**SENSELESS DESTRUCTION**

While there was no widespread damage caused in Haileybury by Hallowe'en pranks this year, one case of senseless destruction of property has been brought to our attention. A retaining wall above the sidewalk at a Georgina Avenue home, where the owner was absent, was partly torn down and some large stones left lying on the walk, a clear case of wilful damage. This was not done by small children, but probably larger boys with a perverted sense of humor.

No one objects seriously to the youngsters having a bit of fun on Hallowe'en. Local people are particularly patient in this respect and put up with considerable inconvenience in answering calls at the door and providing the usual treats, but when it comes to serious damage to property there is every reason to complain, and every reason for punishing the guilty parties if they can be discovered. It should be the duty of any citizen who may be in a position to give information to the authorities to come forward. There is no excuse for such actions, either on Hallowe'en or at any other time, and the perpetrators deserve no consideration.

It is disappointing, to say the least, to hear of this kind of deliberate damage being done. One had every reason to hope during the past few years that the worst phase of the festival was passing out, but it seems that there are still some irresponsible people, who, if they can be discovered, must be punished severely as a lesson to themselves and others.

**GETTING HELP WITH ROADS**

From all accounts we are going to get some help with our road question in the near future.

At least we have been getting considerable publicity during the past week. It started when the Toronto Board of Trade heard that there was some talk of a boycott of Toronto business houses by Northern merchants, because Southern Ontario was not giving the North the support that might be expected in the struggle for better treatment.

We are not quite sure where the boycott proposal originated, but we believe that the New Liskeard Speaker was the first to suggest it. Other newspapers in the North kept it before the public for a few weeks, until it finally reached the city business men who compose the Toronto Board of Trade. Last week every Board of Trade in the North got a letter in which it was suggested that, rather than lay the blame on Toronto alone, the North should present the question at the annual meeting of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade in Oshawa this month. This letter was given prominence in all Northern papers and the question will surely be discussed at the Oshawa meeting.

The Toronto Board is following up the question and not only in the newspapers, but on the radio one hears discussions of the proposed boycott. This is all to the good, and it may eventually result in better treatment from the Department of Highways.

Certainly there is justice in the demands for some improvement to the main highway into and through the North Country. Every motorist who comes up from the southern part of the province tells the same story, and Northern people know only too well what to expect if they attempt to drive south. The boycott proposal has certainly brought this condition to the attention of the city of Toronto, and it may be confidently expected that the business people there will do everything in their power to assist in getting some definite action on the part of the government.

**Haileybury in 1926**

Items from the Files of The Haileyburian of Ten Years Ago

Ten years ago this week The Haileyburian told of the burning of the Steamer Temiskaming, which had been plying the lake here for the previous 25 years. The boat caught fire while tied up at the Haileybury wharf and, after efforts of the fire brigade to overcome the flames had proved unavailing, was cut loose and allowed to drift out into the lake. The fire made an unusual display

and was watched by hundreds of local residents.

There were only eight appeals against the assessment made in 1926, according to a report of the court of revision. Nothing of a controversial nature arose and there were only slight reductions made.

R. H. McGowan of Cobalt was chosen as Labor-Progressive candidate for the provincial election, and will be backed by the Liberal party in accordance with an agreement entered into previous to the federal campaign.

About \$250 in money and stamps was taken from the post office at Guigues, Que., when someone broke into the store of A. Cote and rifled the till.

The memorial to the late Prof. Miller, at the station grounds in Cobalt, was unveiled by Hon. Chas. McCrear, Ontario Minister of Mines, in the presence of a large gathering.

There were over 200 people present at the Hallowe'en dance held in aid of the Children's Shelter at Hotel Haileybury, with the proceeds amounting to \$250.

Caught between the cage and the haft timber in the Keeley Mine, South Lorrain, George McIntyre, 21-year-old miner, was almost instantly killed.

A light fall of snow gave a touch of winter to the district this week and the weather continues very cold, with prospects of an early freeze-up.
