North Bay Band at Sports Here on Wednesday Next

Rotary Club Completes Plans for Big Annual Aquatic Events at Beach and Wharf; Diving Exhibition, Motor Boat Race Special Attractions; Duck to Have Better Chance

With a brass band of 20 pieces coming from North Bay and with many other attractions booked the big annual aquatic event sponsored by the Haileybury Rotary Club will be held on Wednesday next at the beach and wharf here. Plans for the day are now complete and all that is needed is fine weather to make the event greater than ever, in fact it will be the biggest of its kind ever held in the North.

There will be swimming races for old and young, novelty races that will eclipse those of previous years and an added attraction in the form of a motor boat race, in which the speediest craft in the district will compete.

The band will arrive by special car on Train 47 and will parade to the Beach at 11.20, after which they will be taken to both New Liskeard and Cobalt for a parade through the main streets.
