## SMELTS IN TEMISKAMING

Through the efforts of Mr. Bartlett, senior, considerable information has been placed before the Board of Trade regarding the stocking of Lake Temiskaming with "smelts." This is a species of small fish which is said to provide food for larger fish and the little fellows are said to multiply to such an extent as to withstand the eating capacity of the larger fish. The correspondence and information gained will be turned over to the Temiskaming Fish and Game Club, which is an active organization carrying on an excellent work in planting fish in the various lake and streams of Temiskaming.—New Liskeard Speaker.

## C.I.O. IN MINING CAMPS

"Union members in Timmins will not rest until the C.I.O. banner floats over every mine in the Porcupine camp," declared Wellington J. Armstrong, head of the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers' Union in announcing a meeting to be held here next Sunday evening at which Northern Ontario union officials will gather to discuss and clarify their stand regarding the Oshawa strike situation. "We're prepared to throw our weight behind our Oshawa brothers in their fight to have the C.I.O. recognized by the General Motors," continued the president of Local 241.—Timmins Press.

## UNPRECEDENTED STAKING

The claim staking enthusiasm that last year carried the Porcupine Mining Division to a new high in acreage has been continued into 1937.

If the recording of mining claims in the Porcupine continues at its present rate, this year will break even last year's record. In the three months 1200 claims—about 48,000 acres of land—have been taken up by prospectors of the Porcupine. Last year's total was about 200,000 acres.

There has been no "rush" of any importance; no spectacular discoveries have been announced; yet the recording of mining claims in four well-defined areas continues at an unprecedented rate.—Porcupine Advance.

## RAILWAY BILL PASSED

A message received by The Press yesterday from Quebec announced that the bill respecting the charter of the Temiscamingue & Abitibi Ry. Co., for the building of a line from Angliers to Senneterre, which last week received second reading in the legislature, had been passed by the railway committee and sent to the legislature for its final reading, which is now assured. This will be good news in Rouyn-Noranda and district, giving promise of early entry of the C.P.R.

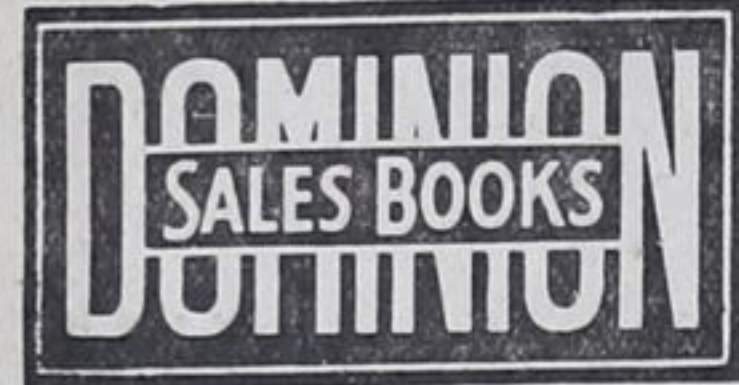
