The option included a substantial cash payment and the holders of the claims retaining an interest in the property. The group of claims is in Macklin township, not far from the Electa Mine. C. N. P. C. EARNINGS SHOW BIG INCREASE IN YEAR ENDING NOV. 30TH

Total net earnings of \$2,796,294.18 for the 12 months ending November 30th, 1936, are reported by Canada Northern Power Corporation in a letter to shareholders from B. V. Harrison, general manager, dated January 15th, 1937. This amount is compared with a total of \$2,747,436.76 for the previous 12 months, showing a substantial increase. Increased activity in the vari-

ous mining areas, supplied by the company is given as the reason for the continued rise in the company's earnings, and the general manager cites the Cadillac section, the Boichatel camp and the Blouin Lake area in Quebec,

and the Porcupine and Kirkland Lake districts in Ontario as accounting for higher demands for power. All-time high record earnings were attained in the months of October and November of 1936, Mr. Harrison states.
