Liskeard Tigers Take Junior Title in Central Group

Take Round from Noranda Notre Dame Club, 9-8, With Local Players Shining

New Liskeard's Junior "B" entry, containing in the line-up eight Haileybury youngsters, snatched the Central Group title in their home-and-home series with the Noranda Notre Dame club, losing the first game in the Quebec centre on Sunday by a 5-4 count and taking last night's encounter in a thrill-packed session, 5-3.

Liskeard eliminated Kirkland Lakes Golden Gaters last Friday evening. They had captured the first game in Liskeard, 7-5, and went into Kirkland before 1,200 fans and put on a real display of speed to defeat the gold belters 4-3.

In the game last night, Liskeard drew first blood at the 17-minute mark only to see Noranda tie it up before the gong ended the session. Murray Carr took a pass-out from Ernie Dupuis to draw first blood, while Jack Ladds and defenceman Legris came back in two minutes to knot the count on a smart rush.

At the nine minute mark in the second period, Fred Gordon got 'n the clear on a pass from brother Bill and tied up the round. Five minutes later Murray Carr rifled a long one from outside the blue line which had the Noranda goalie beaten all the way, and the crowd went wild. Constantine, the diminutive second string centre player for the visitors got in close to beat McCurdy and tie up the round all over again just two minutes from the second rest session.

Walton took a pip of a pass from Dupuis at the four-minute mark of the final stanza to put Liskeard one up, and Alf Humphrey was johnny-on-the-spot for Dupuis' pass-out midway through the frame to apparently make the issue safe. However, some loose defensive work and persistent ganging by Noranda provided the goal which kept them in the hunt until the final gong.

Liskeard now goes into series final round against the winner of the Timmins Sacred Heart vs. Smooth Rock Falls series, the deciding game of which will be staged in Cochrane's new arena this evening.

The survivor of the above will meet the Southern Group champs for the N.O.H.A. title.

BRIGADE GETS CALL AS MEMBERS ARE SEEKING INSPECTION OF CHIMNEYS

The Cobalt volunteer fire brigade has answered 32 alarms in just over three months, and 25 of them, including one rung in while members of the organization were telling the town council about the matter Tuesday evening, have been to chimney fires. Headed by Fire Chief T. Belanger, a deputatio nof firemen waited on the town fathers at the regular March meeting to suggest some action be taken to have chimneys inspected and any recommendations deemed necessary duly reported, and the discussion nicely under way when the bell in the town hall tower overhead rang three times, signal for a telephone fire alarm. At once, the discussion terminated as there was a dash from the hall of the volunteer firemen present in the council chamber. They returned later to announce another chimney fire, one of them saying the services of the brigade had not been required in the circumstances, and eventually the matter was left with Councillor Fauvelle, chairman of the fire and light committee. The 32 fire alarms all have been reported since December 1 of last year.
