Find Town a Poor Risk

Timmins is a poor risk for a public liability company, Lloyd's of London have discovered. They have already had a loss of over 400 per cent on the policy they wrote for the town a few months ago.

Although convinced that the town engineer's department is doing good work in making the streets safe for pedestrians, they made it clear to the council in a letter read at yesterday's meeting that there must be a way of reducing the number of claims "because some municipalities have no claims." Twelve claims that have been filed amount to \$2,200 and the policy still has a long way to run.—Porcupine Advance.

Plan Winter Carnival

At a meeting of the Chapleau Board of Trade held in the Town Hall on Wednesday evening last, plans were discussed for a proposed winter carnival to be held within the next month or six weeks.

The proposed carnival would embrace every variety of winter sport and would include skiing, snowshoeing, tobogganing, hockey curling, dog team races and many other sports.—Chapleau Post.

Army of Applicants

As an indication of employment conditions in the lower part of the province, the experience of a Rouyn business man is quite illuminating. Advertising in a Montreal paper for a cashier for a special line of business, he received a total of 700 applications, from which it is clear that the unemployed are watching the classified advertisements for vacant positions and that a great number are still out of work.—Rouyn Noranda Press.

\$168 for Wounded

The sum of \$168 was realized for the medical mission on the Spanish front operated by Dr. Bethune of Montreal on the tag days held here Wednesday.

Mrs. S. C. Bell, chairman of the committee which sponsored the event announced that the money has already been sent to the Rev. Bence Spence at Toronto, who is in charge of a Canada-wide subscription fund for the Montreal party, which receives some \$500 a month, and which apparently has the approval of both sides in the civil war.—Kirkland Lake Northern News.

Can't Run Shop in School

Assurance was given a woman who operates a store opposite the High School that the improvised confectionery shop inside the school would be closed or its owner forced to pay the regular license fee. The woman complained that the store was cutting her revenue and was paying no license fee. Mayor Bartleman had interviewed the heads of the High School Board and had received assurance that every step would be taken to correct the situation.—Timmins Press.

Jelly, Rebecca Street, on Tuesday, February 3rd, when a large number of friends and neighbors called to visit and have tea and a piece of the lovely birthday cake with the ninety-three candles, a gift of her granddaughter, Mrs. Lorne Jenkins, Timmins. It was a joyous day for this grand old lady, who was born in the early years of Queen Victoria's reign.—New Liskeard Speaker.

Raid Gaming Houses

Timmins police settled back today, confident that they had smashed what is believed to have been a "little Monte Carlo" operating in two of the town's most prominent social clubs. After one of the most thrilling raids, and mass arrests in the history of the town, police herded fifty-seven alleged inmates and operators of alleged gambling houses, into the police station shortly before mid-

night last night and placed them under arrest for various infractions of the laws governing the common gaming house.—Timmins Press.

Triple Fatality Averted

A triple fatality was narrowly averted in a North Bay home early this morning when coal gas fumes escaping from a chimney overcame F. J. Seeley, his daughter, Gladys, and son, Bernard.

Only the presence of mind of Mrs. Seeley in hastily opening the door to admit fresh air and calling a physician, Dr. E. J. Brennan, prevented a tragedy.—North Bay Nugget.

Improved Train Service

The Kapuskasing Tribune reports that following a visit to Ottawa by the president of the Board of Trade of the Northern town, the daily train service between Cochrane and Hearst has been extended to include Sundays as well. It is also expected that in the near future there will be a service through to Nakina in order to provide connections to the West.

Big Mining Acreage

A new company, Verity Porcupine Gold Mines Limited, has been formed to take over what is probably the largest acreage so far brought under one title in the Porcupine camp. The ground includes some 240 claims in eleven townships stretching from Turnbull and Price townships on the west and south to Bond township east of Night Hawk. The claims were formerly held by the Armstrong Prospecting Syndicate.—Timmins Press.

Sees Limestone Industry

Possibilities of a limestone industry up north near Coral Rapids were noted this week with the departure of Mr. Rogers, an expert geologist, to examine possibilities of a limestone industry in close proximity to the lignite fields. Considerable limestone is used in the sulphating process in the paper mills of the North as well as in the extraction process of the gold mines.—Cochrane Post.

