CANADA NORTHERN POWER EXTENDS SYSTEM IN QUEBEC

In issuing a comparative statement of earnings for the 12 months ending February 28th, 1939, B. V. Harrison, vice-president and general manager of Canada Northern Power Corporation Limited, notes in his letter to shareholders that the Quebec Provincial Electricity Board has granted the company authority for a distribution system at Pascalis, which will be the most easterly point served by the company, being 96 miles from the inter-provincial boundary. The new 5,000 k.v.a. substation at Malartic, commenced last fall, has been completed and placed in service, as well as a five-mile transmission line eastward from East Malartic Mines to the property of Malartic Gold Fields.

Gross earnings for the 12-month period were \$5,187,185.22, compared to a gross of \$5,030,013.79 for the previous year. Operating and maintenance figures are \$2,346,785.90 and \$2,129,029.91 respectively, leaving the net for the year ending with February of 1939 at \$2,840,399.32, compared to the previous year's net of \$2,900,983.88. This is accounted for by the fact that while reductions in rates have lessened the amount derived from power sales, the increase in the quantity of current utilized has necessitated large power purchases, the general manager states.

Cow and Truck Smashed in Strange Highway Accident

Manson Taylor, who lives on a farm a few miles out of New Liskeard, lost a cow last week in a peculiar highway accident which was investigated by Provincial Constable Wm. Byrne. He had purchased two cows and was taking them home tied behind his motor car, driving along slowly in order not to weary the animals unduly, when in meeting a truck driven by Harold Bank of 91 Carlyle Ave., Toronto, one of them got frightened and jumped from behind the car. The truck and cow were both badly smashed and the cow died almost instantly the officer said. No blame was attached to the driver of either vehicle, any action to be taken being a matter for the civil courts, Constable Byrne said.

Canal traffic through the Welland Ship Canal established a new high re-

cord during the 1938 season of navigation when the movement of freight aggregated 12,633,093 tons compared with the previous high record of 11,747,950 in 1937.

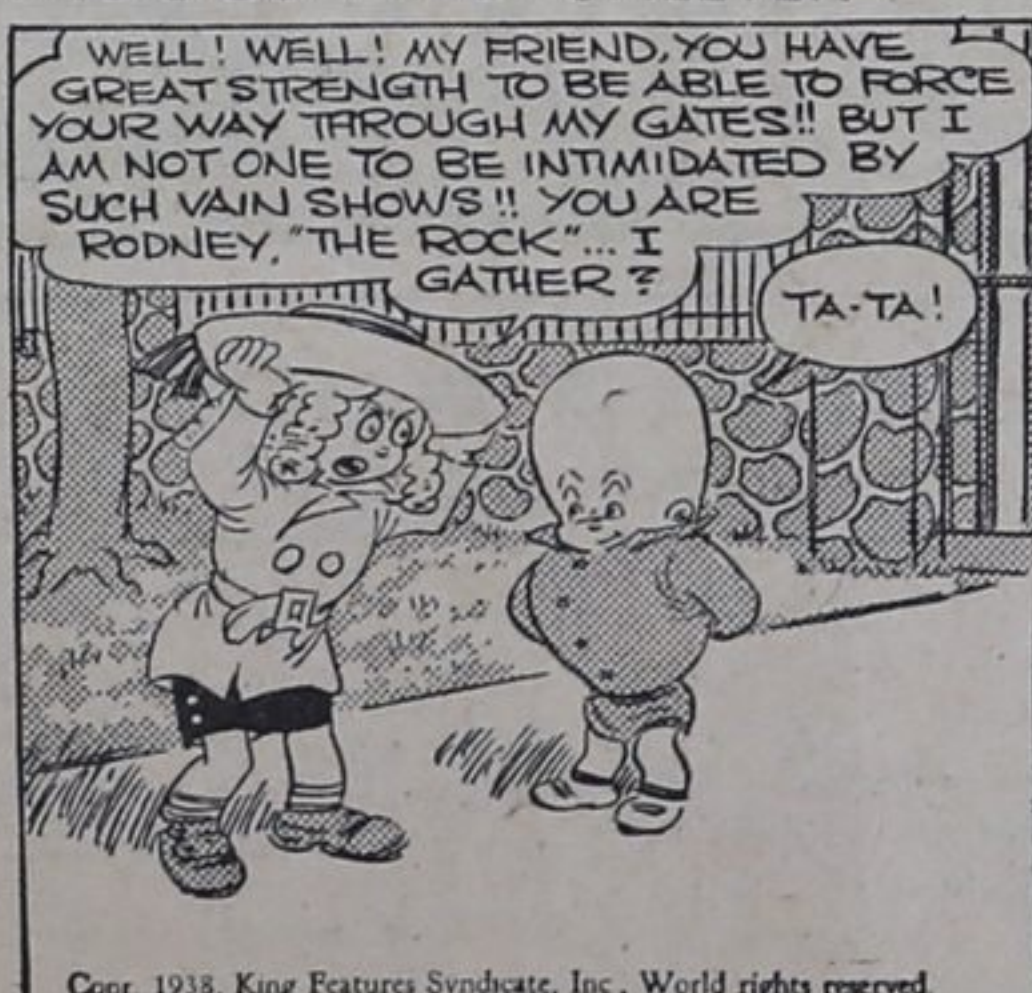
