TRAVEL CLUB ENJOYS FIRST OF LECTURES IN IMAGINARY WORLD TOUR

St. Paul's Travel Club gathered at the Parish Hall on Thursday evening last to take an imaginary tour around the world on the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Britain" from New York.

Illustrated by slides, the lecturer Mrs. Seymour, first showed the boat itself and the beautiful interior rooms, and then explained points of interest and experiences in Madeira and the Canary Islands, concluding with an explanation of the colorful Neptune ceremony as the ship crossed the equator en route to South Africa.

The flower-bedecked island of Madeira, its serenity, its curious old-world customs, its methods of water preservation and its historical significance were outlined vividly.

Continuing to the Canary Islands, the lecturer depicted with enlightening lantern slides the deficiencies and beauties of this out-of-the-way place, and spoke interestingly of the ceremony of carrying the Crucifix on Good Friday from the magnificent cathedral along streets veritably carpeted with flowers designed and laid down by the inhabitants and priests.

The Neptune ceremony was described in detail, the arrival and activities of King Neptune and his escort with their murderous instruments and equally diabolical intentions providing a less serious note to the evening's entertainment.
