Spruce Sawfly Found in North Reports State

European Species Discovered in Lorrain and Firstbrook Townships

The following is a Canadian Press despatch from North Bay to the Ottawa Journal on Monday of this week:

"Chief Forester W. B. Greenwood said today definite proof has been furnished that the European sawfly had invaded the North Bay district.

Species of the insect which threatens to destroy Canada's spruce supply have been found in Firstbrook Township, west of Haileybury, Lorraine Township, near Silver Centre, and McLaren's Bay, near Temiskaming, Que.

Both the European and native sawfly are now known to be in the district. A few weeks ago, it was thought the native species might have been mistaken for its European counterpart. Officials say it is extremely difficult to distinguish between them and only a microscopic examination by persons well versed in their characteristics can determine the identity.

H. S. Fleming, of the entomological branch of the Federal department of Agriculture, is in North Bay studying specimens and the extent of the infestation. It is not believed the native spruce sawfly is as damaging as the European variety."

The Department of Agriculture scientists are working at Ottawa and at the new parasite laboratory in Belleville towards plans for the checking the destructive insects by the means of parasites. It is believed possible to control the sawflies by this means in sections which have not become heavily infested, but the fear is expressed that they may eventually destroy the whole of the nation's spruce stands.

COPPER MEDAL FROM COLLEE IN MICHIGAN FOUND IN HAILEYBURY

A medal struck by the Michigan College of Mines a quarter of a century ago this month was unearthed recently by Geo. M. George, guard at the district jail here, who with a number of men was making some improvements at the rear of the Memorial Plot on Main Street. The medal is one struck to commemorate the quarter-centennial celebration and alumni reunion of the college, held at Houghton, Mich., August 8, 9, 10, and 11, 1911. It is composed of copper, the metal for which the Upper Peninsula of Michigan has been famous for

many years, and is still almost perfect.

When Mr. George found the relic he thought it might have belonged to the late M. B. Grover who, for some years following the big fire of 1922 lived immediately south of the Memorial Plot. Mr. Grover came to this district from the Michigan mining fields. The medal is now at the office of The Haileyburian and may be seen by anyone interested. One of our friends in the mining industry informs us that Harry Sparks and M. C. H. Little are both graduates of the Michigan College, and that the former attended the second alumni celebration at Houghton last week. If the owner of the medal should be here, Mr. George would be glad to hand it over.

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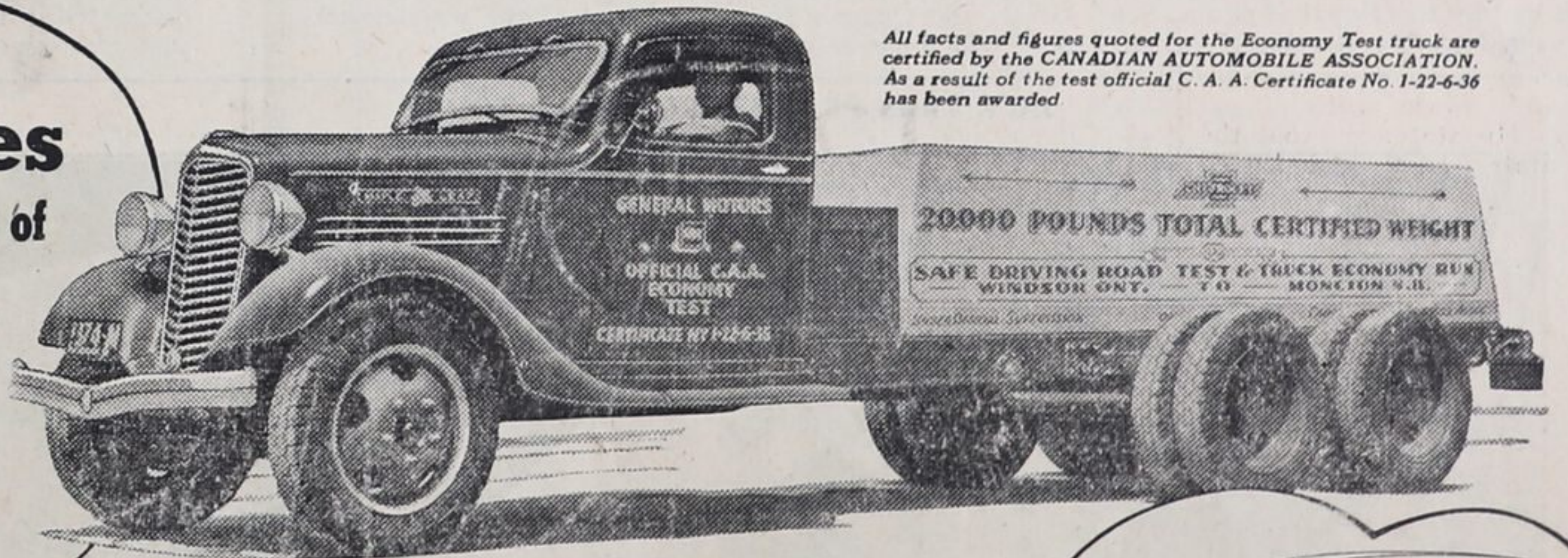
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
