Light Rainfall Only Weather Feature Out Of Ordinary

Temperature Just Over Average For July; Longest Breeze Was From Northwest

With the exception of the light rainfall, there was little out of the ordinary in July this year from the weather standpoint, according to the monthly summary prepared by Jas. Reavell at the Haileybury meteorological station and handed to the district papers this week. The total precipitation was 2.98 inches, compared to a normal for July of 3.40 inches, while the same month of 1941 saw a fall of 4.01 inches.

The average temperature last month was recorded as 65.3 degrees, just over the normal for the period since 1894 which stands at 65.2. Last year's average was 67.7 degrees. Highest temperature last month was 96.8 and the lowest 44 degrees, compared to 90.8 and 44 respectively for July of 1941. The record hot day in the district came in 1921, with 102 degrees, while July of 1904 saw the lowest recorded temperature, 35.8 degrees. The greatest daily range last month was 34.1 degrees and least 4.6 degrees, the summary shows.

The wind records for the month show a total of 3,773 miles with an average velocity of 5.1 miles per hour, compared to figures for last year of 3,965 and 5.3 respectively. Highest wind last month blew from the southwest, at the rate of 19 miles per hour, and the prevailing winds were also from the same direction, but the longest continuous breeze blew from the northwest, 34 hours for a total of 290 miles. There were 107 calm hours, compared to 98 hours in July, 1941.

William Inch Junior Is Latest Air Force Recruit

William Inch, Jr., eldest son of Sergt. and Mrs. Wm. C. Inch, is the latest Haileybury boy to join the Royal Canadian Air Force. His father, a veteran of the last war, is serving with the Tank Corps in an administrative unit, and Bill Jr. has been training with the Algonquin Second Battalion since the start of the war. He had risen to the rank of sergeant in the reserve company, and this summer he had charge of the cadet corps at the local high school. He left on Tuesday evening to report at North Bay and expected to go from there to Toronto.

Another Haileybury Boy Serving With R.C.A.F.

Edward Allard, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Allard, View street, is another Haileybury boy who has joined up with the Royal Canadian Air Force. He enlisted at North Bay recently and has been sent to the Manning Pool at Toronto, according to members of the family. Edward will serve in a ground crew, it was stated. Two of his brothers, Wilfrid and Lawrence, are in the Reserve forces.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY MENU INTERESTING RELIC OF 1915

An interesting relic of the year 1915 came to light the other day in the form of a menu prepared for a St. Patrick's Day banquet held in the Attorney Hotel on March 17 of that year. The menu was printed by the late Simon Stahl and the various dishes all appear to have been given an Irish flavor, judging from the titles of the different courses. There were "Home Rule Soup," "Kilkenny Shots," "Fennessy's Prime Beef," "Boiled Murphys" and "Limerick Turnips" among the list of tempting viands. The menu was unearthed by Jas. Timmins, manager of Hotel Haileybury for some months past.

GOT CIGARETTES FROM LOCAL BRIDGE CLUB; FINDS WORLD SMALL

Norman Sutherland, younger son of Mrs. D. McNabb of Haileybury and the late Gervase Sutherland, thinks this is a small world after all. He is serving overseas with the Canadian forces and recently, according to a letter received by his mother, was handed a parcel of cigarettes from a consignment sent by the "Haileybury Bridge Club" to the tobacco and hamper fund for overseas soldiers. On opening the parcel he found a card bearing the name of Mrs. Wm. Massales, together with a short message of good wishes, and he requested that his thanks be conveyed to her and to the club. The "smokes" were greatly enjoyed, Norman said, and he was truly grateful to the home folks for their generosity.

Norman, whose boyhood was spent in Haileybury and the North Bay area, enlisted at the latter point and has been overseas for a considerable time. Like all the Canadians, he is looking forward to the day when the war will be over and he can return to his homeland. His father fought in the last war returning to Haileybury at its close, and it will be recalled that he lost his life while assisting in rescue work during the big fog of October 4th, 1922.
