

### Taylor Pipe Is New President of Curling Club

Enthusiastic Gathering Plans Season's Activities; May Tender for Arena

Taylor Pipe was elected president of the Haileybury Curling Club for the coming year, when the annual meeting of that organization was held in Hotel Haileybury on Thursday evening last. He succeeds Jas. E. Grant, who has held the position for the past two years to the complete satisfaction of the players, judging by the compliments paid him as he retired from the chair.

The new president's election was unanimous, the only other nominee, H. A. Seymour, withdrawing his name and immediately nominating Mr. Pipe. Mel Robb is the new vice-president and Alex Mosher was chosen as secretary-treasurer, with J. H. Murray as his assistant. The sponsors of last season's events and the immediate past president were named as honorary presidents.

Other officers of the club were named as follows: Referee, L. H. Ferguson, veteran holder of the position; Executive Committee, Dr. J. C. A. Crawford, B. V. Harrison, T. J. Duncan, W. Bulger, and Jos. Isherwood; Schedule Committee, H. G. Pickard, D. E. Sutherland and Mel Robb; auditors, D. H. Millar and J. A. Rutan.

There was some discussion over the question of operating the arena this winter, with opinion divided as to the advisability of again undertaking the job, but it was finally decided by resolution to leave the question to the executive. The meeting went on record as approving the submission of a tender to the town, providing a committee can be secured to handle the operation.

In handing over the chair to his successor in office, Mr. Grant spoke of the pleasure he had derived from the club and the honor conferred on him when he was elected president. There had been no friction, he said, and he felt that some progress had been made and they "had always had good times." The meeting passed a vote of thanks to him and the other retiring officers and directed that letters of appreciation be sent to the donors of prizes during the past season, and the thanks of the club were extended to the hotel manager for the use of the writing room for the meeting.

