It would appear that the prompt measures taken last week when the influenza epidemic threatened to become serious in Haileybury have brought about the desired effect...

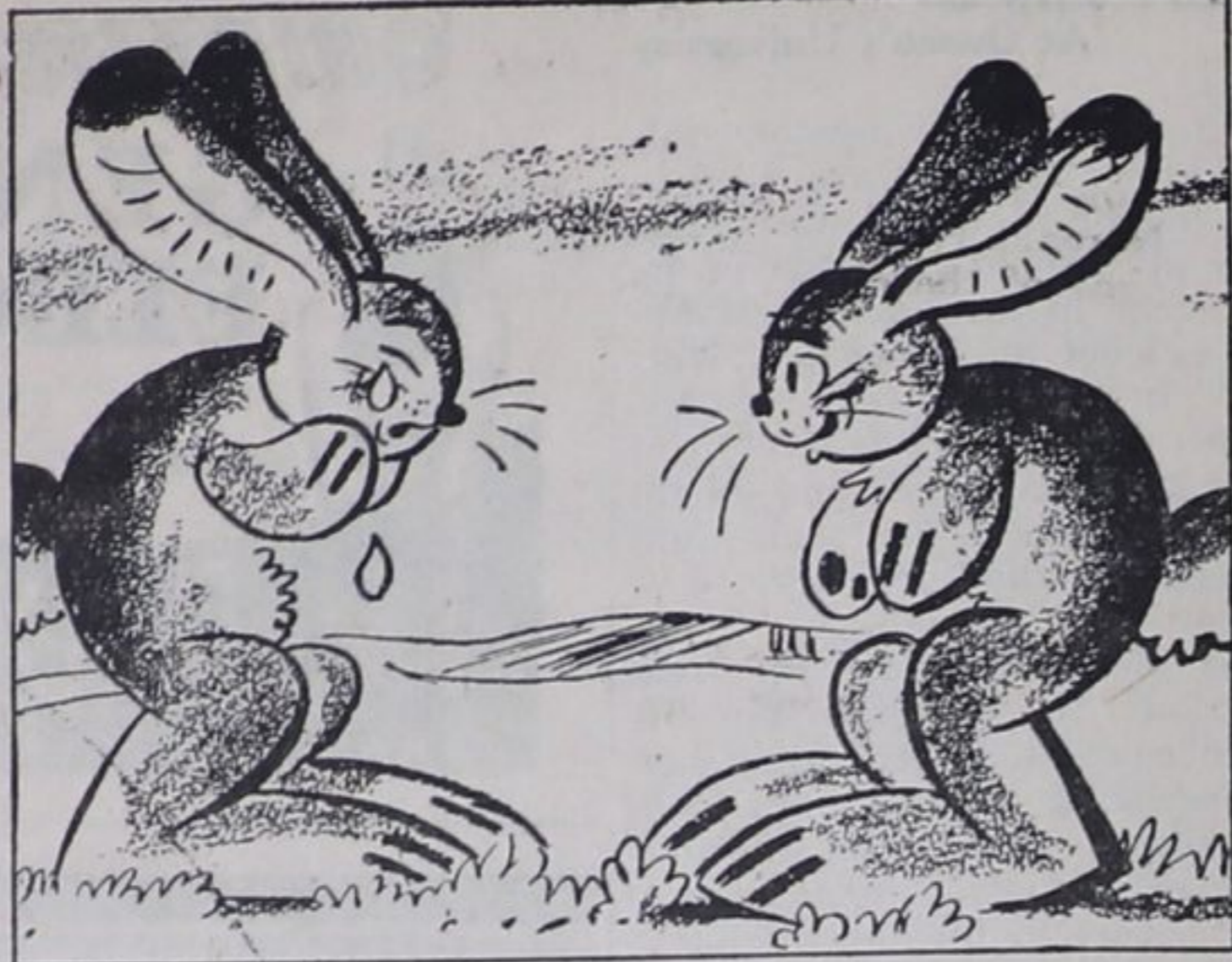
Fortunately, the type of flu has not been a virulent one, no deaths have occurred from its ravages and in only a comparatively few cases have there been any complications.

