

Show Photographs As Evidence In Claim For Haulage

Former Haileybury Man Given Judgment in Claim Heard in New Liskeard Court

In the absence of the defendants, Robert Watson of Matachewan and formerly of Haileybury was given judgment for \$143.75 and costs against George W. Crothers, Ltd., of Toronto, whom he had sued over a contract to haul machinery from the Arbade mine to Elk Lake, the action coming before Judge G. H. Hayward in Division Court sittings at New Liskeard on Tuesday morning.

Defendants had paid \$69.22 into court and previously had paid \$180.00 on account. His Honor was told. An exhibit at the hearing was a series of five photographs of the road from the Arbade mine to the floating bridge across the Montreal River beyond Matachewan and, although Watson himself described the road as neither good nor bad, the pictures suggested that going over it must have been rough in places.

Watson claimed Mr. Norrie of the Crothers Company had interviewed him in Matachewan on August 14 last and had struck a bargain then for plaintiff to haul the machinery, first to the floating bridge and then, after a portage, to Elk Lake. The distance from mine to bridge, Watson said was five or five and half miles, and the agreement for this phase of the work was two dollars daily for ten hours, and board.

Plaintiff told Mr. Cumming that, for the 38 or 40 mile run from the floating bridge to Elk Lake the rate was to be \$15 a day at a dollar and a half an hour. This was necessary because his truck, which goes ten miles on a gallon of gasoline, could not be handled over that stretch for the same money. Norrie, according to plaintiff, had said he would make it all right, although no particular amount had been mentioned. Some days there had been two trips between bridge and Elk Lake.

Corroboration of the conversation between Norrie and Watson was given by Lucien Savoye, employed by plaintiff. The claim was for \$361.50, made up of 25 days at \$10 daily, 17 hours overtime at one dollar an hour, six days (to Elk Lake) at \$15 daily, and three hours overtime at a dollar and a half an hour. Credits included 90 gallons of gasoline at 36 cents a gallon, a quart of oil at 30 cents, deduction for National Defence tax, five dollars, and paid on account \$180, for a total of \$217.75.

ENLARGE PLANTS FOR REFINING COBALT; SHORTAGE IS FEARED

Of interest to mining men of the district is a recent report from Niagara Falls, to the effect that cobalt has been placed under direct allocation system in the United States, that a shortage of the metal is feared and that refining capacity is being increased 50 per cent. The plant in Niagara Falls is being enlarged, the report said, and the uncertainty of shipments from abroad had caused fears of a shortage. Cobalt metal is used as an alloy for steel, largely in the production of high-speed cutting tools, while its chemical compounds are used as a dryer for paint and as a binder for applying enamel to steel.

Anyhow, all Northerners are glad the Algonquins are coming east and expect there will be more opportunities for them to get home on leave.

Miners at eight Kirkland Lake gold mines were reported to be on strike, yesterday morning, following a break-down of the conference in Ottawa between the operators and heads of the Union.

Arrangements will be made for all men in the Active Services, both army and air force, to have five days' leave at Christmas and New Years, as many as possible getting home for the Christmas and the balance a week later.

Winter Storm Gives Place Quickly To "Indian Summer"

Weather Extremes Are the Rule This Week With Unusual Display of Lightning

A winter storm, which gave place quickly to a spell of what might well be termed "Indian Summer," with an unusually severe electric disturbance sandwiched in between, were features of the weather in this district during the past few days.

The comparatively mild weather of last week changed some time during Saturday night or Sunday morning, bringing a rather severe frost and some flurries to mark the Sabbath.

On Monday a heavy fall of snow during the day appeared to be ushering in the winter, with

two or three inches of the white covering settling down gradually, but later in the day another change came, in the form of a regular thunderstorm with extremely sharp lightning flashes, something very rare so late in the season.

Throughout Monday night and Tuesday there were rains at intervals and gradually rising temperatures, with the snow which fell on Monday disappearing almost entirely. A recurrence of the thunder and lightning on Tuesday night was followed yesterday by nice warm weather, with the sun coming out around noon. There was every appearance of "Indian Summer" and late in the afternoon the winter seemed to be still remote.
