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THE VIMY MEMORIAL

While those who were lucky enough to go on the pilgrimage to Vimy for the unveiling of Canada's National Memorial to her war dead stood with bowed heads as the Sovereign of the British Empire withdrew the veil and revealed the noble pile, there were thousands of others whose thoughts were of the grim days that were being thus poignantly recalled.

In the belief that among our readers there are those who have not followed closely reports of the unveiling in the daily papers, we give here a portion of the King's speech, which best expresses the sentiments of the great gathering on Sunday last:

"By a gesture that all can understand, but soldiers especially, the laws of France have decreed that here Canada shall stand forever.

"We raise this memorial to Canadian warriors. It is an inspired expression in stone chiselled by a skilful Canadian hand of Canada's salute to her fallen sons. It marks the scene of feats of arms which history will long remember and Canada can never forget.

"All the world over there are battlefields, the names of which are written indelibly on the pages of our troubled human story. It is one of the consolations which time brings that the deeds of valor done on those battlefields long survive the quarrels which drove the opposing hosts to conflict. Vimy will be one such name. Already the scars of war have well-nigh vanished from the fair landscape beneath us.

"In that spirit, in a spirit of thankfulness for their example of reverence for their devotion and of pride in their comradeship I unveil this memorial to Canada's dead."

Claim Tourists are Advised Not To Travel North

North Bay Tries to Hold Them as Long as Possible is Report; Haileybury Protests

Two public bodies in Haileybury, the Board of Trade and the Rotary Club, have entered protests against what is claimed to be an unfair practice on the part of North Bay business men, who seek to hold the tourists from southern points as long as possible in the city and advise them against coming north over the Ferguson Highway.

The vexed question came up again last week, when members of the Board of Trade were told that at hotels, garages, etc., in North Bay, travellers were being told that the Ferguson Highway was in very bad shape and that they should not attempt to travel any further north. A letter to the North Bay Board of Trade brought a reply from the secretary, denying reports and giving replies from hotels, garages, oil companies, etc., all of which were to the effect that the road north was in good shape.

At the meeting of the Rotary Club on Monday, the same question was brought up and there was considerable discussion. One member who formerly lived in North Bay stated that there was no doubt that the tourists were being advised against coming further north and that the operators of camps were largely responsible. They paid men at the service stations to try to keep the visitors in the city as long as possible, and in one season had even bought over the operator of the Board of Trade's information bureau. Nothing could be gained by complaining to North Bay, he said.

The upshot of the discussion was a decision to write to Premier M. F. Hepburn and the Minister of Highways, placing the question before them and requesting that a large road sign be erected south of North Bay giving correct information as to the condition of the roads to the north of that city. If such a signboard was erected, and contained the information that the Ferguson Highway was in good shape, the Rotarians believed, it would be an added urge on the Department to prove the truth of the statement.

C.N.R. Earnings Continue Up

Gross revenues of the all-inclusive Canadian National Railways System for the week ending July 14, 1936, were \$3,513,275, as compared with \$3,506,396 for the corresponding period of 1935, an increase of \$206,879.

DOMINION STORES HAS INCREASED BUSINESS IN FIRST HALF OF YEAR

Sales of Dominion Stores Limited for the first half of 1936 show a marked improvement over the same period last year, according to the semi-annual report to shareholders issued last week. The company has cut its losses from \$370,570.80 in 1935 to \$36,992.41 this year. An increase of \$776,316.36 in the total sales, or 9.59%, is shown by the statement, which it is claimed is not represented by advancing commodity prices.

Otto Nerg, victim of a motor smash at 104 in which he suffered a broken back, is still alive in the Mines Hospital, Cobalt, but with no chance of recovery.

D. G. Allen, general manager of the Northern Ontario Power

Company, has been promoted to the position of general manager of the Canada Northern Power Corporation, Limited.

Haileybury's ball team kept up their record of losing on the local lot this season, when they succumbed to the visiting Liskeardites yesterday afternoon by a score of 10-1.

A moonlight excursion on the Steamer Temiskaming was held last night, when a large number of pleasure seekers spent a few hours on the lake. There was dancing on board and a general good time.

The Temiskaming Telephone Company reports the breaking of many insulators on its lines in the rural areas, believed to be chiefly caused by the throwing of stones and the firing of rifle bullets.
