Harvest Service Comes From Old Religious Usage

Annual Festival Observed in St. Paul's Church on Sunday Morning Last

That the holding of thanksgiving services at the close of the harvest was a custom centuries old among devout people of every creed, was the opening statement of Rev. Richard Haines, in his sermon on Sunday morning at the annual Harvest Festival of St. Paul's Church. From the custom of offerings in the Spring to propitiate the gods and thanksgivings in the Autumn for a bounteous harvest, had come our present-day harvest festival services, with gifts of the fruits of the earth. It was a reminder that our daily bread depended on God's providence, Mr. Haines said, and we should not stop at giving thanks, but bring gifts as did the devout people of olden times.

For the occasion the church was beautifully decorated with autumn flowers and leaves, together with many garden products which were later sent to the Children's Shelter. Evidences were many of a plenteous yield and abundant crops. The services included the special harvest ritual set aside for such occasions by the church, a shortened form of the regular morning prayer and the Holy Communion service. Harvest hymns and an anthem, "Ye Shall Dwell in the Land," by the choir, all went to make up a solemn observance of the occasion of thanksgiving and there was a large congregation present.

OBITUARY

WILLIAM PURDY JR.

The death of William Purdy Jr. aged 26, took place in the Cobalt Municipal Hospital on Friday last, September 18th, after a week's illness in the institution. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Purdy, residents of Cobalt for many years, and was born in Nova Scotia. A heart affliction was the cause of his death. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, with the service in St. James' Anglican Church, conducted by Rev. E. A. Irwin, and interment in Silverland Cemetery. Surviving are his parents, three brothers and two sisters.

W. E. SIMPSON, M.E.

After several years' illness, W. E. Simpson, well known mining man of the North Country, died in Toronto on Thursday last, Sept. 17th. He was 64 years of age, born in England and had spent his life in the mining industry, both in Canada and Australia. Mr. Simpson was well known to Haileybury people and often visited here during the years he spent at Swastika and Kenogami Lake. He was a member of Haileybury Masonic Lodge, Temiskaming Preceptory and of Rameses Temple in Toronto. He is survived by his widow and family.

ROBERT DICKSON CAMERON

Death came on Sunday last September 20th, to Robert Dickson Cameron, a well known and well liked resident of the North for many years, at the age of 50. His death was the result of a fall some four and a half years ago, in the Barry-Hollinger mine, of which he was captain at that time, when he suffered injuries that kept him an invalid ever since, although for a short time after the accident he had been able to work.

Mr. Cameron was born in Nova Scotia and followed mining during his whole life. He worked in Cobalt, was captain at the Keeley in Silver Centre and had spent six years as captain of the Barry-Hollinger when he met with the accident, a fall of 160 feet down a shaft. Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Mrs. T. Webster and Mrs. Calverley; and two sons, James and Colin. The funeral was held yesterday in Kirkland Lake, with the service in Trinity United Church.
