

## Home Rinks Take Three Firsts at Kirkland Bonspiel

Other Prizes Well Spread Among Clubs Taking Part; Event Ended on Saturday

Prizes awarded at the big T. & N.O. bonspiel held last week at Kirkland Lake were pretty well distributed among the clubs represented by rinks in the various competitions, although three first prizes were won by the home club. One of the other main awards went to a Toronto rink one to the Dome Mines club and another to the McIntyre curlers with all other clubs taking part winning one or more of the second, third and fourth prizes.

There were 29 rinks in the 'spiel, but with an extra draw each day and the use of the skating arena for a day more than planned, the big event was wound up on Saturday. For the greater part of the week the weather was ideal, but on Friday the ice softened up a bit and made the going heavy then and on Saturday. The frost on Saturday night late however, remedied this condition for the final in the Consols event Sunday morning.

M. Grady, secretary-treasurer of the Temiskaming Fish and Game Protective Association, and who took up the matter with the provincial authorities.

Mr. Grady said he had been informed by the department that the report appearing in The Municipal World in this respect was "entirely erroneous," and it was added that no changes were contemplated in this respect for the current year. Mr. Grady said that, after checking the item, he had got in touch with the authorities, with the result noted.
