

Missing Five Days; Man's Body Found Near Former Home

Believe Ludger Gagne Took His Own Life; Relatives Can Offer No Reason

Missing for five days after he had left the farm house of Wilfrid Bilodeau, in Bucke township, near the Cobalt Contact Mine early on Saturday, September 13, the body of Ludger Gagne, 60-year-old resident of Timmins, was found by provincial police officers from Haileybury headquarters of the force on Thursday morning last. A search of the surrounding bushland had been conducted by the officers and relatives of the deceased, under the direction of Constable Fred Simpson, since his disappearance was first reported. The body was found near the farm clearing on the edge of the woods and it was evident, the officers said, that he had committed suicide, using a razor to sever his throat. The razor was found in his hand, the handle wrapped in a handkerchief.

Members of the man's family could offer no reason why he should commit suicide. He had lived in Timmins for the past seven years and had been employed as a carpenter. His wife had gone to Montreal on a visit, but was summoned when he was reported missing. Gagne had lived on a farm near the Bilodeau place before moving to Timmins.

The late Mr. Gagne was born at Centre Falls, Que., and had been in the North Country for some 37 years. For 18 years he farmed at Lorrainville, Que., before moving to Bucke township. Surviving are his widow and one son, Ludger Gagne Jr. of Timmins; three brothers, Frank of Cobalt, Alfred of Ville Marie and

Household Hints

For a light and economical main dish I don't know of anything better than stuffed green peppers, especially at this time of year. You can stuff them with leftovers, or you can fill them with fresh foods and you will find them good eating.

Today's Menu

- Corn-Stuffed Peppers with Bacon
Baked Potatoes
Baked Tomatoes Pickled Peaches
Apple Sauce Nut Cookies Coffee

- Corn-Stuffed Peppers with Bacon
6 green peppers
6 strips bacon
2 tablespoons onion
2 tablespoons green pepper
3 cups whole-kernel corn
1 tablespoon pimento cut in strips
12 strips bacon

Remove tops from pepper and use to make the two tablespoons minced green pepper called for. Cook the six slices bacon in heavy saucpan; remove from fat and cut into small pieces. Add green pepper and minced onion to fat and cook three minutes over medium heat; then add corn, bacon and pimento; heat. Par-boil peppers uncovered in large amount of boiling salted water for five minutes; drain and fill with bacon-corn stuffing. Lay small strips of bacon across tops of peppers; put in baking dish and bake in moderately hot oven (450 deg. F.) for five minutes, until stuffing is heated through and bacon is crisp. Serves six.

Apple Sauce Nut Cookies

- 1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
2 cups sifted flour
2 tablespoons all-phosphate baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1 cup thick, unsweetened apple sauce
1/2 cup raisins.
1/4 cup nuts.

Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, creaming well. Add egg and beat well. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and spices, and add to creamed mixture alternately with apple sauce; then fold in seeded raisins cut fine and nuts cut fine. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet about two inches apart, and bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes five dozen cookies.

