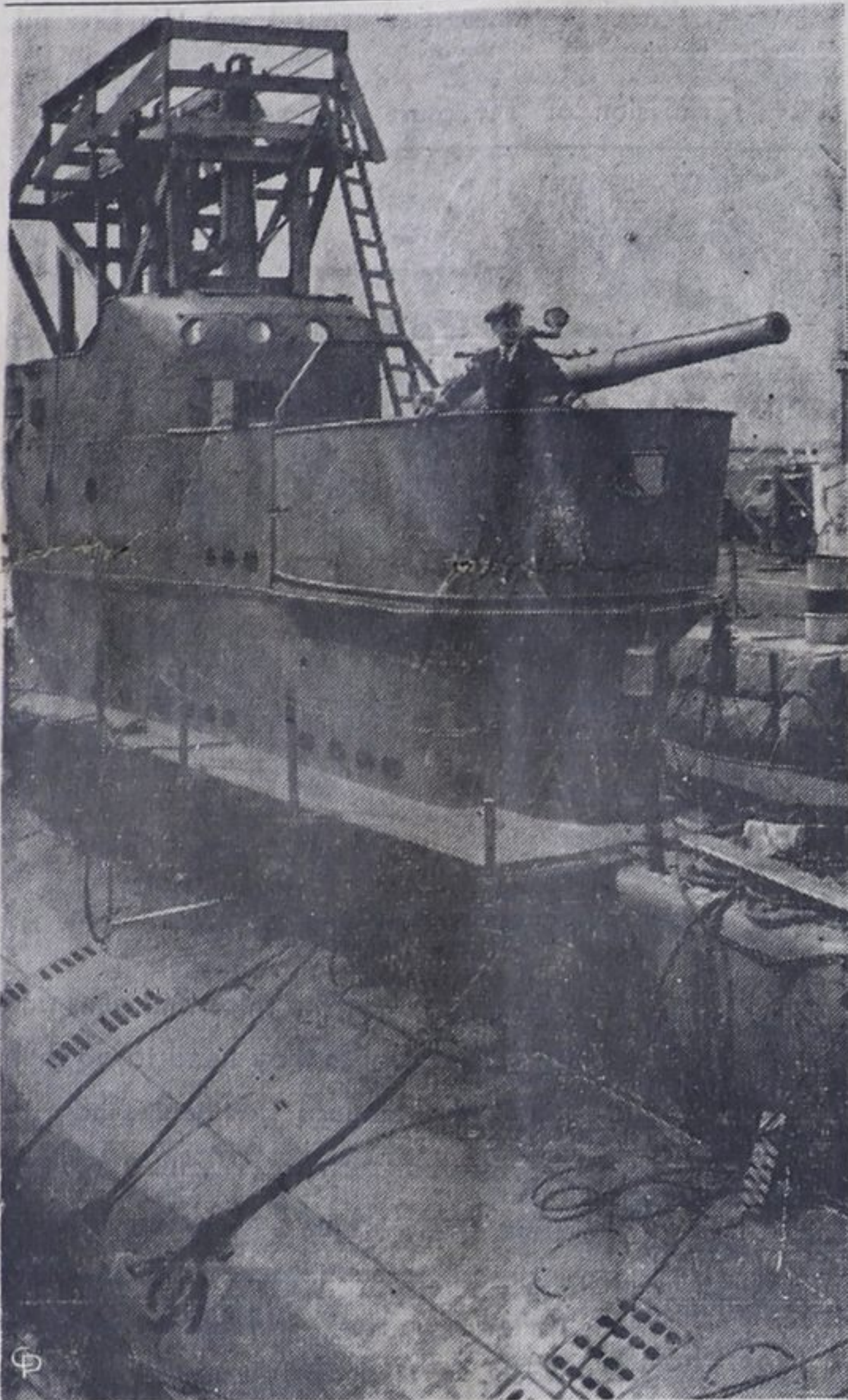

BRITISH AMBASSADOR RETURNS TO U.S.



