

Goes to Trial on Criminal Charge After Car Crash

William Conroy Committed By Magistrate; Other Cases at Police Court

William Conroy, driver of the car which is alleged to have struck a horse and wagon in Cobalt on October 17th last, killing the horse and breaking the leg of the driver, was on Friday last committed for trial on a charge of criminal negligence by Magistrate Atkinson in police court here. Through his counsel, Wm. C. Inch, the accused pleaded not guilty and elected trial before a higher court and, after evidence had been given by eye-witnesses of the crash, the committal was made. Conroy had been on bail for several days prior to the preliminary hearing and this was renewed on Friday. He will, it is expected, be tried before Judge Hartman at the fall sessions of the District Court.

Witnesses to the crash were Jas. Delanardi, who was on Lang Street with a truck at the time, and Ernest Nixon, who lives close by and who came out from his home when the horse ran away, following the wagon being struck by a passing motorist. Both were on the scene when the Conroy machine crashed into the horse and wagon, Delanardi being in the act of helping the driver, Fiorindo Zanin, to untangle the horse from the vehicle. He told the court that the car had been coming at a "pretty fast speed" and that no attempt had been made by the driver to stop. Mr. Nixon estimated the speed of the Conroy car as 40 to 45 miles per hour and stated that car, horse and wagon had all gone 40 feet before they had stopped. He had signalled the driver to stop, but no attention was paid to him.

At the same session of the police court, Chas. Clemens of the Elk Lake district, was committed for trial on a charge of theft and breaking and entering. Two rifles, two large butter crocks, a radio aerial and several other articles, claimed to be the property of a Mr. Stevens, were displayed in court and identified by him and other witnesses. Provincial Constable C. V. McClelland had arrested Clemens. A protuberance on the inside of one of the crocks was the centre of considerable interest, when Wm. C. Inch, for the accused, questioned closely a Mrs. Tacey, who had given the article to Stevens and was brought to court to identify it.

In another case heard Ludovich Bordeleau of Lorrainville, was fined \$10 and costs on a reckless driving charge, when evidence was given to show that he had forced the provincial police car, with the driver, Lloyd Lonsdale and Constable Wm. Byrne as passengers, off the road near New Liskeard Beach a few nights before. Bordeleau admitted having had difficulty in keeping his windshield clear owing to a fog but did not think he had been on the wrong side of the road. He denied any knowledge of a bottle of intoxicant found later in the truck by the police officer, but Rene Jodouin, who was a passenger with him at the time and who came from Mud Lake to attend the court, was fined \$100 and costs for "illegal possession" of the liquor.

Hallowe'en damage was reported as serious in only one place in Haileybury, according to Chief of Police MacGirr. The exception was the home of Mrs. W. J. H. Shillington, at the corner of Probyn Street and Georgina Avenue, where several large stones were pulled out of the retaining wall at the edge of the lawn and scattered on the sidewalk. Mrs. Shillington is out of town and there was no one in the house at the time.

In other parts of the town there were a few pranks played, the chief says, but nothing of a serious nature has been reported to him. He had a few deputies working during the night, as usual on the festival, and it seemed a quiet Hallowe'en. The rain during the night probably helped some, but the usual bands of masqueraders were out early in the evening with their demands for "Hallowe'en Apples" and all seemed to be having a fine time.

Stepping off the Toronto-Vancouver flyer at Cartier before the train had stopped this morning, Ernest Moore, 54, of Toronto, fourth cook on the crack express, slipped on the icy platform and fell beneath the wheels of the moving train. Both legs were badly crushed, necessitating amputation. The injured man was brought to a Sudbury hospital by a special train, made up at Cartier, and is receiving treatment there.

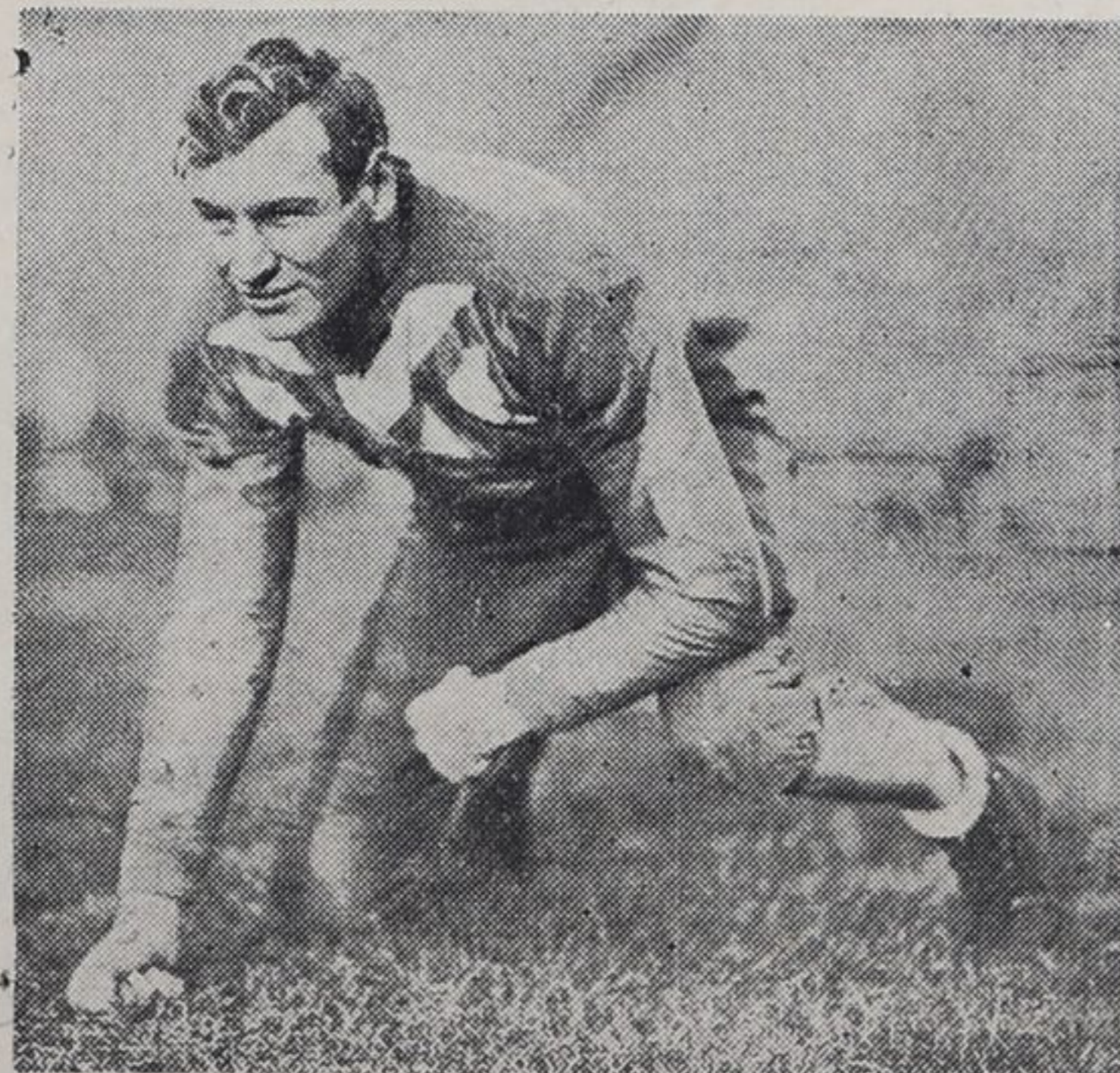
