Building New Church

Work began at top speed this week in the erection of the new church for Catholics in the west end of Timmins. The new structure will be built at the corner of Main Avenue and Cameron Street and will serve the French people living on the west side of Mountjoy Street.

Rev. Father A. Chapleau has been in town for the past week and is busy supervising work on the new building of which he will be pastor.

The new church, which will be called "Our Lady of Lourdes," will serve some 800 families.

Improving Golf Course

In preparation for next year's activities, a crew of five men are at work at the Kapuskasing golf course, raking and leveling the fairways. The greens will be rolled and re-seeded this fall, and it is expected that when the first golfer tees off next summer, the course will rate with the best 9-hole courses in the province.

There are now 80 active members of the club, and an average of 25 golfers turn out daily. — Kapuskasing Tribune.

Assay Reports Encouraging

With the preliminary exploration work already under way at the Porcupine McNabb properties at Night Hawk Lake, in the Porcupine district, Frank J. McFarlane, president of the Porcupine McNabb Gold Mine, Limited, made public today the first assay reports from the diamond drilling conducted under the supervision of A. W. Grierson, mining engineer. These reports were so encouraging Mr. McFarlane declared, that an intensive campaign has been decided upon to thoroughly prove the property and to sink a shaft.

The drill samples from two different sections of the property assayed \$11.20 and \$39.00 per ton. — Porcupine Advance.