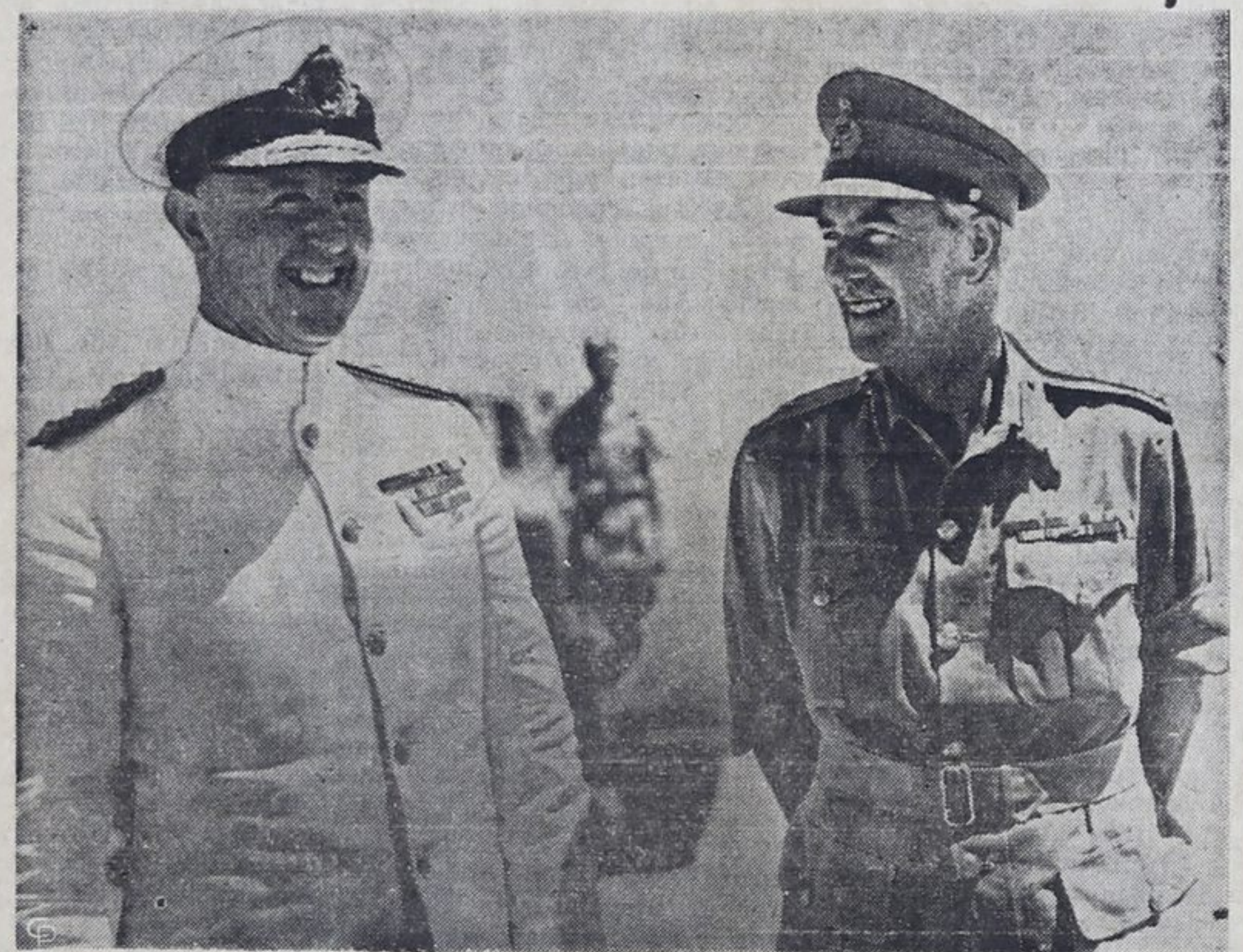

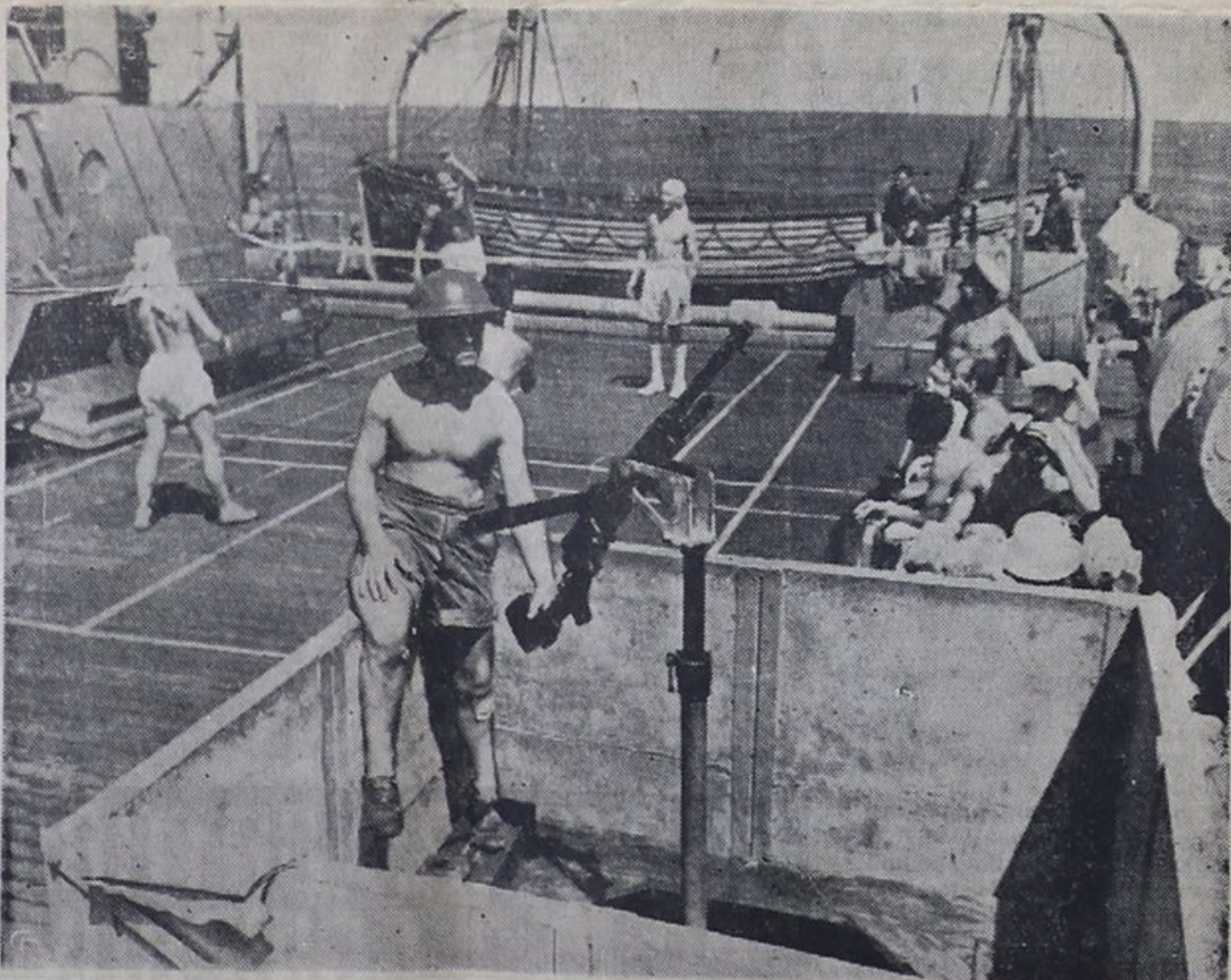

