Fast Growth of Maple

Reward for Wanted Man

A reward of \$200 has been posted by the Ontario provincial police for information leading to the arrest of John Gray, escaped Burwash prisoner. Gray is wanted for questioning in connection with the death of Marshall Johnson, a fellow prisoner.

Gray and Johnson escaped from the Industrial Farm six weeks ago. Two days after their escape Johnson's body was found on the shore of Rock Lake, near Paget. His skull had been fractured.

Quebec Mineral Production

The June bulletin of mineral production issued by the Quebec Bureau of Mines, when compared with the corresponding period of the previous year, reflects an increase in the production of asbestos, gold, lime and cement, but a decrease in the production of silver and clay products.

Want Burned Timber Cut

A despatch from Sault Ste Marie says: "The necessity of cutting timber immediately in fire-swept areas near the Sault is being stressed by the board of trade here, President A. R. Wood has announced.

Cutting of timber damaged by fire in the Parry Sound district has already commenced and the department of lands and forests will be urged to begin cutting timber damaged in the Ranger Lake area. It is claimed the timber will be worthless if not cut at once and placed in water. Woodworms are likely to attack it if this is not done.

The board of trade also claims that cutting of this timber would mean employment for a number of men. Hon. Peter Heenan is said to be in favor of the plan and it is known that estimators are at work."

Noranda Profits Higher

Noranda Mines, Limited, in its report covering the six months ended June 30, shows net profit of \$4,203,445, equal to \$1.87 per share, and compared with net profit of \$2,551,015, or \$1.14 per share for the corresponding period of 1935. For the period under review, 32,104,990 pounds of anodes were produced, against 39,833,528 pounds a year ago, while total recovery ran \$8,520,057 and \$6,659,335 for the two periods respectively.

New Red Cross Outpost

Last week the 27th Outpost Hospital, operated by the Canadian Red Cross Society in Ontario, was opened at Jellicoe amid much rejoicing on the part of the local residents and mine operators of the district. Jellicoe is situated on the C.N.R., 150 miles northeast of Port Arthur, and is the centre of one of Ontario's new mining areas, being the jumping-off place for the Sturgeon River gold field. For a year and a half the Red Cross Railway Hospital Coach, the "Outpost on Wheels", has been

date hospital equipment. Five beds are provided and Miss M. I. Sanderson has been placed in charge. Dr. F. W. Routley, head of the Red Cross Ontario Division, was present at the opening, which was celebrated by the holding of a reception and banquet.

Flying Game Warden

Next winter an aeroplane of the Ontario Forestry Branch will patrol the northern bush and the pilot of the machine, whoever he is, will be the first flying game warden in the history of the province.

According to Jas. Taylor, deputy minister of fish and game, the aeroplane will make its headquarters at the Sault, where the forestry base is now located, but

machine will operate under the direction of the fish and game branch.

There are game preserves near Sault Ste. Marie, also north of Blind River, in the Mississauga forest reserve, and in the Chapleau district.

"Trappers leave tracks in the snow that may readily be seen from the air," Mr. Taylor said. "If they are poaching on our preserves in the winter we'll soon get after them."—Sudbury Star.

No Blame Attached

At an exhaustive enquiry into the tragedy at Kirkland Lake, which claimed the lives of three miners last week, the whole circumstances were thoroughly investigated. The inquest, which was opened on Wednesday evening, was completed the following day, after an adjournment had been asked for by the foreman of

the jury, Allen Jack, who wished to clear up what was termed as "street talk" about the condition of the stope in which the men were caught by a rock fall. The result was the following verdict, as published in The Northern News:
