Failed to Report Change of Address; Given Minimum Fine

Defence Counsel Says Case Is "Petty Little Procedure"; Claimed Notice Sent

What defence counsel described as "a petty little procedure" against a man "who does not read English", before Magistrate Atkinson in regular court sittings here last Friday, when Leo Boissonault of Haileybury was assessed the minimum penalty of \$25 when convicted on a charge of failing to report a change of address to the proper authorities in connection with a military service call sent him more than sixteen months ago. Costs increased the amount of the fine to a total of \$31.25.

Corp. Green of the R.C.M.P. at Kirkland Lake, who picked up accused, conducted the prosecution and was its sole witness. Boissonault, he told his counsel, J. A. Legris, K.C., had been at Rutherglen when in December, 1941, he received a notice from the Department of National War Services to report and he answered it, he said, in a letter written by a sister on the staff of Misericordia Hospital here. Mr. Legris contended that was sufficient notice his address had been changed.

Accused also swore that he had notified the post office at Rutherglen that he was returning to Haileybury but he said he had not notified any other authority. He said further that was all he knew about the matter until the officer picked him up here, where he had been for over eighteen months, he declared. He did not know he was supposed to notify the Department when changing his address, accused told the court.

In his evidence, Boissonault said he had notified his employer when he received the call and that in the letter written in reply to the notice, he had declared he "realized my obligations" and was not asking for a postponement, although he was the sole support of his parents, both "very old and very poor." In reply, the Department of War Services informed him that dependents of men called for service were paid on the same basis as those who went on active service.
