Plan Air Mail Service Haileybury to Mud Lake

An Ottawa despatch to the daily press late last week said that it had been announced by the Post Office Department that an air mail service between Haileybury and Mud Lake, Quebec, will be inaugurated about July 20. The service would be twice weekly, the report said, in each direction. Haileybury has been a distributing point for the new gold camp since operations commenced and the Dominion Skyways maintains a service regularly, with Pilot D. F. McDonald stationed here.

Noranda Takes Two Big Events At Tournament

Local Brigade in Fourth Place in Annual Struggle of the Smoke Eaters

Noranda Townsite fire brigade won both of the main events in the annual tournament of the Temiskaming Firemen's Association, held yesterday at South Porcupine. In the wagon race they made the record time of 50 and four-fifths seconds, carrying off the banner for the third year in succession. New Liskeard was second in this event, making the run in 52 3-5. Noranda Mines ran third and Haileybury fourth. The time of the local brigade was 55 2-5 seconds.

In the ladder race the time of the winners was 15 2-5 seconds. Rouyn second at 15 4-5, Liskeard third at 16 2-5 and Haileybury fourth in 18 seconds flat.

There were nine brigades competing, which made it difficult for a fair test to all, the later ones having to run on wet ground and with a tired team. In the wagon race Haileybury was drawn in sixth place.

The local brigade, under Chief Ken Watson, drove up on Tuesday evening, and returned during the night Wednesday, arriving home at three this morning. Chief Watson said that there was faster time made in the main event than is usual and he did not believe that the figures had ever been equalled in the history of the Association. The tournament drew a large crowd and was a success in every way.

Find Body of Man Missing Since December Last

Believe Farm Hand Took Short Cut Across Thin Ice; Inquest Held Here

The body of Alfred Henry Head, who had been missing from the farm of his employer, Frank Pettit, three miles from New Liskeard, since last December, was found in Lake Temiskaming on Friday evening last. The discovery was made by George Broderick, an employee on the farm of M. Mason, in the same neighborhood.

At the time of Head's disappearance it was believed that he had tried to cross the thin ice on the bay in taking a short cut on his way home, and apparently this belief was the correct one. Provincial Constables Walker and Harper of the local headquarters investigated his disappearance at the time.

The body was brought to Haileybury and an inquest held Saturday afternoon, under Dr. W. C. Arnold, coroner, when a verdict of accidental drowning was returned by the jury. At the inquiry evidence was given by Mr. Pettit and H. Preedy, New Liskeard shoemakers, who was, it is believed, the last to see the deceased alive. Head had called at his shop on the night of December 11th, Mr. Preedy said, and had got a pair of rubbers which had been left for repairs. He had left at about eight o'clock and there had been no further trace found by the officers.

When the body was found, a bearskin coat was floating nearby and it appeared that he had been carrying it when he broke through the ice, which was only partly formed over the bay at the time.

The mother of the deceased, who lives at 338 Carlton Street, Toronto, was notified, and arrangements made for the funeral to be held here. Rev. R. Haines of Haileybury conducted the services at the undertaking parlors of Thorpe & Branchaud, and interment was made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Mr. Head was 41 years old and unmarried. He had been a resident of the district for many years.

Judge T. M. Attle of North Bay died suddenly at the week-end while he was taking part in a parade of the Holy Name Society there. He collapsed from heart failure.

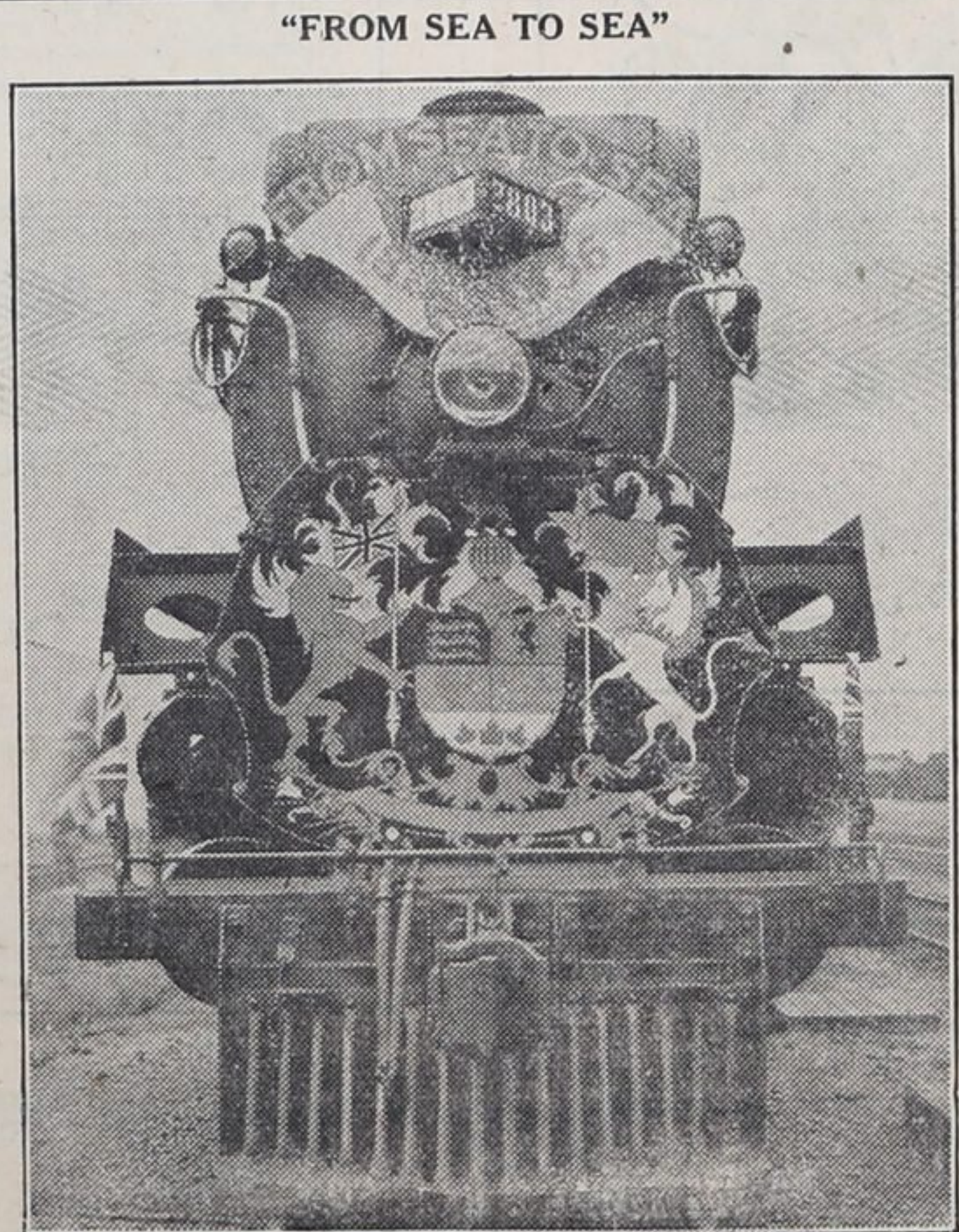
