have been held for the eventual return of the two flyers, and friends of Bert Ashley here have become convinced that he could not possibly have survived.

### Horses Drowned While Crossing Lake at Night

Farmer From Fabre Loses Team While Bringing Sick Wife to Hospital Here

A wide crack in the ice of Lake Temiskaming, about a quarter of a mile from Haileybury and on the roadway that has been marked out from Ville Marie, was responsible for the loss of a team of horses on Monday night. J. Larochelle, a farmer of the Febre district, Quebec, was driving across and bringing his sick wife to the hospital here, when the team went through the crack in the ice during the darkness and wind storm. The sleigh, one of the familiar covered ones used on the ice roads, did not break through and there was no great danger of the occupants being plunged into the icy waters, but the team perished.

Larochelle was following the line of trees which mark the road and was apparently unaware of the crack in the ice. Those who have been driving on the lake recently have found a safe place to cross, but as it was about 8.30 at night when they got near the shore, they could not see the tracks of other teams which took the detour to avoid the opening. Adelar Blanchard, Haileybury teamster, who was crossing a short distance behind Larochelle, tried to assist the latter to get the horses out. They managed to hitch a chain to one of the animals and had it partly hooked up onto the ice when the chain broke and both horses sank further and had to be given up.

On Tuesday morning the dead animals were hauled out and the harness salvaged, but the loss is a heavy one. One of the animals belonged to a neighbor, from whom it had been borrowed to make the trip. Mr. and Mrs. Larochelle were accompanied by their daughter and the party spent the night in Haileybury.

The crack in the ice which caused the trouble extends as far as can be seen up and down the lake. It is something that occurs every winter, but it is seldom that a team goes through. It is said to be wider than usual this winter and it is only at certain places that there is a safe crossing. One of these, which is being used, is closer to the Haileybury wharf than where the road was originally marked out.