TELEPHONE COMPANY SHOWS INCREASES IN LAST ANNUAL REPORT

Presenting its 32nd annual report last week, the Northern Telephone Company Limited shows considerable increase in business for the year 1936 and a steady growth which has taken place co-incident with the growth and development of the Northern districts which it serves.

The company had 8,586 telephones in use at the end of 1936, compared to 7,402 in December of 1935, an increase of 1,184. There are now 798 miles of pole lines, an increase of 20 miles during the past year, while corresponding increases are shown in the number of calls and in other phases of the business.

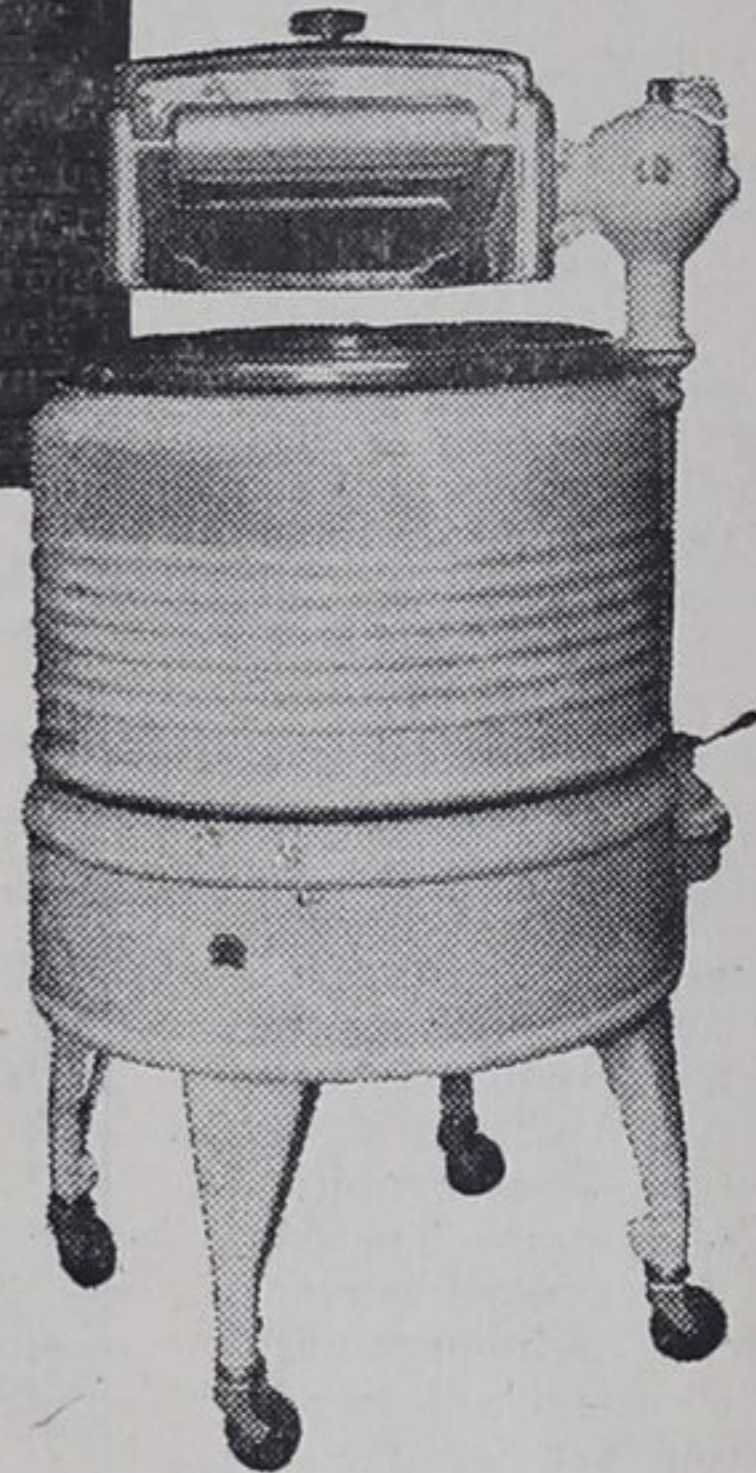
