**John B. Harris Dies at Bourlamaque; Old Resident Here**

**Veteran of Last War and Native of England; Funeral Held Tuesday Afternoon**

John Bright Harris, veteran of the last great war and for many years an employee in the baggage department of the T. & N.O. Railway, died at the Lamaque Hospital Bourlamaque, Que., on Saturday last, May 1st. He had been in ill-health since last Christmas and eight days before his death was taken to the hospital from the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Perry, Bourlamaque, where he had gone from Haileybury in October last.

Mr. Harris was born in Newark, Nottinghamshire, England, December 19, 1868. He came to Canada in 1907 and settled in Haileybury, where he had his home up to last fall, with the exception of the two years he served with the 159th Battalion in the last war. Until his retirement from active work a few years ago he had been in charge of the baggage room at the Haileybury station of the T. & N.O. and had many friends in the community. His wife, the former Ada Vasey, predeceased him on January 1st, 1941.

Surviving are one son, Arthur B. Harris of Rouyn, and two daughters, Mrs. George Nicholls and Mrs. J. C. Perry, both of Bourlamaque, Que. One son, Reginald, lost his life overseas in the last great war.

Funeral services were held in Bourlamaque after which the remains were brought by train to Haileybury for interment in Mount Pleasant cemetery.

The service here was held in the Tulloch Funeral Chapel, by Rev. R. J. Scott of Cobalt, in the absence of Rev. A. P. Addison, pastor of the United Church, of which Mr. Harris was a member. The following old friends of the deceased acted as pallbearers: J. E. Dunn, C. E. Fleming, W. T. Joy, R. T. Trowhill, W. Bradley and Robert Bell. Old friends of the family were present for the services in the chapel and at the graveside and beautiful floral tributes were sent.

"Pasadena, Cal., April 26th—Peter, the pet dove and constant companion for four years of Austin Shaw, noted Canadian artist, died on the same day as its master and was buried in the same casket with him. Shaw rescued the baby dove when it was ailing and apparently abandoned by its parents, feeding it with a medicine dropper until it grew into a dove with a marked attachment for him. On the day of his death the dove refused to eat and was finally chloroformed by friends and buried with him."
