

# News Notes of the North

Paragraphs Pertaining to Happenings of Interest During the Past Week

### Fight Spruce Sawfly

In an endeavor to combat the ravages of the European spruce sawfly, found at different points in Northern forests, 300,000 parasites were released last week under the direction of the Forestry Branch at North Bay. Three sections were covered, one east of Martin Lake, in Gooderham township, another between Diver, at Mileage 40 on the T. & N.O. and Lakemiskaming and the third west of Latchford, near Lady Evelyn Lake. The parasites are part of the million and a half Hungarian wasps, imported for the purpose.

### Paralysis Bad at Soo

Sault Ste Marie and Algoma district have experienced something of an epidemic of infantile paralysis during the past few weeks. Last week the total number of cases reported was over 40, the majority in the city itself, with others from various parts of the district. The disease proved fatal in one case from the Manitoulin Island, the patient being a man of 23 years. Schools have been closed in some sections.

### New Liskeard Fair

The New Liskeard Fall Fair was held last week in the curling and skating rinks and, while not as large as a few years ago, was a pretty good show. The live stock exhibits have been considerably reduced from former years but there was a fine display of poultry and the grains and other products of the farm and garden were of fine quality, in spite of a somewhat unsatisfactory season. The lack of grants from the Department of Agriculture, which in former years helped greatly with the financing of the fall fairs, has had the effect of causing many towns and villages to discontinue these annual events, but in some places the Agricultural Societies have been able to carry on, on a reduced scale. The New Liskeard Fair, a few years ago, was one of the big events of the autumn, and it is hoped that it will in the future again reach its former proportions.

### New Bailiff Appointed

Mr. Harry Redmile of New Liskeard has notice of his appointment to the position of bailiff of the Second Division Court for Temiskaming, in the place of Basil Donoghue, who resigned some time ago. Bailiff Redmile is now carrying out the duties of his office.

### Fire Tragedy on Farm

Terribly burned about his entire body when he undertook to throw two gallons of coal oil into the fire in the stove in the kitchen of his home, Alfred Ayotte, a farmer whose property is located five miles south of Macamic, succumbed to his injuries at the Youville Hospital here early on Tuesday morning. The fatal mishap occurred about eight o'clock on Sunday morning. Taking a two-gallon can of coal oil, Ayotte opened the door of the kitchen stove and threw the contents into the firebox, where a fire was already burning, for the purpose, presumably, of helping the blaze along. The oil exploded with a burst of flame, igniting Ayotte's clothing.—Rouyn-Noranda Press.

McKillop, organizer for the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, told the council. He was asked to put the proposal in writing.—Porcupine Advance.

### Plan New Fire Hall

At a special meeting held yesterday afternoon, township council decided to call immediately for tenders for construction of a new fire hall on the township works

departments property south of the Kiwanis playground at the Duncan Avenue-O'Meara Boulevard. The building will be 45x48 feet, two storeys and basement and will have accommodation for the equipment, alarm system and sleeping quarters for seven.—Northern News.

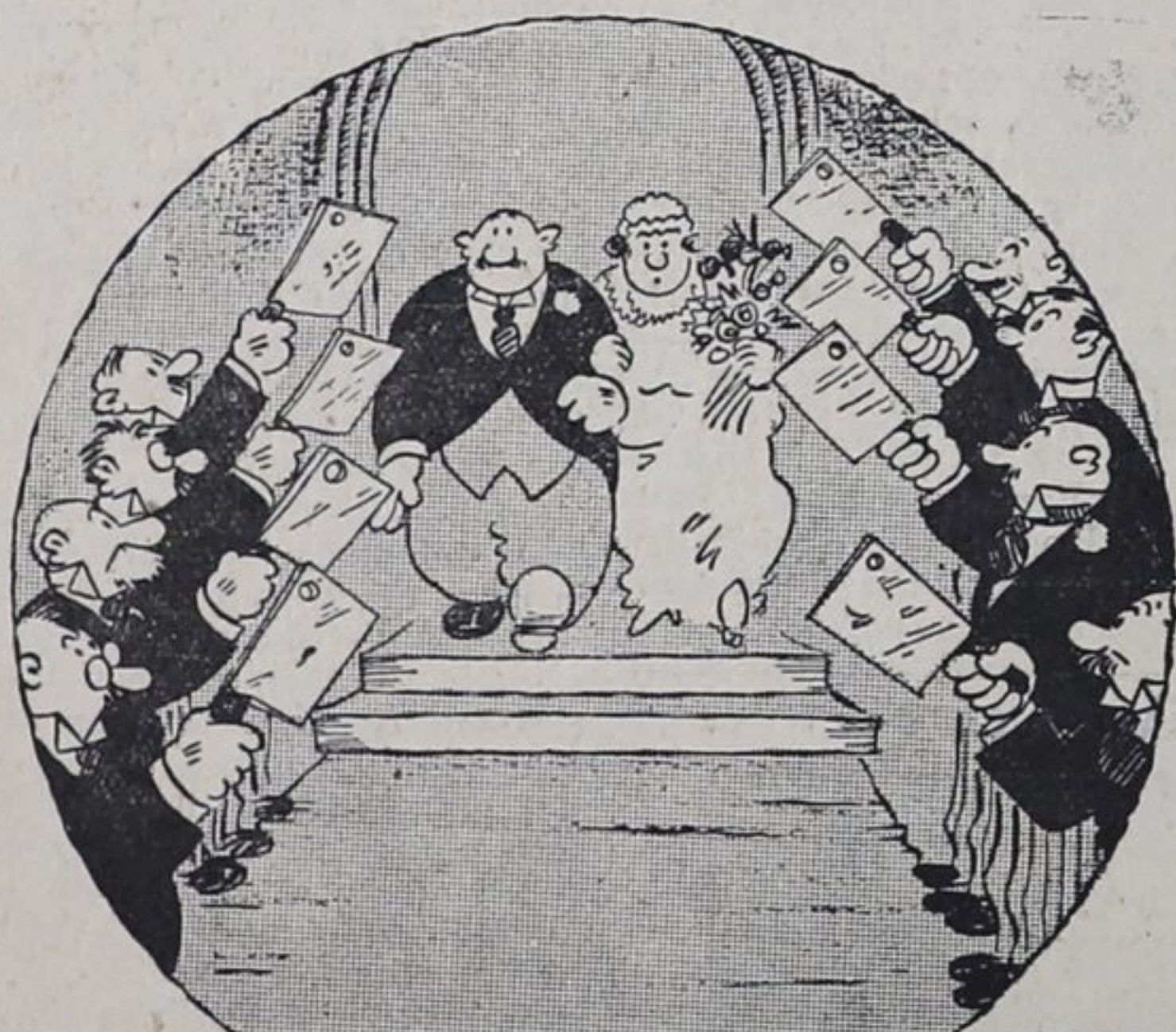