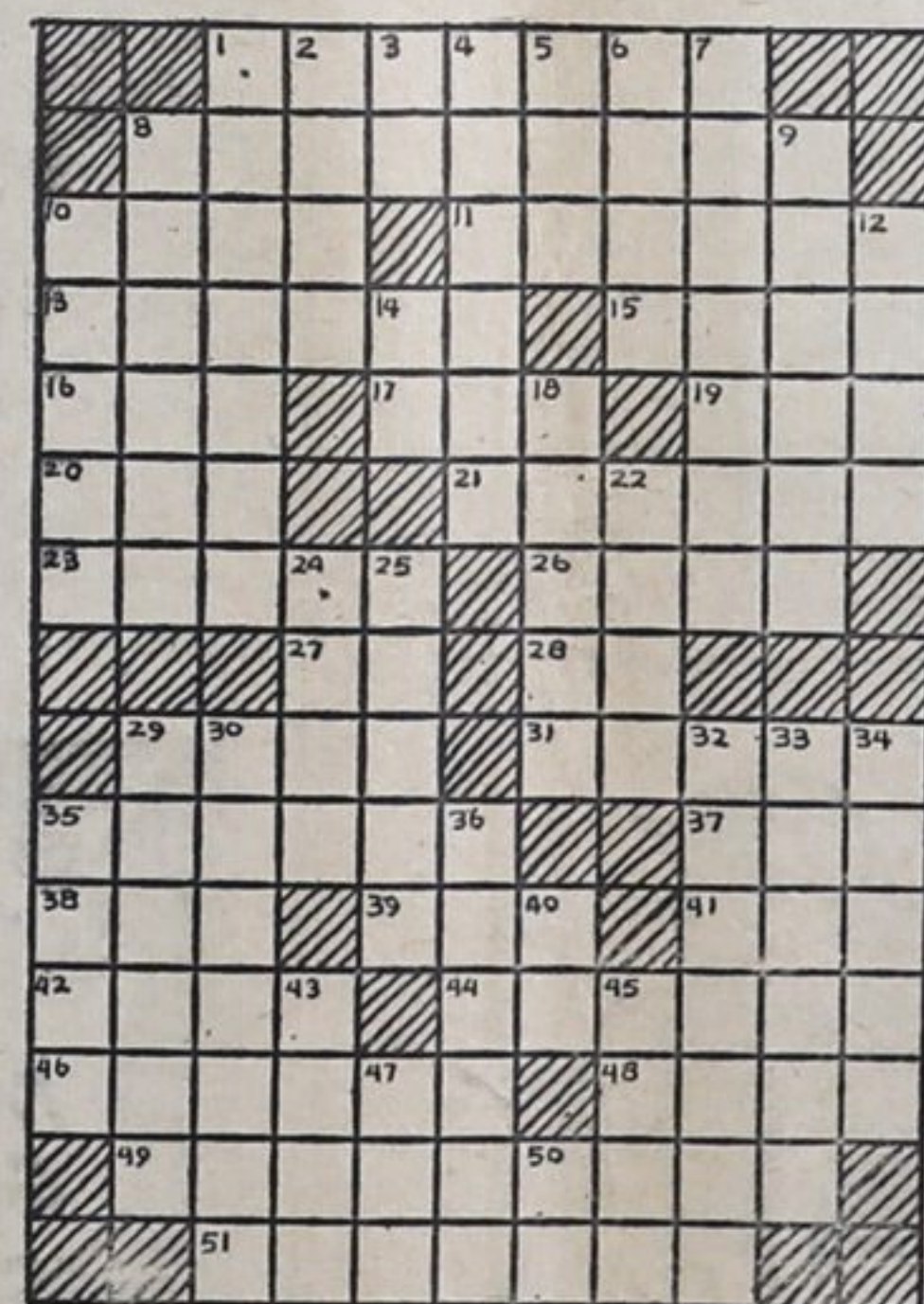

