GET HOLIDAY WITH PAY

Miners of the Porcupine camp were given a fine chance to celebrate the Coronation holiday when a "holiday with pay" was declared a practically every mine in the vicinity of Timmins. Only the men who occupied jobs which must be filled every day of the week were required to work. A general holiday was declared in all other departments. The men who were kept on the job will be given double pay for their work on the holiday.—Timmins Daily Press.

ENTER BASEBALL TEAM

The Twin City Baseball Club has definitely entered a team in the southern group of the Temiskaming Baseball League, it was announced at a meeting of executives and players held at Noranda skating rink on Sunday afternoon, and local fans can look forward to seeing senior baseball here again this summer.

The league will operate in the same way as last season, the locals playing a schedule with Wright-Hargreaves, Lake Shore and Toburn of Kirkland Lake, the winner then advancing against the northern titlists for the T.B.L. championship.—Rouyn-Noranda Press.

REAL CORONATION BABY

Timmins has a real Coronation baby. The baby was born on the 12th of May, while the King was broadcasting, at approximately 2.01 p.m. E.S.T. It is a boy—son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Gallipeau, 111 Spruce Street south—and he has been named George Albert Frederick Gallipeau in honor of the time of his birth. Word is being sent to His Majesty of this Coronation birth in this distant part of his vast Empire.—Porcupine Advance.

OLD STREET RE-NAMED

Westinghouse Avenue is the name which the Township council last week imposed on the little side street in Swastika where the big warehouse of the same name is situated, known since the flower town was laid out as Dusty Street.

The re-naming of Dusty Street cuts off a link of Teck Township history that has remained alive only in the name of the little side thoroughfare. For, contrary to the very logical conclusion that is drawn by most people the street was not named for the condition of its surface during summer months, but called after two men who were among the founders of this camp.

The two Dusty brothers came

to prospect in this section in 1908 and in the following year discovered the Swastika Gold Mine, now the Crescent, the discovery which attracted a rush of prospectors concentrating on this area, and first brought families to settle in Teck.—Kirkland Lake Northern News.

DIED OF POISON

On Saturday afternoon last Mrs. Eddyvean of Harris, took a dose of paris green with the result that she passed away early Sunday morning. The circumstances surrounding the tragic incident were investigated by the Coroner, Dr. J. S. McCullough, who pronounced it a case of suicide.—New Liskeard Speaker.

PRODUCTION IS DOWN

Due to decreased tonnage and treatment of lower grade ore during April, value of bullion produced by Dome Mines, Por-

cupine district, was down \$40,498 from the previous month. Output was valued at \$599,265 from treatment of 47,600 tons, average recovery being \$12.50 per ton. In March, output was valued at \$639,763 from the treatment of 48,700 tons, with an average recovery of \$13.14.—Porcupine Advance.

LICENSE GAMING DEVICES

Whiffle boards, pin ball and other devices of a similar nature will be licensed at a yearly fee of \$125, payable before the license is granted.

Anyone under the age of 18 will be prohibited from playing these machines, the owner being liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$50 exclusive of costs, and no gambling devices will be allowed.—Timmins Daily Press.

TENT CATERPILLARS COME

With the arrival of warm weather tent caterpillars, plague of orchards and gardens, are showing up, officials of the entomological branch of the department of agriculture said today.

Reports from many districts in Canada show a heavy infestation this year. Officials were inclined to question an estimate from North Bay that the pests were 60 or 70 times more numerous this

year than last. They said there was no way of making such an estimate.—North Bay Nugget.

Two young residents of Workman, located some 22 miles north of Cochrane, made a gruesome discovery this week when they found the body of an old settler, John Toivonen, in his shack.

The dead man lived alone in the bush and his cabin was located about half a mile from the T. & N.O. railway tracks, one mile south of Workman. The two men who made the discovery were his nearest neighbors.
