

Cobalt Juniors Take Game Here With 7-5 Score

Haileybury Junior Squad Mainly of Juvenile Age, but Show Promise of Making Smart Team

Cobalt Juniors broke into the win column Tuesday night when they took a 7-5 decision from the Haileybury boys, after a tidy tussle.

The local squad numbers five of last year's Tuxis Juveniles and all five of the boys acquitted themselves in first class style Tuesday evening. As a matter of fact, they accounted for four of the five goals scored by the locals Orville Hughes notched three and John Valentine the other. The fifth counter was scored by Denys Moriarity on a pass from "Bud" Peacock. Clark got three of Cobalt's seven, with Holland, Croteau, McCarthy and Jackson, netting the others. The one credited to Jackson was something of a fluke. The big Cobalt defence man let one fly from just inside the blue line, which was high, struck the screen back of the goal, landed on top of the twine and Belanger, trying to clear, pawed it into the mesh.

Haileybury opened the scoring in the second minute when Hughes sneaked in for a snap shot which fooled Dixon completely. Croteau then came down and fired one from the blue line which Belanger looked bad on, the puck hitting his pad and just dribbling into the mesh. On a nice combination play midway in the frame McCarthy scored on Holland's pass. The balance of the session was keenly contested, but the goalies had settled down and no further scoring took place. Cobalt going in to rest with a 2-1 lead.

The Miners made it 3-1 three minutes after the second period opened, but Valentine and Moriarity reduced the lead at the half-way mark. Then Tom Jackson got the fluke one, followed two minutes later by Clark to make it 5-2 for Cobalt. Moriarity and Peacock combined just before the bell to cut into Cobalt's lead.

In the final frame Hughes further reduced the gap on a nice goal, and Haileybury swarmed in for some minutes, making it hot for the visiting lads. Clarke broke away and made it 6-4, and play alternated from end to end for several minutes before Hughes whipped another in for Haileybury. Clark ended it with a goal, from close in, with but a couple of minutes to go and though the home youngsters tried hard they could not get a break, both Derragh and Sullivan being robbed when right through.

Eleven penalties were handed out by Referee Harry McKnight, but they were all minors, and mostly for accidental trips. Cobalt drew six to Haileybury's five.

Cobalt Seniors opened the tri-town league schedule last Thursday evening at New Liskeard, handing the Farmers the short end of an 8-6 score, and it was a typical early season game, with no combination efforts to mention, and quite a lot of bunching and hockey of the shabby variety. The first period was very close, with Liskeard having somewhat of an edge, but Cobalt had the second frame all to themselves and piled up a lead, 6-3. Liskeard came back to make it 6-5, but their defence failed and let the Cobalters through for two tallies late in the period. Cobalt had Stoughton in goal, with Moore and Zanin in front of him to start, Andrews later coming on to release Moore for forward line duty, and "Shorty" went through for four goals. He was aided by Rorke with two. Fisher, Pellette, Nadeau, Croteau and Wright were the other forwards, with Fisher being the most likely looking. Liskeard started Gibson in the nets, Sullivan and Galoska on defence, Miller, Hendry, Eastman as one line and Bonani, Anderson and Lott as the other. They did not have an extra defence man. W. E. Bagshaw handled the game well.

The opening of the Junior schedule took place at Cobalt on Saturday evening, with New Liskeard group champions doing their stuff, handing out a 9-3 defeat to the homesters. Honors in the opening stanza were fairly even with Liskeard coming off for the first breather in front 3-2. They tallied four times in the second frame without reply from the Cobalters, and ended up with two in the final chukker while the Miners got one. The Liskeard No. 1 line, Frost, Morris and Allan were too good for the silver town lads, and the defence gave Helmer plenty of protection. Liskeard looks to be headed for the group title, and with additions from Cobalt and Haileybury, should just about give any Junior outfit real trouble.

Haileybury and Cobalt Seniors played 70 minutes of hockey on Monday evening in the silver town without breaking the deadlock, 5-5, and the game was just that even. Haileybury opened the scoring in the first frame, when Mart O'Grady dented the twine. Carl Hutt tied it up before the close of the session. In the second canto Bob

Valentine tied it up again and Burton put Haileybury back in front, but just before the gong Moore snapped another home for Cobalt. There was no score in the first five minutes of the extra period, but Pellette netted shortly after they changed ends, and in the dying seconds of the overtime, "Spud" Valentine came through for Haileybury to get an even break.

Cobalt added considerable strength to the line-up from their first tilt, having Hutt and Thorne on defence and Andrews in the net. Rorke Pellette and Fisher made up the first string forward line with Moore, Nadeau and Wright on the alternate line and Zanin for reserve defence duty.

Haileybury had St. Louis between the posts, Renaud and Beckett in front of him, with Dempster, Hasset and O'Grady doing the starting stuff up front. They were relieved by Poppleton, Valentine and Burton, with Mc-

Cracken for extra defence work.

Wilfred (Shorty) Redvers (Red) and Gerald Green, Alex. McKinnon, Sam Rothschild, Steve Yankoski and Joey Ironstone of Sudbury, Freddie Faught, Copper Cliff, Carl Palangio, North Bay, Harry McKnight, New Liskeard, and Eddie Carmody, formerly of Haileybury, but a Pembroke boy, have all been recommended for amateur cards, and will likely receive them as Christmas present from the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. The matter now rests in the hands of Bill Fry of Dunnville, poohbah of amateur hockey, and the genial Willum will likely see that the cards are O.K'd.

Liskeard and Haileybury Seniors are the attraction at the local arena this (Thursday) evening, and it looks as though it will be a peppery game.
