To Instal Plant at Albany River Mines, Limited

Will Develop Property in Pickle Lake Area; First Discovery In That Locality

A mining plant capable of sinking a shaft to a depth of 1,000 feet is to be installed immediately on the property of Albany River Mines Limited, in the Pickle Lake area, Patricia District according to John W. Morrison, M.E., of Haileybury, president of the company and in charge of development at the property. Mr. Morrison spent the past two weeks here and left on Tuesday evening for Pickle Lake, taking with him a small crew of men from the district to commence operations in preparation for the installation of the new plant. The machinery and equipment, comprising approximately 120 tons would be freighted in from Savant Lake by the Starratt Transportation Co., Mr. Morrison said over winter roads and it was expected to have the plant in operation in May. About 25 men will be employed during the installation.

It was on the property of the Albany River Mines that the first gold discovery in that area was made, in 1927, by "Hardrock" Smith and the late Lorne Howey. The property lies to the east and slightly north of the Pickle Crow, and at one corner almost adjoins the latter. There is a highgrade showing on the surface where an ore chimney has been uncovered, according to Mr. Morrison, and a diamond drilling campaign carried out last fall disclosed ore in sufficient quantity to warrant the installation of the plant and the sinking of a shaft to 1,000 feet. All new equipment is being secured. An exhaustive report on the property, made by John A. Reid was recently sent to the shareholders of the company.

New York Seeks Extradition Of Timmins Miner

Application Heard Here Before Judge Hayward; Hon. W. A. Gordon for Defence

The application of the State of New York for extradition of Rosario Gigliotti, arrested in Timmins on New Year's Eve for the Niagara Falls, N.Y., police and alleged to have committed a murder in that city in 1928, was heard before Judge Hayward at the court house here on Thursday afternoon last, with the result that His Honor reserved judgment. The crime of which Gigliotti is accused arose out of the death by gunshot wounds of Mrs. Carmello Carla, on January 3rd, 1928, and it is claimed by authorities that he was a former boarder in her house. He was arrested by Provincial Constable John Pretorius.

At the hearing last week, Hon. W.A. Gordon, K.C., appeared with W. O. Langdon of Timmins, on behalf of Gigliotti, while Clifford R. Magone of the Attorney-General's department argued the case for the State of New York. Constable Pretorius was the only witness heard, and depositions of other witnesses submitted by the State were attacked by defence counsel, who argued that no prima facie case existed through the affidavits. Mr. Gordon said he had never seen documents from a foreign country in such a "hopeless, helpless state."

Several cases were cited by Mr. Magone to support his claim that there was sufficient evidence against Gigliotti to grant extradition, among them that of Martin Insull. He maintained that an indictment found by the grand jury constituted a prima facie case, but Mr. Gordon argued that the State of New York should be asked if it had any other evidence to submit. Objections were made to the constable's evidence on the ground that admittedly no warning had been given to the accused, and Mr. Magone dropped his examination. His Honor said that he agreed with the defence that there was nothing but circumstantial evidence, but asked if that might not be strong enough to grant the application.

Gigliotti has been held for some weeks in the district jail here where he is still confined pending the outcome of the hearing.

Schumacher and Mud Lake Now Joined by Radio

McIntyre Mine in Daily Touch With Operations in New Quebec District

The following is from the Porcupine Advance:

"It isn't a matter of days now for communication between the head office of a mine and its newest prospect; within a few minutes the president can know exactly what conditions are at a property hundreds of miles away. Or the manager of the new mine may ask for advice, supplies, or anything he wants and have the order at the head office within a few minutes.

C.Y.S. Schumacher, the McIntyre mine's 100-watt transmitter, is the latest addition to the radio communication network that is bringing Canada's North closer and closer in touch with the business world. CZSL, at the McIntyre-owned Mud Lake property a 50-watt station, makes the other end of a two-way communication system that makes it possible to carry on a two-way telephone conversation between Schumacher and Mud Lake.

The whole equipment occupies less space than the average office desk. The broadcast set, placed in one corner of a small room in the storehouse at McIntyre, is only about a foot square and five and a half feet high. A nickel-plated microphone takes the central spot on a desk-like table.

