ADOPT BETTER PLAN

Word from points further north this week is to the effect that what will eventually prove a much better plan than any move for secession is to be adopted. That is that strong delegation, representative of all sections of the North, will go to Toronto and there present to the powers that be the problems that are continually arising. This move is being sponsored by the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, under the president, W. O. Langdon of Timmins, who has succeeded in arranging an appointment with the Acting Premier. In this the Toronto Board of Trade has been of great assistance to the Northern body and it is believed that the interview will be held within the next few weeks.

Last fall the Ontario Associated Boards showed their interest in Northern Ontario to the extent of pressing for the appointment of a Commission to deal with the problems of the North as they arose. If this is followed up, and the questions kept continually before the government, it should be possible to secure some measure of fair treatment without recourse to talk of secession, but apparently the North's needs must be kept continually before the provincial authorities or they will be neglected. The meeting of mining municipalities at Timmins on Saturday has helped considerably and by combining forces with the Boards of Trade they can go a long way towards securing more justice than the North has had in the past.

Reorganized Society Has Fine Start on Improvement of Plot at Cenotaph

On Monday evening of this week I dropped in on a group of men at the Hotel Haileybury. They were evidently holding a meeting of some kind, and yet there was evident such a spirit of enthusiasm that I wondered if it could be so. What was this thing that was holding these men? On making a little enquiry and on showing some interest in the matter I was asked to take a seat, which I gladly did. It proved to be a meeting of the Board of Directors of our local Horticultural Society. They were recounting their efforts for the past year and discussing plans for the future.

Their work had been carried on so quietly, that the average citizen would hardly guess that there was anything doing, but there was an underlying spirit of enthusiasm, and a keen desire to serve their community, that was bound to produce results.

When the Society was reorganized on May 4th last it appeared that it was too late in the year to accomplish much. An order was wired to Toronto and 100 elm trees were bought and planted on

Rorke Avenue from the hospital to Main Street, and Main Street from the railway station to Meridian Avenue. Then the Society interviewed the town council and procured the right to improve the property around the Cenotaph. This piece of property has been set apart as a Municipal Park. It is one that should interest our citizens in general. It is hoped that the citizens will fall in behind this project. They would like to have 300 members this year, at the nominal fee of \$1.00 per member. And of course, donations are always welcome.

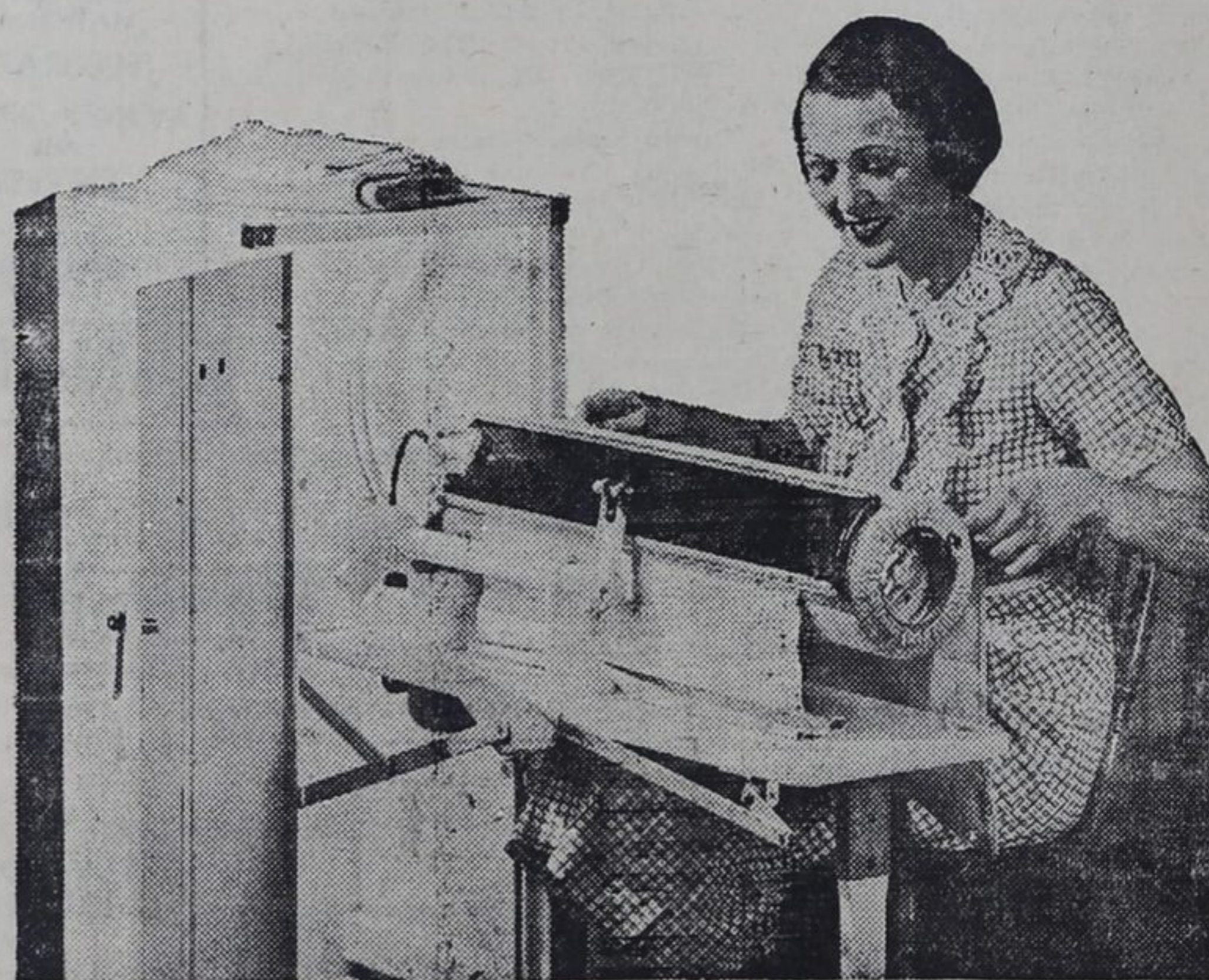
