THE VIMY MEMORIAL

While those who were lucky enough to go on the pilgrimage to Vimy for the unveiling of Canada's National Memorial to her war dead stood with bowed heads as the Sovereign of the British Empire withdrew the veil and revealed the noble pile, there were thousands of others whose thoughts were of the grim days that were being thus poignantly recalled. Thousands of ex-soldiers and relatives of those in whose memory the monument was erected would have been happy to take part in the ceremonies, but the best they could do at the appointed hour was to let their memory stray back to the dark days and to devote a little time to hope and prayer that those days might never be repeated.

In the belief that among our readers there are those who have not followed closely reports of the unveiling in the daily papers, we give here a portion of the King's speech, which best expresses the sentiments of the great gathering on Sunday last:

"We raise this memorial to Canadian warriors. It is an inspired expression in stone chiselled by a skilful Canadian hand of Canada's salute to her fallen sons. "All the world over there are battlefields, the names of which are written indelibly on the pages of our troubled human story. It is one of the consolations which time brings that the deeds valor done on those battlefields flict. Vimy will be one such name. Already the scars of war have wellnigh vanished from the fair landscape beneath us. Around us here today there is peace and rebuilding of hope. North Bay Tries to Hold Them as Long as Possible is Report; Haileybury Protests



The Weed Control Act States

Clause 5.—Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner, shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

Clause 23.—Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10, nor more than \$50, for every such offence.
