Haileyburian Want Ads Will Bring Results

Grand Jury Has Recommendations For Improvement

Conditions Generally Good At District Jail; Shelter Found Unsatisfactory

When the Grand Jury at the Supreme Court Assizes being held here this week, presented their report to Mr. Justice Makins, who is presiding at the court, they had several recommendations to make, some of which have been suggested on previous occasions. While the jury found conditions at the district jail generally satisfactory, they stated in their report that the fumigation plant was "not at all adequate" and that there should be provision made for insane persons to be conveyed direct to a proper institution, instead of being held in the jail for a period. A man suffering from disease should be "separated from the other prisoners" the report said. Reporting on the Children's Shelter, which was also visited, the jury said that they found the building unfit for the purpose of which it is intended, and that the fire hazard is very great on account of its frame construction. "Conditions in general, in respect to the premises, are entirely unsatisfactory," the report concluded.

His Lordship, in receiving the report, told the jurors that it would be placed before the proper authorities.

The Grand Jury had only one criminal case to deal with, the charge of shooting brought against Harry Ansara of Kirkland Lake. A true bill was returned and the trial commenced Monday afternoon. After the panel of petit jurors had been selected for this trial, the remainder of those summoned were dismissed, as all the actions listed for hearing before a jury had been either settled or adjourned. These included a damage action brought by Elizabeth Larabie, on behalf of the Cote children, against A. Hanstke, which was settled between the parties.

A suit over the collection of an insurance policy was also settled while a damage action against the Big Seven Mine and W. W. Lockwood, brought by one Archie McRae, was dismissed as against the mine and adjourned insofar as the second defendant is concerned. The fourth of the jury civil cases was transferred to the non-jury list, on which there remain several actions still to be dealt with.

Two divorce actions, one with the parties living in Cobalt and New Liskeard and the other between a Kirkland Lake couple, were heard by His Lordship on Monday afternoon before the Grand Jury reported. The wife was the plaintiff in each case, and decrees were granted.

Just what he will talk about is a matter for guessing, but he was always an ardent follower of the game while in the North Country and it is likely that he will have some stories to tell. Some of his most interesting short stories in the magazines have been hockey tales in which the humorous element was prominent, and perhaps his radio talk will have the same quality. The broadcast is over CFRB and commences at 9 o'clock.

THREE CHARGED WITH THEFT OF BRASS FROM UNUSED DAIRY BUILDING

Charged with the theft of brass fittings from an unused dairy building in the township of Bucke three young men of North Cobalt were arrested at their homes on Thursday last by Provincial Constable R. O. Stromberg of Cobalt. They are H. Anderson, H. Kearney and E. Jacobson, and when they appeared in police court here on Friday they were remanded on bail of \$1,000 each until this week-end, when they will appear before Magistrate Atkinson in Cobalt.

Evidence given was to the effect that the three men had been seen and recognized by a night-watchman employed by the township, as they emerged from the building, which formerly had belonged to A. B. Davis, but is now in the hands of the township. The brass was taken from a milk-bottling machine which the court was told, originally cost \$565. The watchman sent for Constable Stromberg when he saw the trio and the arrests followed.
