

### Local Churches Join in Move for Evangelization

Hold Meetings in Three Towns  
Next Week; Clergy in Exchange of Pulpits

A "Service of Witness" in the interests of the movement for the evangelization of Canadian life, will be held next week in each of the three towns, Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard, under the auspices of the Temiskaming Ministerial Association.

The Association met in Haileybury on Monday, when plans were completed for the series of services, which will be attended by all the clergymen of the district. The ministers will exchange pulpits for these services, with at least one from outside the district taking part. This is Rev. D. C. McInnis, formerly of New Liskeard and now of Orillia, who will be the preacher at the Haileybury meeting.

The first of the series of services will be held in the Cobalt Town Hall on Wednesday next, November 25th, Rev. E. A. Irwin of St. James' Church presiding and Rev. Dr. T. E. Holling of New Liskeard delivering the address.

On Thursday, November 26th, the Haileybury meeting will be held in the High School Auditorium. Rev. W. A. Beecroft will conduct the service, with Rev. D. C. McInnis as the preacher.

Friday evening the meeting will be held at New Liskeard, in the Grand Opera House, Rev. E. J. Kerr of the Presbyterian Church will preside and the sermon will be preached by Rev. R. Haines. All meetings will be at 8 o'clock in the evening and an urgent invitation is extended to everyone to attend and join in the movement.

### Thousands of City Families Establish New Farm Homes

More than 2,000 Canadian families, or approximately 10,000 people, have been established in farm homes so far this year through the efforts of the Colonization Department of the Canadian National Railways in co-operation with the federal and provincial governments. The great majority of these people were city dwellers—many of them on relief—who obtained a new start in life by taking up farming in the various land settlement districts of the country.

Figures issued by Dr. W. J. Klack, director of the railway's colonization department, show that some 1,500 families were settled adjacent to the lines of the National system without government assistance, while over 500 families were placed on the land in co-operation with the federal and provincial governments, under the various relief settlement plans of the provinces.

### ROTARY CLUB PLANS TO HOLD HOBBY CONTEST FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The Haileybury Rotary Club sponsor a hobby competition this winter for pupils of the public and separate schools, according to a discussion following a report by the boys' work committee to the regular meeting on Monday. Definite decision as to the form of the contest was deferred until next week, but the committee recommended that some handiwork of the pupils, both boys and girls, would be arranged for, with competitions divided into classes according to age. When plans are completed, announcement will be made.

The club decided to become affiliated with the Ontario Crippled Children's Society, on payment of 50 cents per member, when the two medical Rotarians, Doctors Arnold and Wilson, recommended the step. The Society gave assistance to the club in the holding of a clinic last summer.

The members will try to collect some skates, boots, etc., for underprivileged children and will also consider a recommendation that milk be furnished in the schools as it was some years ago.

### Check Christmas Tree Thieves

A warning that it is strictly illegal to cut and take away any Christmas trees from Crown timber lands without possessing the necessary permit was issued at the forestry branch office here today.

In past years the forestry branch has information that truckers from Southern Ontario have come to this section of the province and helped themselves to trees by the truckload. One such case has already been reported this season and is being investigated.

Members of the forestry branch field staff are on the lookout for offenders of this type, and any person unlawfully taking Christmas trees from Crown timber lands will be prosecuted.—North Bay Nugget.