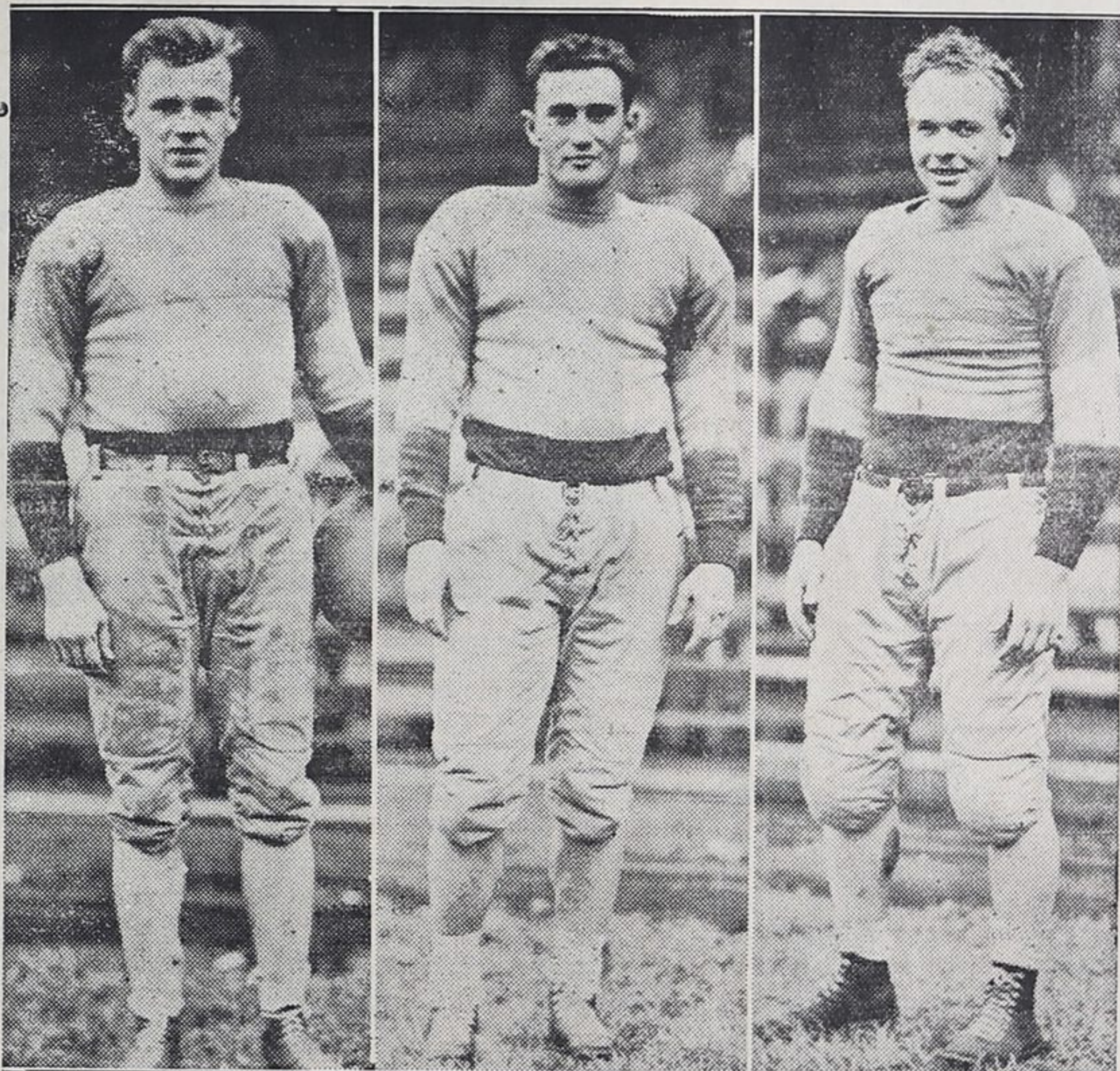

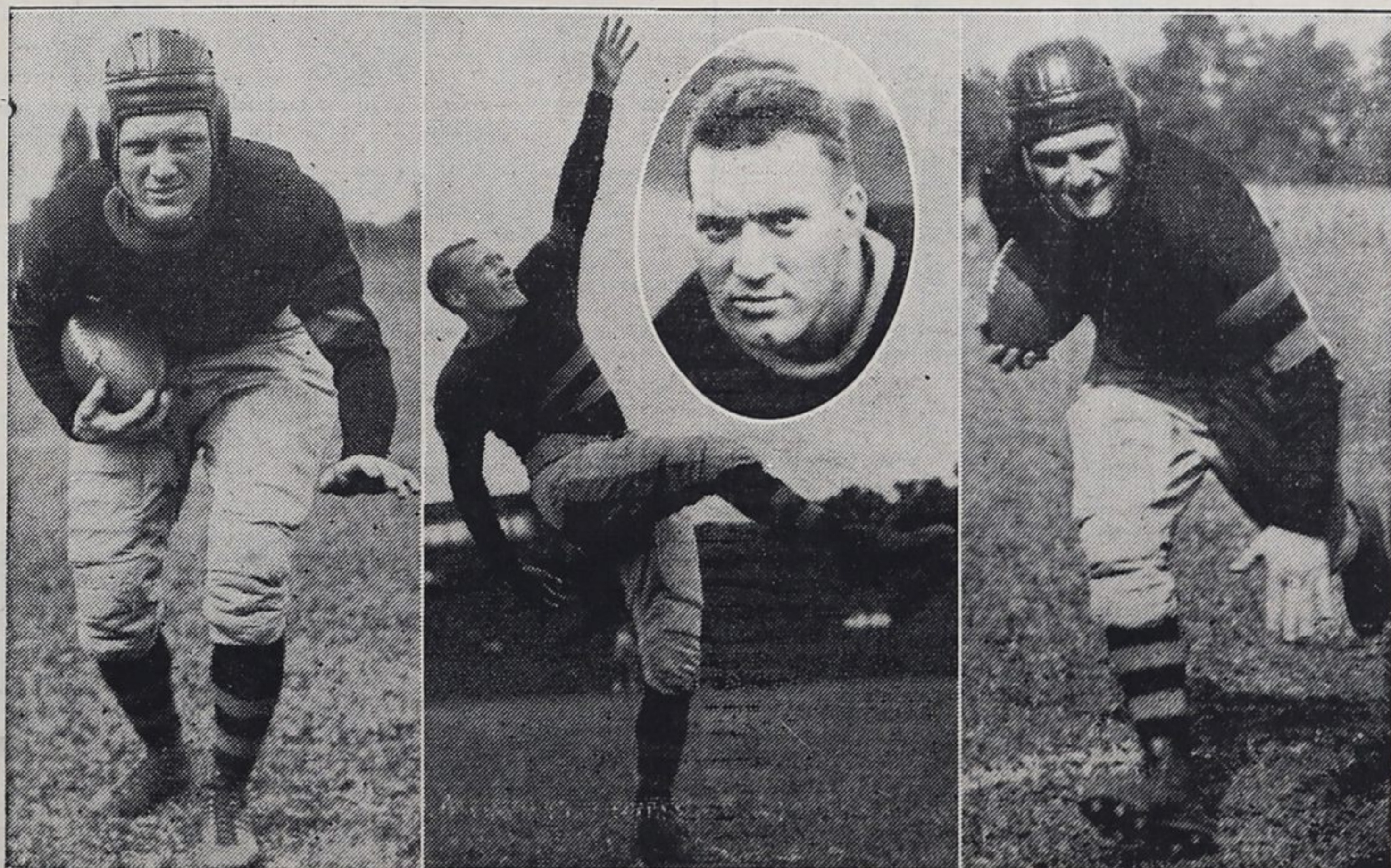