James Jarvis, operator of the station, came to Schumacher a couple of weeks ago from Ottawa where he operated an amateur station for some time. He goes on the air three times a day; a telephone call is made four in the afternoon to send any messages that may have accumulated for Mud Lake station and to receive any they may have to send. The three-times-a-day schedule has so far proven satisfactory for the needs of the mine. Two frequencies have been allotted for the stations, 4,860 kilocycles and 3,222.5 kilocycles, to make the two-way conversation possible.

The equipment was designed and installed by Dominion Skyways and is similar to that used by the Skyways' for communication with their aeroplanes and bases throughout the North. The McIntyre stations are used for business only.

Late A. R. Gordon Played Hockey In Haileybury

Manager of Royal Bank in Bogota Died Unexpectedly on Sunday Last

Word was received yesterday of the unexpected death on Sunday, February 16th, of Mr. A. R. Gordon, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Bogota, Colombia.

Mr. Gordon, who has been associated with the Royal Bank of Canada since 1903, served for some six years in the Credit Department at Head Office, Montreal, for a short time in the Supervisor's Department at Toronto and also at Elmira and Haileybury.

Mr. Gordon has had extensive experience as representative of the Royal Bank in South America. He went to Montevideo, Uruguay, in 1919 and between that date and 1924, served in succession at Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo. In 1925, he was transferred to Manizales, Colombia where he eventually became the manager in 1929. He was appointed manager of the Bogota branch last August. Mr. Gordon is survived by his wife and three children.

A good many people in Haileybury will recall Mr. Gordon, who spent some years here. Among his activities was a keen interest in hockey and he played on the local team for a season or two.

Local Men Get Mill Contract for Rouyn Mine

P. M. Fleming and J. E. Grant to Instal 200-Ton Plant at Stadacona-Rouyn

A contract for a 200-ton mill at the Stadacona-Rouyn Mines was completed here on Monday evening between officials of the mining company and two local men, P. M. Fleming and J. E. Grant, and work is to start immediately on the project. The mining property is situated in the township of Rouyn, Quebec, about a mile and a half from the town of the same name, and there has already been considerable development work done with promising results on the property. Satisfactory arrangements have been made for the financing of the mill and further development.

According to Mr. Fleming, work on the machinery, about 80 per cent of which will pass through his shops here, will commence immediately, and it is expected that the mill will be in operation about the middle of July next. The crushing plant will have a capacity of 400 tons and the building will also provide for an increase in the capacity of the whole mill at a later date as the mine is developed.

Mr. Fleming is quite confident of the Stadacona-Rouyn making good. Some two months ago he and Mr. Grant examined the property and found sufficient ore in sight to justify the mill, he said. Since then a new vein has been discovered through diamond drilling from a crosscut, lying some 60 feet from the one on which the original development work was done. This has been opened up for a distance of 50 feet, shows an average width of 20 feet and assays over \$20 per ton in gold.

Roy Anderson, secretary and director of the company, with J. J. Nivor, another director, were in Haileybury on Monday to complete the contract with Messrs Fleming and Grant that evening. Mr. Fleming says that the handling of the machinery through the local shops will mean work for a considerable number of men for some months. The shipping facilities over the tracks of the former Nipissing Central Railway, maintained now by the T. & N.O., will enable the shops to handle the big contract easily, according to Mr. Fleming.

C. N. R. Earnings Upward Trend

Gross revenues of the all-inclusive Canadian National Railways System for the week ending Feb. 7, 1936, were \$3,005,083, as compared with \$3,000,290 for the corresponding period of 1935, an increase of \$4,793.

Hydro-electric power production in Canada reached a new high record in 1935 with a total of 23,404 million kilowatt hours, an increase of 10.6 per cent over 1934.

