On Saturday last, the local company of the Algonquin Regiment arrived home after their 10-day training period in Penetang. Now Have Good Motor Road Highway to Camp Lorrain

One road improvement carried out this summer in the district that has proved a great convenience is the new stretch built from the highway to Camp Lorrain, on Lake Temiskaming. This piece of road, built at a cost of around one thousand dollars by the Department of Highways, leaves the road to the Old Mission and winds through the woods to the camp. It has provided a much easier means of travel than the old trail previously used and, considering the amount of traffic between various district points and the camp, is an improvement that has been much appreciated. Some work has also been done on the Silver Centre road this year and the going is pretty fair now.

New Service Station to be Opened on Downton Corner

A new service station will be opened in the near future on the corner of Ferguson Avenue and Broadway Street, in the downtown section of Haileybury, by R. F. Richardson. The small office in the Broadway Theatre building will be utilized and there will be one pump on Ferguson Avenue and another on Broadway. Mr. Richardson has operated a station on Rorke Avenue, near the southern limit of the town, since last spring.

OBITUARY

EARL R. CRAVEN

Earl Randolph, only son of P. R. Craven, secretary-treasurer of the Northern Telephone Company and Mrs. Craven, M.B.E., died at the family home in New Liskeard on Saturday morning last, August 15th, 1936, after an illness of a few days only. He was 25 years of age, was a popular member of the younger set in New Liskeard and will be widely mourned by a host of friends in the district.

After receiving his primary education at the New Liskeard public and high school, Earl Craven went to McMaster University in Hamilton, where he graduated in 1932 with a B.A. degree. Later he took a course in the North Bay Normal School with the aim of qualifying as a high school teacher, and had secured a position for the coming school term. Active in church and musical circles, he organized the Baptist Young People's Society in his home town, played in the orchestra of Eric E. Smith and took part in many other activities of the community, where he was well liked and respected by all.

Surviving are his parents and three sisters, the Misses Jean, Nora and Rena, all of New Liskeard. The funeral, which was private, was held on Sunday, and the bereaved family have the sincere sympathy of a great circle of friends in the district.

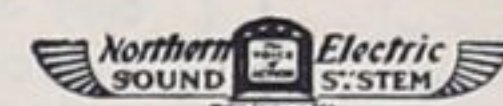