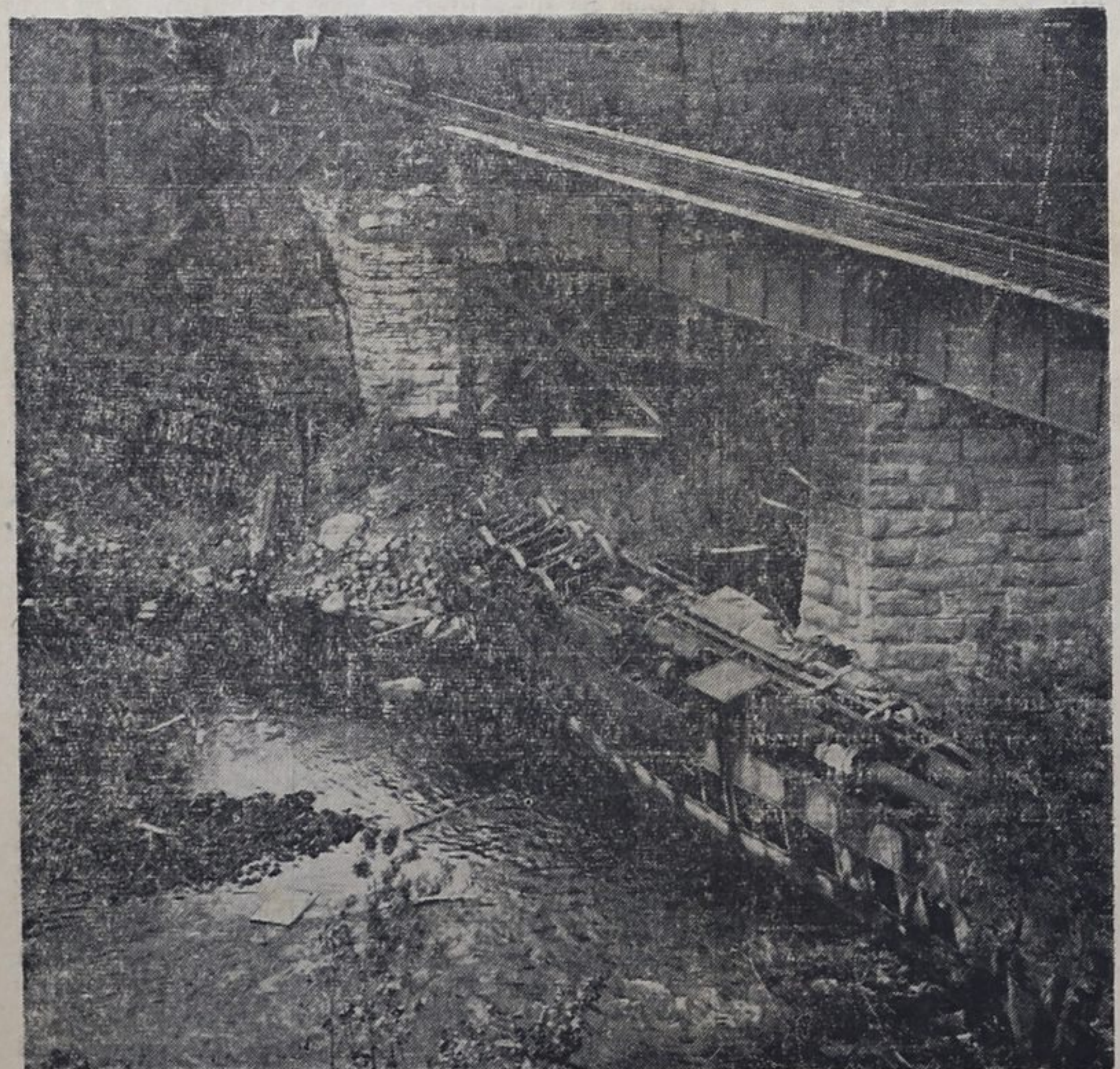
