

# News Notes of the North

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### To Edit Church Paper

Rev. G. R. Cragg, Minister of the United Church in New Liskeard, was elected to the post of editor of The New Outlook, the official Church paper, at the general conference held in Ottawa last week. Mr. Cragg is well known in the North Country as a man of world affairs. A couple of weeks ago he gave a timely and highly interesting address on "Foreign Affairs" to the Haileybury Rotary Club.

### Fatally Burned

When a metal pot spilled molten metal on his clothes late on Wednesday afternoon at the Copper Cliff smelter, Stefan Kanzich, 38, 136 Regent Street sustained fatal burns which caused his death at 2 o'clock yesterday morning at the Copper Cliff hospital. Kanzich was employed at the International Nickel Company smelter at Copper Cliff as a skimmer.—Sudbury Star.

### Bad Fire at Elk Lake

A Canadian Press despatch at the week-end reported a rather bad fire in Elk Lake, which destroyed two garages and five motor cars, with a loss of close to \$20,000. The garages, which stood close together were owned by J. A. McCracken of Elk Lake and Frank Findlay of New Liskeard. The fire was believed to have been caused by gasoline dripping from a leaking tank onto an electric bulb in the Findlay garage, according to the despatch and volunteer fire fighters were handicapped by lack of equipment and a high wind was blowing. Forestry department pumps were used at the Montreal River nearby to prevent the flames from spreading to other parts of the town.

### Held Communist Funeral

Tom Mocharuk, 52-year-old Ukrainian, who had been in Kirkland Lake for about ten years was buried yesterday in a Communist funeral from the Ukrainian Hall here. Mocharuk, who had been unemployed for the last year and was on relief, died on Friday in the district hospital here and at that time it was understood that he expressed a wish for burial by the Roman Catholic Church. Members of the Communist party looked after the expense of the funeral when they were told that the township authorities would not allow the Soviet ritual if the last rites were paid for by municipal funds as a relief case.—Northern News.

### Drowned at Mud Lake.

A Noranda despatch on Tuesday said: "Jack Hartley, employee of the McIntyre-Porcupine Mine, was drowned at Mud Lake on Sunday afternoon when the canoe which he was paddling overturned. Dragging operations were conducted but up until Monday noon the body had not been reported as recovered. A Dominion Skyways plane was ready to take off from Rouyn yesterday morning awaiting for favorable flying conditions to bring the body of the victim from Mud Lake into Rouyn, where an inquest will be held by Coroner Dr. J. L. Bouille.

### POWER RATES ARE CUT BY CANADA NORTHERN; MINES WILL BENEFIT

Canada Northern Power Corporation announced late last week from Toronto a reduction in the power rates to mines in Northern Ontario, amounting to \$2 per h.p. for all power used in mining operations up to 5,000 horsepower. It is estimated that the annual sav-

ing under the revised rates to the mines will be approximately \$150,000.

The new schedule calls for straight reduction of \$2 per h.p. per year for mines using 5,000

h.p., with a reduced scale for those using over that amount and up to 8,000 h.p. per year. A mine in the first class will thus have a saving on its power bill of \$150,000.

### Reckless Driving Charge Follows Highway Collision

As a result of a collision on the Ferguson Highway, in Dymond township north of New Liskeard, on Saturday night last, Taylor Watchorn of New Liskeard will face a charge of reckless driving

in police court at the week-end. His car collided with one driven by Richard Russell, both went into the ditch and were badly damaged, but there were no personal injuries sustained, according to Provincial Constable W. Byrne of local headquarters, who investigated the crash.
