Paragraphs Pertaining to Happenings of Interest During the Past Week

## \$60,000 for Highway

During the past week Messrs. W. G. Nixon, M.L.A. for Temiskaming and Walter Little, M.P. for the Federal Riding of Temiskaming, have visited both Toronto and Ottawa in an endeavor to get further consideration for our highway problems. We are pleased to announce that their trip was not in vain, as they received co-operation at both capitals which will permit of an additional expenditure of \$60,000, which will be applied to work on the Ferguson Highway north of New Liskeard and on to the northern mining fields.—New Liskeard Speaker.

## Hunting Knife Is Weapon

Henry Heranen of Timmins, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days in jail when he was convicted of carrying an offensive weapon, in the form of an unsheathed hunting knife, on a public street. He had no license to carry the knife and Magistrate Atkinson ruled that it would be all right in the bush, but not on the street. The accused claimed that he was a carpenter and used the knife in his work.

## Get Relief By Threats

Held prisoner in his room in Hanmer Hotel and threatened with violence if he refused, district relief officer D. Lorne Hennesy was forced yesterday to make out three relief vouchers totalling \$40 in value, he informed provincial police this morning. The result was the arrest of Ophir Lalonde and Honore Lalonde, brothers and A. Gascon, all residents of Hanmer, by provincial Constable Jack Truatsch and Earl Penner.—Sudbury Star.

## Sound Picture of Mines

A Timmins despatch sent last week said: "A sound picture of mines in the Porcupine district is now being made by the Dominion Bureau of Motion Pictures, and when completed will be shown all over the world. Workings of the larger mines in this region are being photographed and sound recording apparatus has been set up to catch the actual sounds of mining. The purpose of the project is to photograph the gold industry in all its stages. V. L. Eardly-Wilmot of the Department of Mines, is in charge here."

## Vacancy on Bench

North Bay, Sudbury and Gravenhurst lawyers are being mentioned as likely candidates for the vacant Nipissing judgeship, caused by the death earlier in the year of Judge T. H. Battle, which took place suddenly in North Bay while he was attending a parade of the Holy Name Society. J. H. McDonald, K.C., of North Bay, J. A. S. Plouffe, K.C., Sudbury, and E. W. Clairmont, K.C., Gravenhurst Crown Attorney, are the three names most prominently mentioned. It is considered unlikely that an appointment will be made before the Minister of Justice, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, returns from Europe in September.

## Quits Police for Undertaking

Provincial Traffic Officer E. J. Cleland, a member of the Ontario provincial police for eight years and the oldest traffic officer on the force, forwarded his resignation

to district headquarters at Haileybury.

Constable Cleland, an undertaker by trade, will enter the undertaking business in Sudbury. He has made arrangements to establish funeral parlors in the business section of the Nickel City.—North Bay Nugget.

## Dies From Suffocation

A despatch from Rouyn on Friday last said: "Lewis Jones, Johanes Township prospector, who came to town on Wednesday and intended to get back to his claims tomorrow, is dead of suffocation, caused when a cigarette he was smoking fell into the mattress of a settee in a room in the Lake Shore apartments and the heavy smoke, which came after he went to sleep, caused his death.

A discharge paper dated 1919 indicates that Jones saw service in the great war and he was quite prominent in the formation of the prospectors' association here being named on the committee."

## Temiskaming Pioneer Dead

The New Liskeard Speaker last week recorded the death of Thomas Chester, a Temiskaming pioneer, which took place near Toronto. He was 85 years of age and is survived by his widow, two sons and four daughters. Mr. Chester came to New Liskeard from Southern Ontario in 1894 and took an active part in the opening of the Clay Belt for settlement, lending valuable assistance to many of the farmers

in those early days. In 1906 he was appointed Homestead Inspector, for many years he was reeve of the Township of Dymond and an official of the Agricultural Society from its inception. A few years ago he retired and went to West Hill, near Toronto, where his death took place.

## Large Barn Burned

A large barn on the farm of John Burnett, on the North Road a short distance from New Liskeard, was completely destroyed by fire, together with 20 loads of hay and other produce and farm equipment. It is believed that someone may have gone into the building to sleep and accidentally started the fire. A small amount of insurance was carried.

With the closing down of the Trans-Canada airways depot at North Bay last Friday by the Department of National Defence, Kapuskasing has now become the

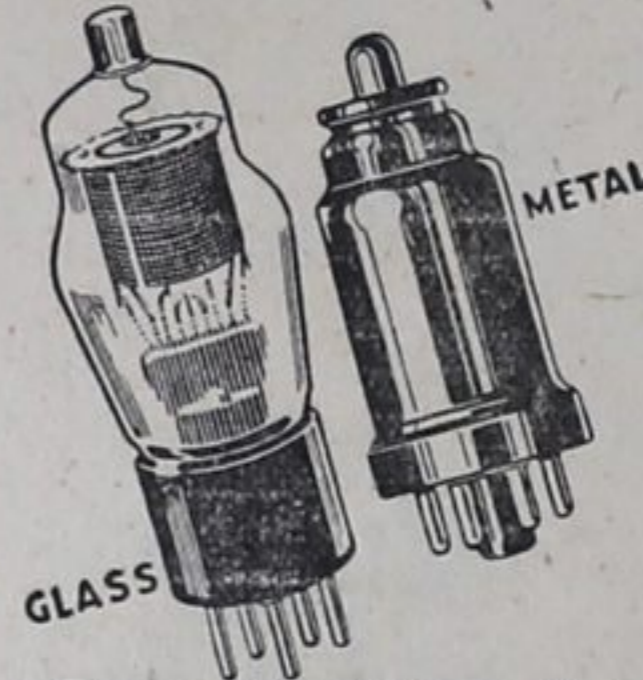