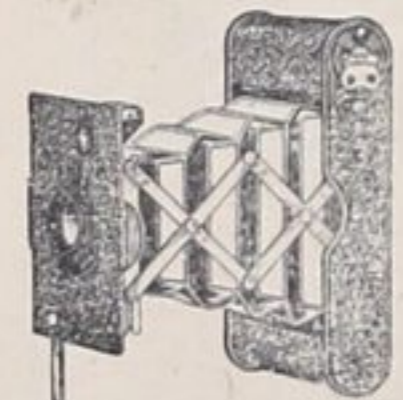

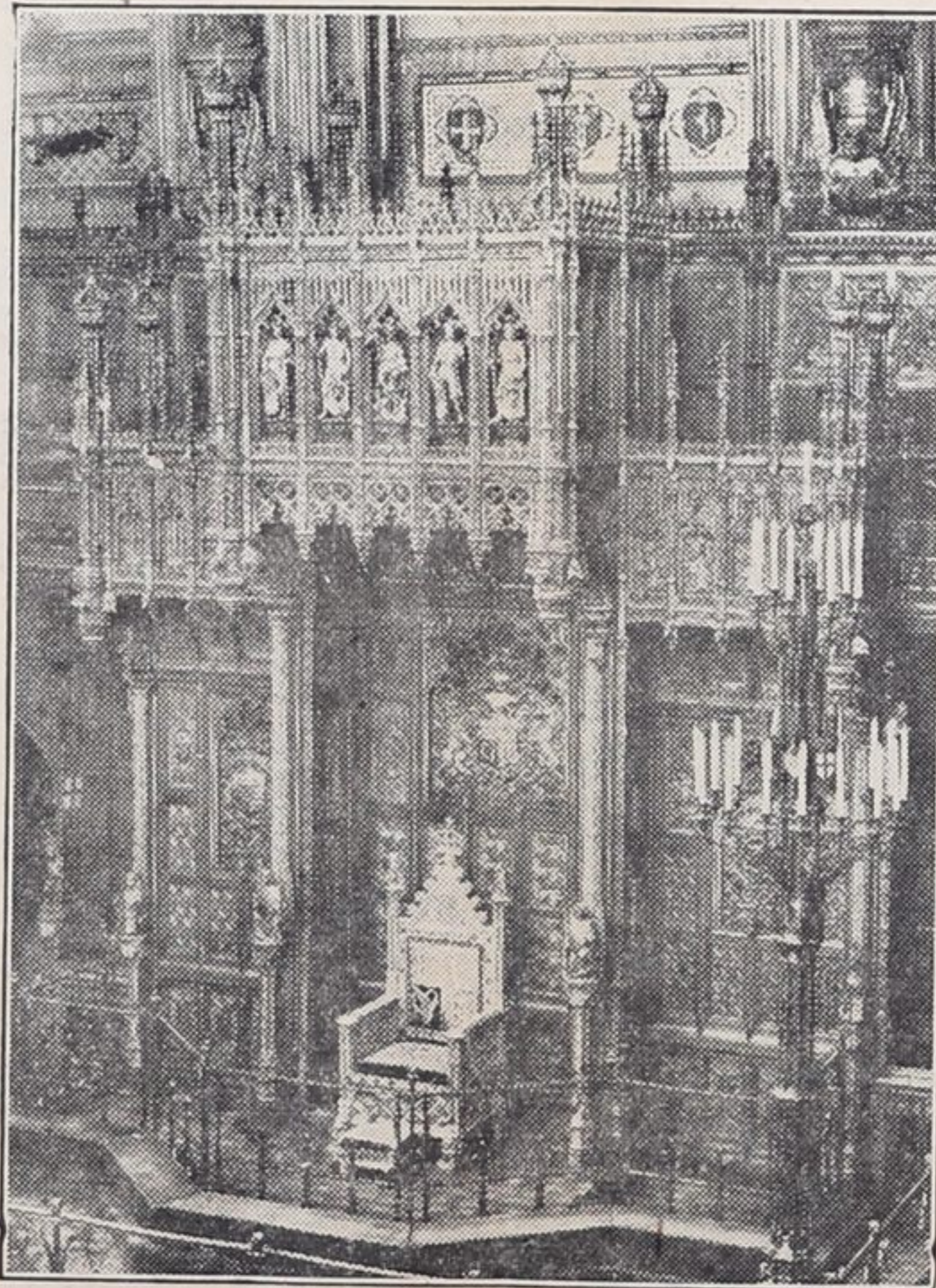


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ONE THRONE IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS
