Gold Camp Golfers Have Nice Margin for Return Match on August 30th

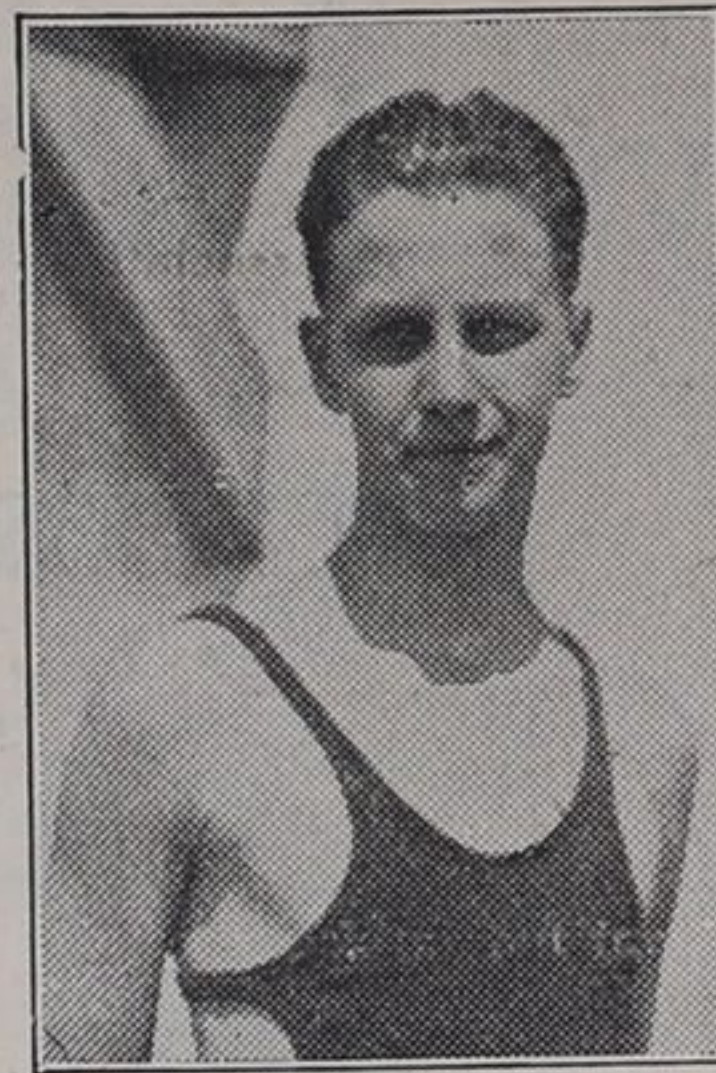
