BAD RADIO RECEPTION

Since the advent of the winter, there seems to be a tendency on the part of the newspapers of the North to lay off the roads question for the time. The frost and light snow have helped somewhat and as there are far fewer drivers there is not so much complaining being done. However, there is another question which usually comes up at this time of the year, that is the radio reception. Just at this time in the year, when the tendency is to stay indoors in the evenings, one naturally turns to the radio for some entertainment; but in this district it very often proves a failure.

For years there has been insistent demand on the part of Northerners for some better service, for some steps that would enable those who have spent fairly large sums for receiving sets to get some real satisfaction out of them, and for some return for the license fee that is collected annually. Public bodies of various kinds have joined in these demands, newspapers have devoted column after column to the question, at least one Member of Parliament, Jos. A. Bradette of Cochrane, has made a great fight for better treatment; but the old complaints are still being heard and there is little or no improvement in the service. There have been hopes that the new Commission would be able to do something for the people of the North. Perhaps it will; but it will be necessary to keep the matter before the eyes of the public or it may be allowed to slip for another season. The North Country is entitled to better service than has been given.

THE MOTHERCRAFT SOCIETY

Since 1931 the Canadian Mothercraft Society has been working unceasingly in Toronto, through its hospital and advice rooms, but its work is not confined to the city, according to a circular sent out recently to the press. The Society is extending its service to include all parts of the country and, with this in mind, is making an appeal to the public for funds to carry on its work.

From the literature sent out, it is evident that the Society is doing a work that is well worth while. It is part of the great Empire-wide Mothercraft movement begun in New Zealand 30 years ago by Dr. Truby King, and is pledged to give definite reliable information and advice on just what parents need to know in order that children may be born sound and strong.

We are convinced that the appeal of the Society should not go unheeded, that the movement should be spread into every section of the country and that the greatest good will result from the furtherance of the work.

Blame Boys for Damage to Constance Lake Waterworks

Boys are believed to have been responsible for considerable damage at the Constance Lake waterworks, according to Chief of Police MacGirr. The small building containing the valves on the pipe line has been broken into and the valves opened and the building shot full of holes by the use of rifles, the chief says. While no names were mentioned, Chief MacGirr hinted that those responsible for the damage were known and there would probably be steps taken towards inflicting punishment.

Famous officers of the Canadian Pacific Pallway and fir John A. Macdonald, Prime Minister of Canada, arrived at Revelstelle recently and held a series of historic mestings. Among them were Donald A. Smith, Goorge Stephen, James J. Hill, Van Horne and Shaughnessy, names associated for the past half century with the construction of Canada's first transcontinental railway. The party actually comprised a group of film players portraying the historic characters in the tense board-room sequence of "The Great Barrier", Gaumont British picture depicting the strenuous railway construction days fifty years ago.