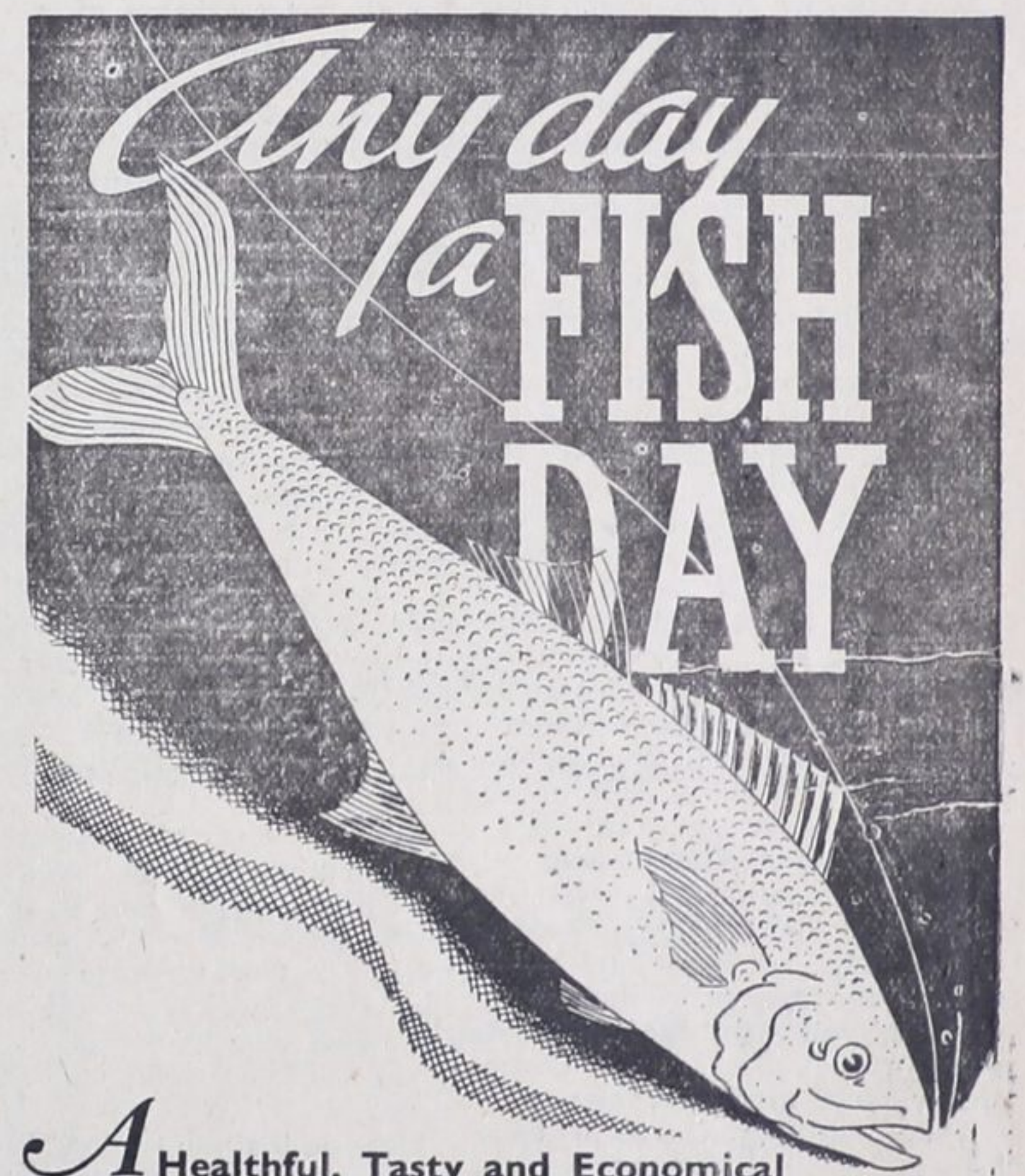
