



PREMIER KING OPENS THE MACOUN MEMORIAL GARDEN AT OTTAWA





BRITISHERS MAKE BOLD BID TO CONQUER EVEREST



The new administration building at the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa which was opened by Premier W. L. Mackenzie King a few days ago. This new building was named the William Saunders building in honor of a man who contributed more to Canadian agriculture than any other man in the history of the Dominion. The chain of Dominion Experimental Farms and Stations across Canada is virtually a monument to the work he began 50 years ago, and the new building above stands upon the site of his former home.



The greatest challenge to the physical resources of man remains Mount Everest, haughty queen peak of the Himalayas, which towers 29,000 feet above sea level. Months of preparation and training went into advance work necessary before the British expedition could take off from its base at Gamtak, Sikkim, India. Hugh Rutledge, is leader of the expedition which comprises several famous explorers and mountain climbers, including J.M. Scott. Avalanches, monsoons, blizzards and the rarified atmosphere are obstacles which have cost the lives of explorers attempting to scale the peak.
