

Mrs. Willars was the former Helena Elizabeth (Nellie E.) Whall. She was born in London, England, on September 12, 1864, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Whall. Her father was an architectural carver by profession known as the last of the great sculptors, and he had been engaged on many famous buildings in different parts of England, including Westminster Abbey. There is a family story that he had once rebuked sharply the future King Edward Seventh because that then young man had interrupted him at his work.

The Whall family moved to Leicester many years ago, and there, in 1897 Mrs. Willars was married. Four years later, her husband, a painter by vocation, came to Temiskaming in search of better health, and in May, 1902, his family joined him. They lived in Harley township until after the close of the last war, when Mr. and Mrs. Willars moved into New Liskeard, where the family home has been since that