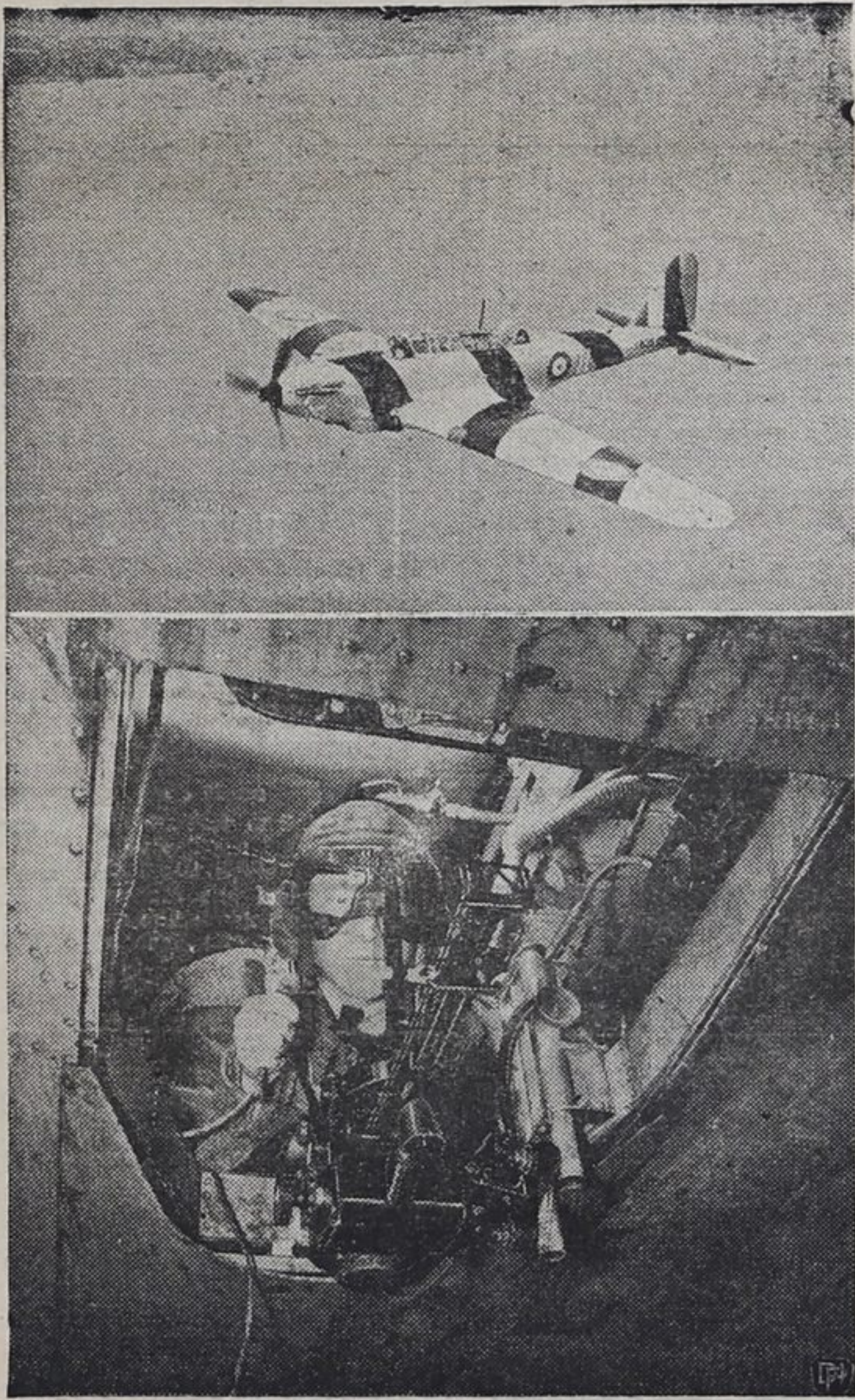

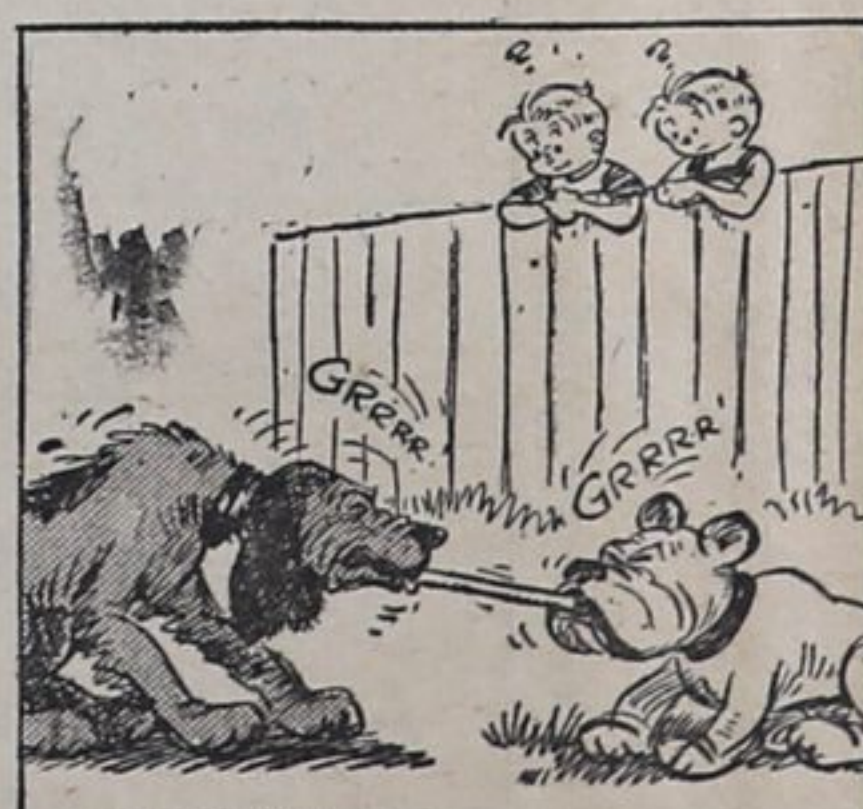
