A resident of Giroux Lake for more than 20 years, Richard Morcom died on Thursday last at the Toronto General Hospital, where he had been for some weeks a patient. He was in his 52nd year and was a native of St. Stephen, Cornwall, England, and a miner during the greater part of his life. He had lived at Giroux Lake since 1913, with the exception of a year which he spent in Muskoka. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, with Rev. E. Gilmour Smith and Mr. H. W. Rowdon conducting the services and interment was in Silverland Cemetery, Cobalt. Mr. Morcom is survived by his widow and two daughters, Mrs. J. A. MRS. WILLIAM ROBB

Another of the early residents of Haileybury has passed on. Mrs. William Robb, who had lived here since 1900, died on Monday, January 25th, after an illness of more than a year which she bore with patience and fortitude. She was in her 75th year.

The late Mrs. Robb, who before her marriage was Miss Mary Jane Thompson, was born in the County of York and spent her early life there. On August 5th, 1881, she was married to Mr. Robb in Orillia and they lived in Bracebridge until coming to the North Country nearly 37 years ago and settling in Haileybury, then only a small village. During the intervening years Mrs. Robb has been highly esteemed by all who knew her, and the family has the sympathy of a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Formerly a member of the Presbyterian Church, she became identified with the United Church following the union and was an active worker in many activities in the community. Mr. and Mrs. Robb celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in Haileybury in 1931.

The late Mrs. Robb is survived by her husband, two daughters and three sons. The daughters are Mrs. D. Berry and Mrs. N. Austin, both of Haileybury, while the sons are William H., Toronto, Thomas and Melvin in town.