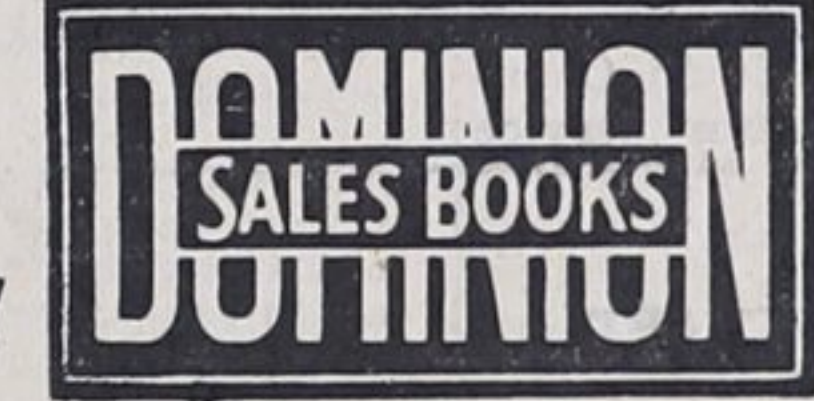

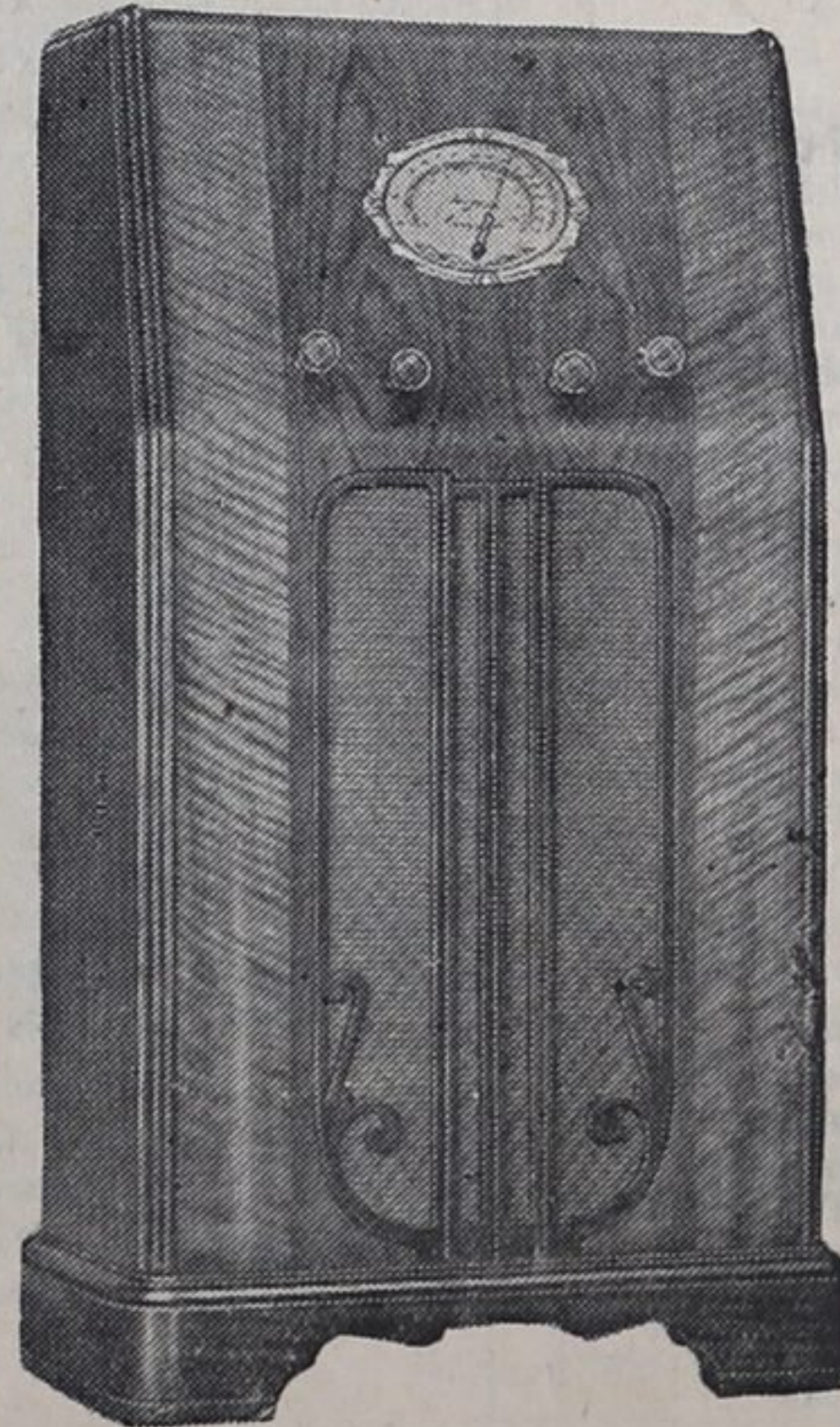
